1 EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- 1.1 This report sets out the key findings and recommendations from the Scrutiny Inquiry – Active Travel Schemes. The Inquiry considered the following question: “How can Birmingham deliver Active Travel schemes quicker and make city roads safer for all users?”.
- 1.2 The Scrutiny Inquiry identified six themes from the evidence set out in Appendix A: Systems; Funding; Governance and Accountability; Resources; Design and Consultation and Information. Based on this evidence, the inquiry group has proposed 13 recommendations.

That the Council:

- 3.1 Approve recommendations R01 to R13, set out in Appendix A, and request that the Executive pursue their implementation.

4 KEY INFORMATION

Context

- 4.1 Active Travel refers to modes of travel which involve a level of physical activity. The term is often used interchangeably with walking and cycling but active travel can also include trips made by wheelchair, mobility scooters and e-scooters. Longer journeys, especially those by public transport, will generally involve an element of active travel as part of them. Local Authorities can play an important role in increasing walking, wheeling and cycling. Through influencing planning and taking a wider, strategic view of travel infrastructure across their area, authorities can ensure that active travel infrastructure connects residents to services. It is important to note that Active Travel is about providing people with choices, not just delivering schemes. The [Birmingham Transport Plan](#) (BTP) sets out Birmingham’s ambitions to deliver this.
- 4.2 The Council has been criticised for the design of, and time taken to deliver Active Travel schemes in comparison to neighbouring Local Authorities. Through this inquiry, its Inquiry group intended to understand if there are different and better ways for the Council to deliver Active Travel schemes and make recommendations to achieve this.
- 4.3 This Scrutiny Inquiry was established in July 2023 by the Sustainability and Transport Overview and Scrutiny Committee. Evidence gathering took place between August and October 2023. In total, the inquiry considered evidence from 12 separate organisations using a combination of face to face sessions, written

submissions and site visits. The report attached as Appendix A provides a summary of the evidence considered.

- 4.4 The Sustainability and Transport Overview and Scrutiny Committee will track the implementation of these recommendations and their impact through reports to the Committee.

IMPACT AND IMPLICATIONS

Finance

- 4.5 The Inquiry recommendations recognise the financial pressures the Council is facing and set out that the implementation of recommendations will be within existing resources and capacity available. There is no request for additional resource or capacity to implement the recommendations.

- 4.6 There are no legal implications arising from the recommendations in this report.

- 4.7 The Council has a Public Sector Equality Duty under the Equality Act (2010) to have due regard to the need to:
