REVIEW OF HIGHWAYS LICENSING FEES AND CHARGES 2024-25

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Tony Quigley presented the report providing an update on the work of the England Illegal Money Lending Team (IMLT) hosted by Birmingham City Council's Regulation and Enforcement Division up to 6 February 2024. It was noted that the IMLT project was funded at no cost to the City Council through a ringfenced grant related to the proceeds of crime income. Members commended the team for the work they were carrying out.

Tony Quigley presented the report providing an update on the work of the National Trading Standards Regional Investigations Team (Central England) (RIT), hosted by Birmingham City Council's, Regulation and Enforcement Division.

Since 2011, funding had been on an annual cycle. The grant amount for 2023-24 was £334,000 and was expected to rise to £359,000 for 2024-25. The team were supported by Legal Services with regards to the work they do. They were funded through National Trading Standards at no cost to Birmingham City Council.

The Committee was informed that a joint meeting was planned to take place on Friday, 15 March, 2024 to discuss the issues and look for solutions. The approach taken meant that a fixed site no longer had to be identified. Following an update on the reasons for the delays Councillor Phil Davis commented that a joined-up approach needed to be taken.

Members were disappointed at the lack of a functioning site in the City and asked for clarification when Proctor Street site would be up and running and fit

for purpose. It was suggested that the appropriate Strategic Directors should attend the Committee. A comment was made that there was no representative from Nechells Ward in attendance. In reply to a query whether Housing worked with people with regard to temporary accommodation the Committee was informed that not all travellers were homeless. 1.0 Executive Summary

- 1.1 This report details the business planning process for the Regulation and Enforcement Division in terms of the Coroner and Mortuary, Environmental Health, Licensing, Private Rented Sector, Property Licensing, Markets Service, Bereavement Services, Registrars and Trading Standards services.
- 1.2 This report and the attached business plan delivery activities document form Regulation and Enforcement's Business Plan for the period 2024/25.
- 1.3 This business plan is a strategic document and as such reflects our response to corporate, national, regional and local priorities for Regulation and Enforcement Division including those services that report to your Committee as well as key delivery activities for those services.

2.0 Recommendation(s)

- 2.1 That the Committee note the Regulation and Enforcement' Business Plan for 2024/25.

3.0 Background - Operating Context

- 3.1 The purpose of this business plan is to set out how corporate, national, regional and local priorities identified for Regulation and Enforcement, together with stakeholders' requirements are to be achieved at a strategic level as well as identifying key delivery activities for those services.
- 3.2 The plan also provides information on the contextual background to Regulation and Enforcement.
- 3.3 In September 2023, Birmingham City Council issued two Section 114 notices as part of the plans to meet the council's financial liabilities relating to equal pay claims and an in-year financial gap within its budget.
- 3.4 Michael Gove, Secretary of State for the Department of Levelling Up, Housing and Communities appointed commissioners to exercise certain functions of the council as required and begin the improvement journey for Birmingham City Council.
- 3.5 The Council needs to deliver over £150 million worth of savings over the next 12 months and there will be considerable changes to services as a result.
- 3.6 Challenging decisions lie ahead, the Council need to ensure finances are brought back on track to a healthy position and implement a programme of improvement. This commences with the 2024/25 budget.
- 3.7 The Council has already implemented financial controls on spending. These controls mean the Council is prevented, without explicit agreement of the Section 151 Officer, from entering into any new agreement or commitment for expenditure until Full Council has met to consider the Section 114 report. All Regulation and Enforcement spend will be approved via the City Operations Section 151 Board and the Corporate Section 151 Board.
- 3.8 The improvement journey has begun on the path to become a financially sustainable and well-run council. The Improvement and Recovery Plan was approved by Cabinet on 16 April 2024.
- 3.9 In 2024/25 we operate within the context of the Section 114 notices, the Improvement and Recovery Plan and the following opportunities and challenges.

Opportunities

- Birmingham is a unique area (Birmingham's diversity, Commonwealth Games legacy, size, and population growth). Operating as the largest council in Europe and in a unique space as a young diverse city with unique strengths and issues must come unique solutions.
- Organisational transformation (better partnership working and co-design, improved co-ordination of Council resources across service areas, responding to diversity in the workforce and residents, reshape workforce to manage skills gap)
- Technology: Recognising that as a division that technology will enable better customer service and efficiencies.

- Better use of data in establishing what we need to do and what we are achieving. Using available data tools to inform decision making.
- Capitalise on the impact of the Commonwealth Games across the areas of pride, participation, attracting new events and ensuring the ambitions of Birmingham are realised.
- Review People processes that enable us to adapt so they are fit for purpose, including how we recruit to posts.
- Reset, Reshape Restart – we will consider how best to transform our services within the Improvement and Recovery Plan produced as a response to the issuing of the two Section 114 notices.

Challenges

- Operating within the budget constraints of the two Section 114 notices.
- Cost of Living Crisis for residents and staff (increased need, reduced income, fuel poverty, increased industrial action across the public sector, potential recession). This makes it difficult to predict need and budget effectively.
- Potential evolving strategic scope of services over time. Do we have the right people in the right places to deliver our vision and activities?
- Budget management challenges creates an impetus to deliver more for less through better use of contracts and closer working across the organisation to ensure that we get all the outcomes we need, first time.
- Increased responsibility due to legislative changes and innovation in use of powers
- Increased fuel/energy costs affect us particularly in terms of fleet, premises and cost of contracts.
- Any significant political issues (changes in national policy, war in Ukraine, crisis in the Middle East, impact of Brexit, upcoming elections)
- Difficulties in recruiting and maintaining a skilled work force due to lack of availability of qualified/specialist officers, a competitive market and impacts of an ageing workforce.
- Economic deprivation impacting the health and wellbeing of residents disproportionately in already deprived areas.
- A diverse group of regional agencies that BCC must work better with to get better outcomes for residents.
- Organisations we work with, rely on and support do not match city boundaries and therefore relationship management is more time consuming and less effective.

4.0 Vision and Objectives

- 4.1 The Regulation and Enforcement Division is within the City Operations Directorate of the City Council. Within the City Operations Directorate we seek to achieve a positive look and feel for our city that all residents can be proud of.
- 4.2 Within Regulation and Enforcement our mission statement is - locally accountable and responsive fair regulation for all – achieving a safe, healthy, clean, green and fair trading city for residents, business and visitors.
- 4.3 Regulation and Enforcement has aligned its delivery activities (appendix 1) to Birmingham City Council's corporate objectives of:

- **A Prosperous Birmingham:** through a focus on inclusive economic growth, tackling unemployment, attracting inward investment, and maximising the benefits of the Commonwealth Games.
- **An Inclusive Birmingham:** through a focus on tackling poverty and inequality, empowering citizens, promoting diversity and civic pride, and supporting and enabling all children and young people to thrive.
- **A Safe Birmingham:** through a focus on making the city safer, safeguarding vulnerable citizens, increasing affordable housing, and tackling homelessness.
- **A Healthy Birmingham:** through a focus on tackling health inequalities, encouraging physical activity and healthy living, supporting mental health, and improving outcomes for adults with disabilities and older people.
- **A Green Birmingham:** through a focus on street cleanliness, improving air quality, continuing the route to net zero, and becoming a city of nature.

4.4 Regulation and Enforcement provides an integrated range of services, a 'golden thread', throughout peoples' lives from cradle to grave, for example:

- The Registrar's Service provides efficient registration of births.
- Trading Standards ensure that the toys our children play with are safe.
- Environmental Health and Health and Safety regulate standards in children's nurseries.
- Trading Standards ensure that young people are protected from underage sales of tobacco, alcohol, fireworks, knives and solvents.
- All services work through advice and assistance to members of the public and businesses which provide the conditions for economic growth in the business sector to ensure a fair and well-regulated trading environment. This enables local and national economic growth.
- All services, through firm, fair and proportionate enforcement, ensure that members of the public and businesses are protected from those who seek to make profit at their expense – be it by removing counterfeit goods from the marketplace, prosecuting unlicensed 'taxis' or by tackling those who do not adequately protect people in the workplace.
- Environmental Health ensures that everyone's wellbeing is protected, for example, through inspection of food premises, monitoring air pollution levels and acting against those that threaten health.
- The Licensing Service ensures that premises selling alcohol or where regulated entertainment is carried on are properly licensed as are hackney carriage, private hire drivers and those operating such businesses in the city assuring public safety throughout.
- The Registrar's Service enables marriages and civil partnerships to take place in the city and welcome new citizens through regular citizenship ceremonies.
- The vulnerable, for example, older citizens are protected from rogue builders and those in care homes are protected from identified hazards including scalding and accidents.
- At the end of life, the Coroners and Mortuary and Registrars services provide valued caring, empathetic and efficient services to help provide closure for bereaved families assuring that dignity is maintained throughout for the deceased.

4.5 Regulation and Enforcement's impacts are felt nationally, regionally, locally and individually, for example:

- At a national level, our services are represented on Government and national bodies to influence the direction of legislation to protect our citizens and economic interests. We also host the England Illegal Money Lending Team.
- Regionally services work with other local authorities to address cross boundary issues. We support the work of the Greater Birmingham and Solihull Local Enterprise Partnership (LEP) to assist in the economic growth of the region and our services also work within the Central England Trading Standards Authorities (CENTSA) on joint activity across the seven West Midlands local authorities and the seven adjoining County authorities. We host the CENTSA Regional Investigations Team
- We work to deliver our services at a local level in a manner responsive to the needs of the community, working with partners such as West Midlands Police and West Midlands Fire Service
- Regulation and Enforcement work in partnership at a local level with many organisations in the private, public and voluntary sectors, contributing significantly to enable those organisations to achieve their respective strategic objectives, this includes the Police and Fire Service through to Business Improvement Districts and local volunteering groups.
- Much of our service provision is driven by the needs of individuals who approach us for assistance, either in the form of requests for assistance (complaints), service requests or licence applications.
- We are an important partner in the delivery and promotion of the health agenda working closely with Public Health colleagues.

5.0 Regulation and Enforcement – Legislative Framework

As an enforcement body Regulation and Enforcement is itself regulated both in terms of the legislation that is enforced on behalf of your Committee (over 130 Acts of Parliament and many more regulations and orders) and through specific legislation which governs all investigative activities such as the Police and Criminal Evidence 1984 Act (PACE) and the Regulation of Investigatory Powers 2000 Act (RIPA).

The complex requirements on Regulation and Enforcement in relation to investigating offences, gathering evidence, preparing, and presenting cases at Magistrates and Crown Courts are the same as those applied to the Police. This requires our officers to be suitably qualified and competent to investigate offences and prepare prosecution reports to ensure that at Court the required burden of proof (beyond all reasonable doubt) is met, and offenders successfully prosecuted. Any failure of our prosecutions would leave us open to accusations of wasting resources, adverse publicity, and the possibility of paying compensation.

Prosecution is used where appropriate in dealing with non-compliance and in line with our published Enforcement Policy. The Policy ensures we comply with the Code for Crown Prosecutors and Regulators Compliance Code when making decisions about enforcement actions. We utilise a range of enforcement tools

including advice, statutory notices, cautions, prosecutions and civil actions or penalties. We also use prevention methods to protect businesses' economic interests. The removal of counterfeit goods prevents losses to legitimate businesses, promotes real economic growth and deter future offences.

We operate within the legislative framework that applies to all public bodies including freedom of information legislation, the duty to involve and legislation dealing with equality, diversity, and discrimination.

To ensure that we achieve the high standards that are required to meet this level of excellence in enforcement, Regulation and Enforcement operates a robust set of policies and procedures.

Intelligence led enforcement leading to well-regulated manufacturing, retail and service sectors creates the environment to benefit the city's economic prosperity and its citizens' wellbeing.

Regulation and Enforcement will continue to maximise the impact of our powers as delegated and build upon the opportunities associated to general power of competence in the Localism Act 2011.

The Registration Service is governed by the Registrar General's Regulations and Instructions, and we are committed to delivering our services to the highest standards consistent with the requirements of the City Council and the Registrar General.

6. **Workforce Planning**

6.1 Regulation and Enforcement will focus on the following five key priorities within workforce planning:

- Best in class
- Resourcing, recruitment, attraction
- Talent, succession, development, retention
- Inclusion, belonging and wellbeing
- Culture

6.2 We will seek to achieve:

- Improvement in our sickness absence rates and reduction in costs associated with covering absences.
- Reduction in number of employment relationship cases and time taken to resolve issues.
- A high in number of applicants from diverse background
- Reduction in time taken from 'Application to Induction'.
- Improved quality and consistency in recruitment and selection that makes the City Council an attractive employer for those in qualified professions (e.g. environmental health) with regard to the attraction, retention and internal progression of staff.
- All new entrants go through robust induction and have a sound understanding of the work of the directorate and wider Council.

- A diverse workforce at all levels
- An increase in the number of Black, Asian, Minority Ethnic applicants and postholders in roles Grade 6 and 7
- Equality, Diversity and Inclusivity (EDI) practices embedded in everything we do.
- Wider Leadership Team completed Conscious Inclusive Recruitment workshop.
- Encourage staff to complete employee EDI data.
- Improved customer experience and reduction in complaints
- Increase in the number of graduates and apprentices joining the Directorate and the number of apprentices completing their apprenticeship and obtaining permanent roles increased.
- Data used to drive performance and challenge inefficiencies.
- Overall reduction in use of contingency worker

7.0 Delivery Activities 2024/2025

- 7.1 The delivery activities within Regulation and Enforcement are shown in appendix 1.
- 7.2 Over the year ahead Regulation and Enforcement will continue to work with partners on key issues to maximise the use of our resources to deliver the best outcomes for Birmingham.
- 7.3 The Division will deliver all savings that have been agreed for 2024/25 and scope and plan for delivery of 2025/26 savings. There are several transformation projects related to Pest Control, Waste Enforcement, Consolidation of Enforcement into a Centre of Expertise, and Bereavement Services that will project managed to ensure delivery of savings and efficiencies and increase effectiveness and best value. We seek to deliver best in class models within the budgetary controls.
- 7.4 The Division is carrying out a review of all contracts to ensure we ensure compliance with financial regulations and maximise potential for procurement opportunities.
- 7.5 The Division will support the Shaping Birmingham's Future Together Commission, bringing together partners and stakeholders from all corners and all sectors of Birmingham to help shape the devolution of power agenda with our communities.

8.0 Consultation

- 8.1 This business plan reflects the decisions taken through the Business Planning Review process and our delivery activities are directly linked to the Council's corporate priorities. The Council has consulted with regard to the Corporate Plan 2022-26.
- 8.2 This report consolidates many different projects and activities. Where consultation is required or appropriate this will be undertaken separately.

9.0 Financial Implications

9.1 All activities will be delivered within approved budget portfolios and in compliance with Section 151 and savings requirements.

9.6 The majority of the services within Licensing are funded through licence fees which are ring fenced by legislation in compliance with the EU Services Directive.

- 11.7 We will continue to engage and promote our work with all stakeholders including faith representatives to ensure we are providing service improvements that deliver for our wide range of customers.

1 Executive Summary

- 1.1 On 15th August 2022, the City Council declared two city centre noise PSPOs to control excessive noise levels from the street adversely effecting residential properties in two distinct areas.
- 1.2 This report provides and update on the progress of the PSPOs since their introduction.

2 Recommendation(s)

- 2.1 That the report be noted.

3 Background

- 3.1 Under the Environmental Protection Act 1990, the City Council have a statutory duty to investigate and, where necessary, take enforcement action with regards to complaints of alleged statutory noise nuisance under the Environmental Protection Act 1990.
- 3.2 Whilst the Council's powers under the Environmental Protection Act 1990 are recognised for dealing with complaints of domestic or even commercial noise nuisance they are not particularly effective in dealing with complaints of noise nuisance arising from the street, the sources of which are often quite transient.

3.3 On the 15th August 2022, following an increasing number of complaints from residents about excessive noise levels in the street, the City Council declared two Public Space Protection Orders aimed at controlling the noise. The two PSPOs are referred to as:

- Birmingham City Council displacement of noise from activities undertaken on the street in the vicinity of residential accommodation (New Street and High Street) Public Space Protection Order 2022.
- Birmingham City Council displacement of noise from activities undertaken on the street in the vicinity of residential accommodation (New Street and Temple Street) Public Space Protection Order 2022.

3.4 The areas were selected because of repeated complaints from residents living in apartment blocks near the junction of New Street and Temple Street and also in the Rotunda and adjoining buildings around noise.

3.5 Under the terms of the PSPOs the use of amplification equipment, musical instruments and items being used as musical instruments are restricted. Full details of the PSPOs can be found in Appendix 1.

3.6 The existing Public Space Protection Orders are in force for a period of 3 years after which period the Orders will lapse if they are not renewed. The expiry date for the two PSPOs is the 14th August 2025.

4 Requests for assistance in relation to noise on the street in the PSPO areas.

4.1 Since the PSPOs were introduced. A total of 82 complaints have been formally recorded on the City Council’s computer system about excessive noise level in and around the two PSPO areas. This is likely to be a significant under reporting of the overall number of complaints as there is a wide range of reporting mechanisms available into the City Council for example emails, telephone calls, speaking to Officers on the street and indirectly through Members, BIDs etc. It is likely that some complaints have not been properly passed to the Environmental Health team and therefore potentially not been recorded.

A breakdown of the requests for assistance can be seen below:

- 4.2 A number of the incidents reported above relate to the same individuals, some of whom have been subject to enforcement action by the City Council. As such it is anticipated that the number of complaints being received should drop further.
- 4.3 As a comparison, in the 20 months leading up to the introduction of the City Centre Noise PSPOs (01/12/2020 – 31/07/2022), Environmental Health received 130 complaints about noise levels in the street in the vicinity of the two PSPO areas. It should be noted that during this period, the country was subject to COVID restriction which meant that the first complaint received during this period was not actually received until 16th June 2021. It is therefore likely that the number of complaints received would have been significantly higher should the pandemic not have taken place.
- 4.4 As can be seen from the data above, the number of complaints received in relation to noise from street-based activities within the PSPOs has reduced showing the positive impact that the PSPOs have been having on the quality of life of residents.

5. Enforcement Interventions

- 5.1 Since their introduction, the PSPOs have acted as an opening for Officers to approach buskers, street preachers and street entertainers about the noise that they are creating and the impact that it is having on nearby residents. On many occasions, street users had not considered the impact that their activities can have on nearby residents and respectfully agree to relocate away from residential properties. This has enabled officers to resolve the potential risk of complaints from residents before they have been made.
- 5.2 A total of 14 fixed penalty notices have been issued since the PSPOs came into force. The service of which has been distributed evenly with 7 FPNs being issued in each of the PSPO areas. Of the FPNs issued, 6 were paid within the within the accepted time frame, 3 were paid as a result of legal proceedings and the remaining 5 were withdrawn or cancelled for a range of reasons.
- 5.3 It is appreciated that breaches of the PSPOs can occur at any time. Whilst efforts are made to provide resources on the street at the time when incidents are most likely, it is not possible to respond to all requests for assistance at the point when the noise is occurring. Where possible these are followed up afterwards with suitable enforcement action.
- 5.4 Whilst on the whole Council Officers are able to respond to complaints on their own, there are some circumstances where additional support is required from Officers from West Midlands Police to help protect Officer safety and prevent breaches of the peace. As such the City Council have an arrangement in place to buy in "Off Duty" support from West Midlands Police to assist with the patrols. These patrols typically take place in the evening where there has been seen to be an increased levels of aggression towards Officers and where there is an increased risk of bystanders becoming involved in interactions. Despite this additional Police resource, there have been a number of instances where Officers have been assaulted or have had abusive and/or threatening language used against them. Where these instances have occurred, the matters have been progressed by West Midlands Police through the Magistrates Court.
- 5.5 Whilst every effort is made to resolve incidents of the PSPO being breached either through education or enforcement, there have been several instances this is where large scale protests have entered the city centre and Officers have encountered difficulties seeking compliance.

6 Displacement

- 6.1 Whilst the PSPO has been successful in reducing noise levels on the street near to residential properties, there has been a small degree of displacement into the wider city centre. Where noise complaints are received, Environmental Health,

have been working with residents and businesses to resolve complaints through a range of education and enforcement where necessary.

7. Feedback from external bodies.

7.1 Whilst overall the feedback around the PSPOs has been positive, a number of organisations within the busking community have expressed concern over the impact of the scheme on its members through the removal of key busking locations. The Council is continuing to work with these organisations with regards to a solution which meets the best interests of both residents and members.

7.2 Similarly, feedback has been received from the Business Improvement District and businesses that the noise from buskers and preachers continues to be very intrusive due to the fact they are operating on the fringes of the PSPO areas and areas not covered by a PSPO.

7.3 There has been positive feedback from residents within the two PSPO areas. The notices have mostly met their objective of reducing amplified noise at the residential accommodation in both areas. As stated in 3.6 above, the existing PSPOs lapse after 3 years. Residents are currently expressing concern as to what will happen when the notices lapse as stating they would like to see them extended.

8. Options considered and Recommended Proposal

8.1 None. This report is for noting.

9. Legal Implications

9.1 The PSPOs assist the City Council in discharging its statutory duty under the Environmental Protection Act 1990 with regards to noise nuisance.

10. Financial Implications

10.1 The cost of enforcing the scheme is currently being met from the existing Environmental Health budget.

11. Public Sector Equality Duty

11.1 An equalities impact assessment was undertaken as part of the process of declaring the PSPOs.

12. Other Implications

12.1 The introduction and enforcement of the PSPOs helps support the Council's priorities around support inclusive economic growth, attracting inward investment and infrastructure, make the city safer and increasing affordable, safe, green housing.

ANTI-SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR, CRIME AND POLICING ACT 2014
BIRMINGHAM CITY COUNCIL DISPLACEMENT OF NOISE FROM
ACTIVITIES UNDERTAKEN ON THE STREET IN THE VICINITY OF
RESIDENTIAL ACCOMMODATION
(NEW STREET AND HIGH STREET)
PUBLIC SPACE PROTECTION ORDER 2022

This Order shall come into force on 15th August 2022 at 00:01 hrs and for a period of three (3) years and will expire on the 14th August 2025 at 23.59 hrs.

THIS ORDER is made by Birmingham City Council (“the Council”) under section 59 of the Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014 (the Act), because the Council is satisfied on reasonable grounds that there are a number of activities, carried out or likely to be carried out in a public space, within the Restricted Area that have had, or are likely to have, a detrimental effect on the quality of life of those in the locality. The effect or likely effect of these activities is of a persistent or continuing nature such as to make these activities unreasonable, and justifies the restrictions imposed by this order.

These activities include:

- 1) The use of amplified speakers for musical instruments and the playing of music and
- 2) The use of equipment for public address; unamplified musical instruments; other items used as musical instruments; noise associated with busking; entertaining and public speaking

affecting residential dwellings in the restricted area:

- At an unreasonable noise level during the day, or
- At anti-social hours (after 20:00hrs and before 08:00hrs), and
- In a repetitive, recurring and static nature and/or
- By an individual or separately by individuals leading to an adverse cumulative noise impact on the residential properties.

5 Definitions:

“Authorised Person” means a Police Constable, Police Community Support Officer, Council Officer or an Officer working on behalf of the City Council, and must be able to present their authority upon request.

“Restricted Area” any public place within the areas outlined in blue on the attached map.

“Amplification Equipment” microphones, speakers, loudspeakers, megaphones, loudhailers public address systems or any other similar equipment used for the amplification of voice, music or pre-recorded audio-tracks, but not apparatus designed and used as an aid to defective hearing, as an aid for speech or speech replacement, or apparatus used where the sound is received through headphones, or apparatus whilst being used to undertake personal private communication.

THIS ORDER PROHIBITS the following things being done in the Restricted Area:

Amplification equipment, musical instruments or other items used as musical instruments

- a) A person is prohibited at all times from using amplification equipment to broadcast sound to third parties, musical instruments or other items used as musical instruments within the areas marked in green on the map of the restricted area.

- b) A person is prohibited between the hours of 20.00 hrs and 08.00 hrs from using amplification equipment to broadcast sound to third parties, musical instruments or other items used as musical instruments within the areas marked in yellow on the map of the restricted area.

The above prohibitions do not apply to:

- i. anyone who holds a current street trading consent or written authorisation from The Council.

- ii. Emergency Response e.g. Police, Fire and Rescue Authority, Ambulance Services or Statutory Undertakers for the purpose of public safety and/or the prevention of crime and disorder.

- iii. warning or alarm sounds associated with vehicles and machinery to keep the public safe on the shared highway e.g. reversing signals.

- iv. Organised public processions in accordance with Public Order Act 1986.

- v. A political demonstration or a demonstration supporting or opposing a cause or campaign associated with a shop or business within the restricted area.

Penalty on breach (s67 of the Act)

It is an offence for a person, without reasonable excuse:

- to do anything that the person is prohibited from doing by the PSPO, or
- to fail to comply with a requirement to which the person is subject under the PSPO

A person does not commit an offence by failing to comply with a prohibition or requirement that the Council did not have power to include in the PSPO.

A person guilty of an offence is liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding level 3 on the standard scale.

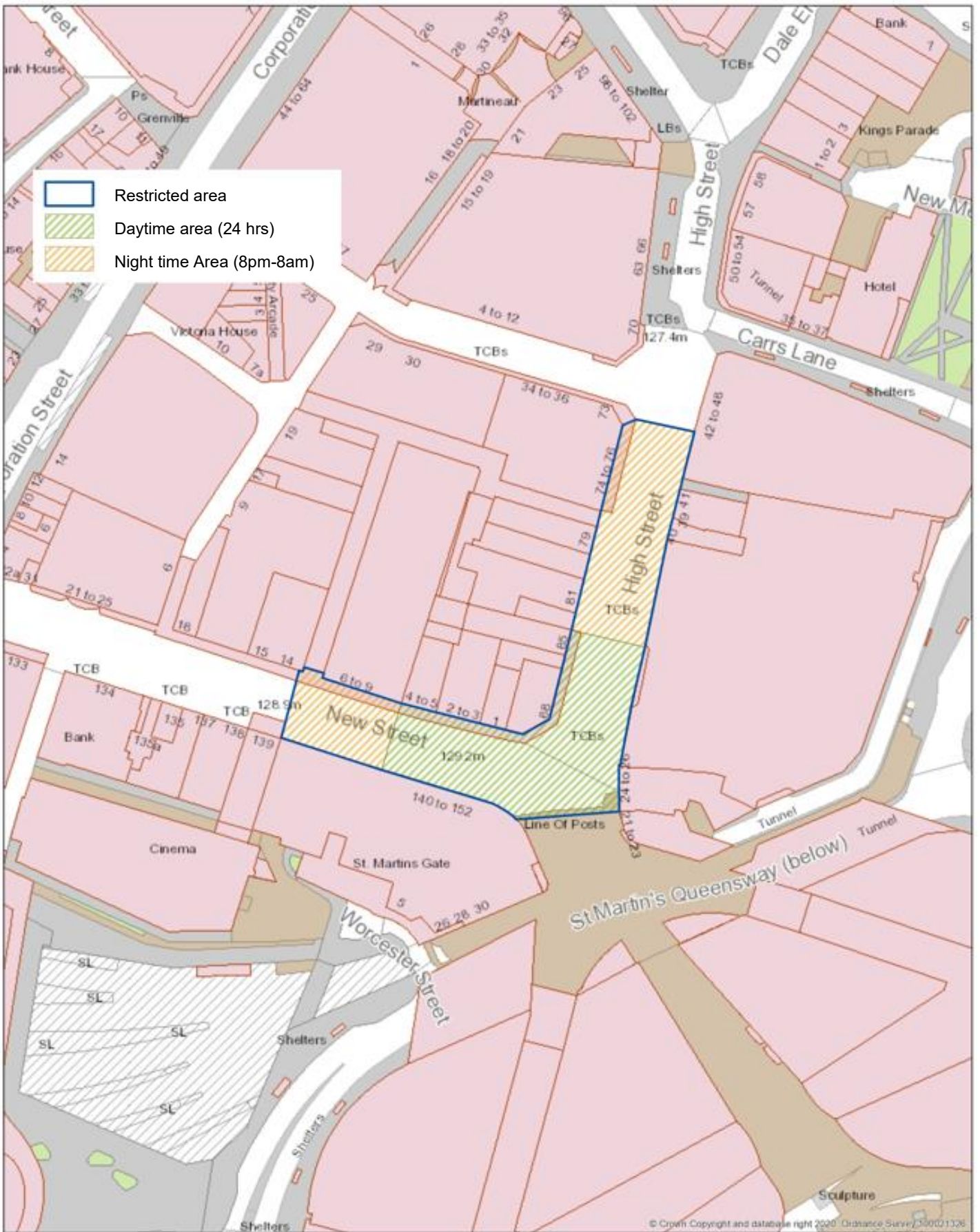
Depending on the behaviour in question, the enforcing officer could decide that a fixed penalty notice (FPN) would be the most appropriate sanction. The FPN can be issued by a police officer, or other authorised person. In making the decision to issue a FPN, the officer should consider that if issued, payment of the FPN would discharge any liability to conviction for the offence. However, where the FPN is not paid within the required timescale, court proceedings can be initiated (prosecution for the offence or failing to comply with the PSPO).

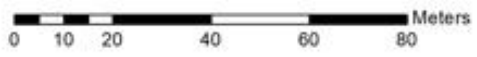

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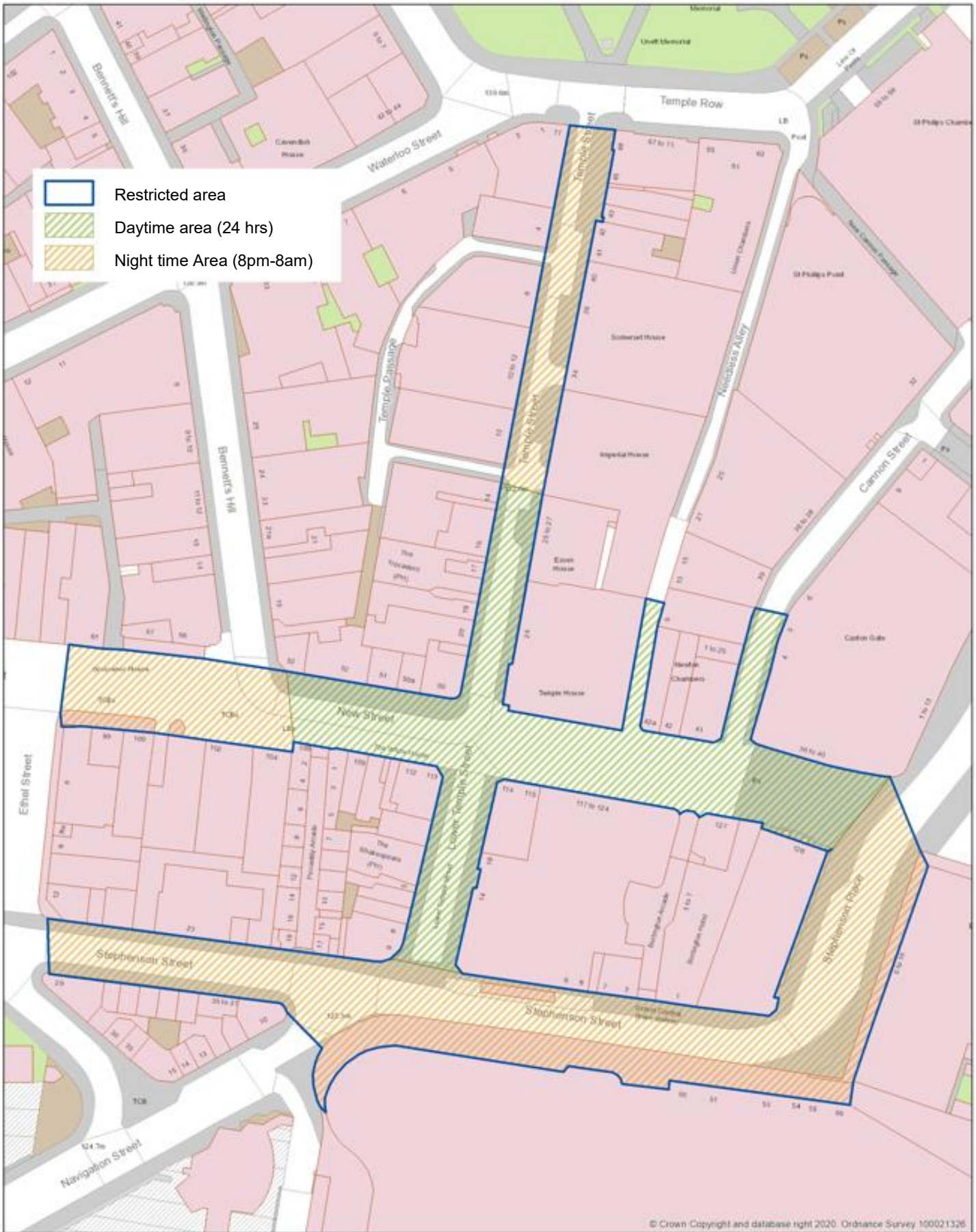
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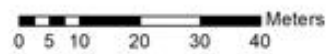

1 Executive Summary

1.1 This report provides an update on the work of the Regulation and Enforcement Division and City Operations Directorate, in partnership with West Midlands Police, to tackle illegal street trading and other related offences on Coventry Road, Birmingham during the month of Ramadan.

2 Recommendation(s)

2.1 The report be noted.

3 Background

3.1 During Ramadan in 2023, illegal street stalls selling hot food and other merchandise were set up on Coventry Road, Small Heath, without obtaining the requisite permits and authorisations. These stalls acted like a market and became a focal point for anti-social behaviour due to the large number of people and vehicles visiting the "market".

3.2 Local Councillors, community leaders and citizens voiced their concerns that the trading activities were not authorised or regulated, and that, through social media, the location had become an attraction for anti-social behaviour and high footfall that could not be controlled. They were very vocal in highlighting the need for

enforcement authorities to tackle anti-social behaviour and illegal street trading and asked that the authorities take action.

- 3.3 Whilst West Midlands Police and Birmingham City Council had carried out engagement and intervention on specific streets in Birmingham over the period of Ramadan for a considerable number of years, the magnitude of issues arising on Coventry Road in 2023 were significant.
- 3.4 The Council and Police carried out interventions on Coventry Road during Ramadan 2023, however, they were met with significant anti-social behaviour that was broadcast through social and traditional media. Enforcement action could not be taken safely at the time of the interventions but was taken afterwards in the form of a number of arrests.
- 3.5 Local Members, residents and community leaders felt a different, more robust and co-ordinated response was needed during Ramadan 2024.

4. **Operation Belfray**

- 4.1 As consequence, Birmingham City Council (Regulation and Enforcement, Community Safety, Parking Enforcement, Highways) and West Midlands Police worked to develop a joint strategic and operational plan in advance of Ramadan in 2024. This joint action plan was produced and executed under the name of "Operation Belfray". Trading Standards led this plan on behalf of Birmingham City Council. The attached presentation provides an overview of the activities and results of this plan. (see appendix 1). A summary of results is shown below:
- 1412 Penalty Charge Notices (PCN) issued
 - 1238 vehicles moved on
 - 6 vehicles seized by Police
 - One trailer seized by BCC, two towed off the highway.
 - One arrest made for illegal street trading, bail conditions applied
 - One voluntary interview arranged – Street Trading
 - Two Street Trading Licences issued
 - Counterfeit items seized
 - Other items seized that were in breach of food/labelling legislation, including abandoned food (public health concern)
- 4.3 Community leaders and the Cabinet Member for Social Justice Community Safety and Equalities joined patrols to experience first-hand the issues faced by officers and to show local support for the action plan and to observe its delivery.
- 4.4 The feedback from community and religious leaders, has been overwhelmingly positive. The number of complaints to the Council about activities over Ramadan 2024 reduced significantly from previous years.

4.5 The planning and joint actions between the Police and Council for the illegal street trading on Coventry Road has created a blueprint for other joint interventions going forward.

5. Other options considered

5.1 Birmingham City Council and West Midlands Police considered an engagement only approach, as used in previous years, but felt this was inappropriate given the increasing scale of the activities year on year and the potential for criminality and public disorder.

6. Legal Implications

6.1 Officers acted within their authorisations for specific legislation and in compliance with Regulation and Enforcement's Enforcement Policy.

7. Financial Implications

7.1 The report provides an update on Operation Belfray – this was carried out within existing service budgets.

8. Public Sector Equality Duty

8.1 Birmingham City Council seeks to support all religious groups to observe and celebrate their religion safely within the city and in compliance with the relevant legislation. The activities of Operation Belfray supported this aim.

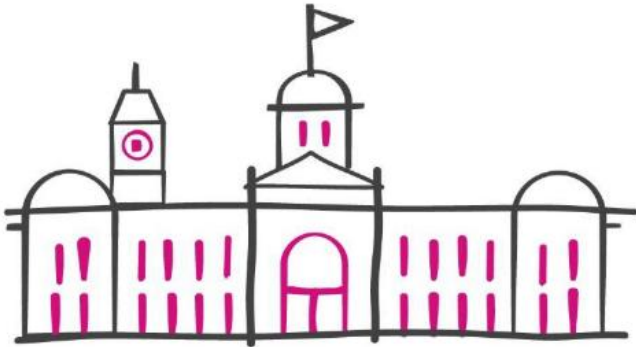

11th March to 9th April 2024



Planning

- Following recommendations from the previous year, Police and BCC began planning for Operation Belfray in September 2023.
- Weekly meetings were held with BCC and Police. Joint objectives were agreed.
- Weekly meetings were also held with BCC, Police and Community Members including BCC Councillors.
- Discussions around the development of the plan and community concerns were discussed in detail.

BCC Aims & Objectives

- To continue to work in partnership with police colleagues and the local community to ensure residents and worshippers across the city can observe Ramadan in peace and safety.
 - **Community Engagement** – working closely with the community by liaising with councillors, key community members and traders/businesses.
 - **Partnership Working** - To take a collaborative approach with relevant partners to ensure the community is able to come together and mark the month of Ramadan in a safe environment.
 - **To provide a robust service to the community we serve.** Adopted from policing objective, this includes **Engaging** with the Community, **Educating** the Community, **Encouraging** to stop any non-compliance, and where necessary, **Enforcing** appropriate legislation and taking appropriate action.

Resource – Coventry Road (Ramadan)

- Police – an appropriate and robust number of Sergeants and Police Officers to cover every day of Ramadan with increased presence and availability at weekends.
- BCC – an appropriate and robust number of officers which was adapted as activities and times of illegal activities changed (inc. Bank Holidays)
- BCC Resource including Trading Standards, Environmental Health, Licensing (Street trading), Private Sector Licensing, Community Safety Partnerships ASB Officers, Highways, Parking Enforcement and Waste Management
- Each TOD consisted of one Head of Service and at least one Operations Manager.
- On average, 10 BCC officers were out each night including Parking Enforcement.

Resource – Chaand Raat

- Area covered: Alum Rock Road, Coventry Road and Ladypool Road
- 34 BCC staff deployed including 2 x Heads of Service and 3 x Operational Managers.
- West Midlands Police ensured there were Sgts and multiple Police officers at each location.

Method Adopted

- BCC staff to attend BCC briefing followed by briefing with West Midlands Police
- BCC staff to work alongside Police at all times
- Advise and engage with traders. Moving henna artist to one location where available, keeping the highway clear.
- Non-compliant Traders – gathering evidence.
- Evidence including photographs, videos and Police support via PNC checks/ local officer knowledge.
- Take enforcement action as appropriate, seize goods if necessary, immediate and retrospective action.

Review – Throughout the month

- Daily written update between BCC and Police
- Twice weekly or daily meeting between police and BCC strategic leads to alter plans if necessary.
- Communications before and during Operation Belfray to advise wider community of plans.
- Monitoring social media to understand community feeling.
- Weekly meeting with Police and BCC Head of Service/Ops Managers to review objectives and discuss best practice
- Weekly meeting with Police, BCC and Community Members – positive feedback to discuss any concerns raised. Ongoing media interest , interviews and briefings.
- Briefing held with Senior Officers and BCC Councilors
- Initial tour of duty for BCC staff – 1500 x 2300 hours (1 week)

Review – Throughout the month (continued)

- Reviewed and based on new intel/evidence
- Tour of duty changed to 2000 x 0100 hours
- Invites to community and religious leaders to join the patrols to evidence the impacts.

Results

- 1412 PCN's issued
- 1238 vehicles moved on
- 6 vehicles seized by Police
- One trailer seized by BCC, two towed off the highway.
- One Arrest made for Street Trading, Bail conditions applied
- One Voluntary Interview arranged – Street Trading
- Two Street Trading Licences issued
- Counterfeit items seized
- Other items seized that were in breach of food/labelling legislation including abandoned food (public health concern)

Results (continued)

- A number of illegal traders stopped and moved on for failing to have the requisite authority or permits to trade.
- Hot food sellers stopped from trading due to obstructing the Highway, Health and Safety grounds and poor food management and hygiene issues.
- A number of traders stopped from trading due to contravening licensing legislation by serving hot food/drinks after 11pm without appropriate consent.

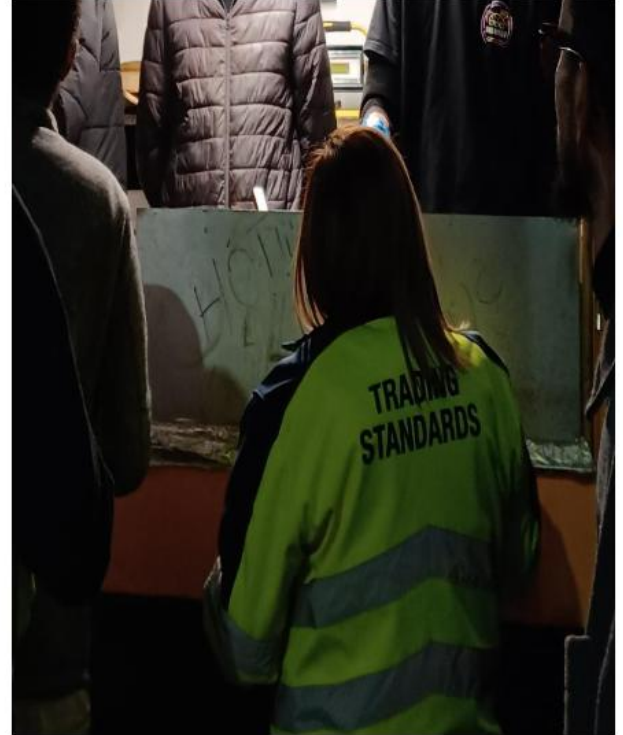

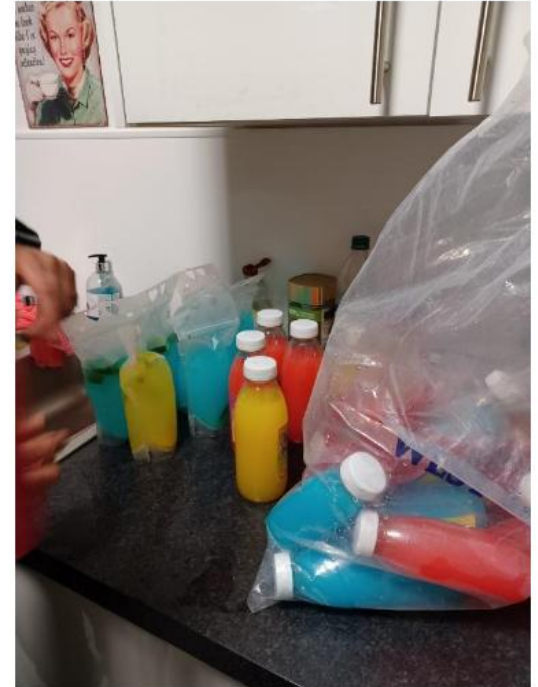

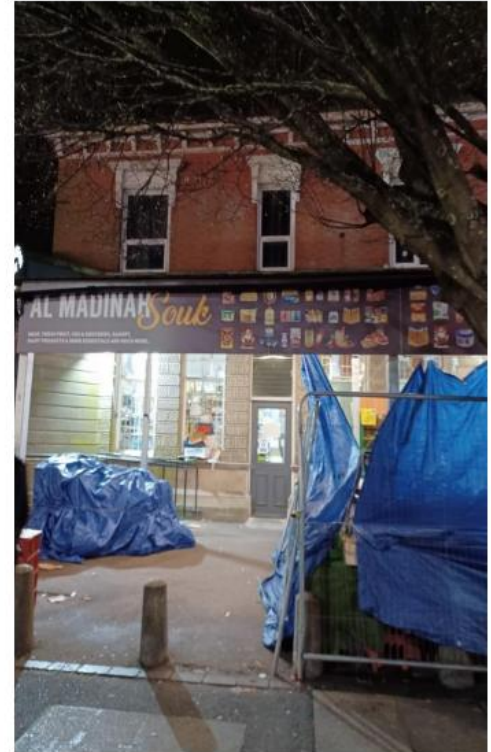

1 Executive Summary

1.1 This report provides an update to the Review of Licensing and Public Protection Fees and Charges 2024/25 report dated 17 January 2024.

2 Recommendation(s)

2.1 That the report is for information only and is to be noted.

3 Background

3.1 There are several fees and charges applied by the Register Office that are governed by statute and hence may not be changed except by legislation.

3.2 There was a general statement in the report referred to in section 1.1 that the General Register Office (GRO) had given an indication that a review of the statutory fees was due to take place.

4 Update

4.1 GRO advises that legislation was laid on 20 March 2024 that set out amendments to the Immigration and Nationality Fees Regulations 2018.

4.2 The Immigration, Nationality and Passport (Fees) (Amendment) Regulations 2024 revised fees for a number of Home Office services including for the Citizenship ceremony provided by the local registration service, and following completion of the parliamentary process, came into force on 10 April 2024.

4.3 The fee for the arrangement of a citizenship ceremony by the local registration service will increase from £80 to £130.

- 4.4 Applications to become a British citizen include the fee for the Local Registration Service to arrange a citizenship ceremony.
- 4.5 The GRO clarified on 10 April 2024 that applications made before 10 April 2024 will be subject to the £80 fee. All applications made to the Home Office to become a British citizen from this date will attract the £130 fee.
- 4.6 The fee is paid to the Local Authority once the citizenship ceremony has been held.

5 Financial Implications

- 5.1 The increase in the statutory fee for citizenship ceremonies represents an increase in income for 2024/25, if the number of ceremonies remains the same.
- 5.2 There is no timeframe from when an application is received by the Home Office to when and if citizenship is granted. Upon receipt of notification that citizenship has been granted however the statutory citizenship ceremony must take place within three months.
- 5.3 Assuming that approximately 75% of approved new British citizens who attend a citizenship ceremony in 2024-25 will have paid the increased fee, an additional £187,500 of income will be received.

6 Public Sector Equality Duty

- 6.1 This is a statutory fee and there are no specific implications identified.

Fees in connection with nationality applications or services

On 20 March, Circular 05/2024 explained that amending regulations to The Immigration and Nationality Fees Regulations 2018 had been laid and were expected to come into force on 10 April 2024. This Alert is to confirm that the changes have now gone live. In summary, the regulations make changes to a number of fees for Home Office services including the fee for the arrangement of a citizenship ceremony by the local registration service (LRS), which will increase from £80 to £130.

A previous Alert, issued on 30/10/2023, stated that registrars would be able to administer the British Overseas Territory Citizenship (BOTC) oath and pledge at a citizenship ceremony in England and Wales from 8 November 2023 but, at that point, interim arrangements were to continue. This Alert confirms that the interim arrangements have now ended and registrars can administer both the BOTC and British Citizenship oaths and pledges, where required, at a citizenship ceremony. Note: Applications for citizenship made before 10 April 2024 are subject to the current £80 fee payable to the LRS.

The Citizenship Ceremonies Handbook has been amended to reflect the changes which also includes additional guidance relating to the BOTC oath and pledge and issue of the certificate - Citizenship ceremonies handbook | GRO Registrars website (gro-extranet.homeoffice.gov.uk)

Executive Summary

1.1 This report summarises the outcome of legal proceedings taken by Regulation and Enforcement during the months of January and February 2024.

Recommendation(s)

2.1 That the report be noted.

Background

3.1 The Enforcement Policy that underpins the work identified in this report is approved by your Committee. The Policy ensures compliance with legislation, codes of practice and legal guidance. Any enforcement action[s] described in this report have been subject to adherence with that Enforcement Policy.

Results

4.1 During the months of January and February 2024, the following cases were heard at Birmingham Magistrates' Court, unless otherwise stated:

- 416 Environmental Health cases were finalised resulting in fines of £172,707. Prosecution costs of £69,191.46 were awarded.
- Six Licensing cases were finalised resulting in fines of £3,146. Prosecution costs of £5,643 were awarded together with a 6 month disqualification from driving, 7 penalty points and compensation in the sum of £50.
- Two Trading Standards cases were finalised resulting in a 12 month custodial sentence and a fine of £6,000. Prosecution costs of £2,405 were awarded.
- Four Waste Enforcement cases were finalised resulting in fines of £2,520. Prosecution costs of £4,863.50 were awarded.

5 Legal Implications

5.1 There are no legal implications in relation to this report.

5.2 Legal Services are a key partner and are involved in the matters listed above and ongoing matters, providing advice, support and presenting matters at court. When a decision is made to institute proceedings, Legal Services provide oversight, case management and expert legal support to ensure cases are progressed and that many necessary legal input is provided in a timely manner.

6 Financial Implications

6.1 Costs incurred in investigating and preparing prosecutions, including officers' time, the professional fees of expert witnesses etc. are recorded as prosecution costs. Arrangements have been made with the Magistrates' Court for any costs awarded to be reimbursed to the City Council. Actual receipt of awarded costs depends on payment plan timing as agreed through the Courts and could cover several years. Monies paid in respect of fines are paid to the Treasury.

6.2 For the year April 2023 to March 2024 the following costs have been requested and awarded:

Environmental Health (including Waste Enforcement cases)

£347,803.71 has been requested with £274,544.26 awarded (79%)

Licensing

£23,332.45 has been requested with £14,847.60 being awarded (64%)

Trading Standards

£49,012.75 has been requested with £28,649 being awarded (58%)

6.3 For the months of January and February 2024 the following costs have been requested and awarded:

Environmental Health (including Waste Enforcement cases)
£100,624.81 has been requested with £74,054.96 awarded (73%)

Licensing
£7,885 has been requested with £5,643 awarded (71%).

Trading Standards
£11,237 has been requested with £2,405 awarded (21%)

1 Executive Summary

1.1 This report advises your committee of actions taken by senior licensing officers, under authority delegated by the Licensing & Public Protection Committee, with an explanation as to why delegated authority was used in each case.

2 Recommendation(s)

2.1 The report to be noted.

3 Background

3.1 On 16 March 2007 Section 52 of the Road Safety Act 2006 came into force. This has had the effect of enabling a licensing authority to suspend or revoke a hackney carriage or private hire driver's licence with immediate effect – meaning that the suspension or revocation takes effect immediately once notice of the authority's decision has been given to the driver – where this decision is considered necessary in the interests of public safety.

4 Options considered and Recommended Proposal

Summary of Action Taken, February and March 2024

4.1 On 7 February 2024, information was supplied by West Midlands Police, with

respect to a Birmingham licensed private hire driver, identified here as O. The driver O was identified as a suspect in a serious robbery where offenders had been operating as a fake taxi service. The victim was allegedly drugged and placed in the back of a vehicle, having sustained a number of injuries. He was later ejected from the vehicle and the driver left with the victim's mobile phone. The victim later received notification his bank account had been accessed and payments made to the value of £1000.

- 4.2 The matter was referred to a senior officer, acting under authority from your committee. Having taken account of the serious nature of the allegation, the officer determined to revoke O's private hire driver's licence with immediate effect, in the interest of public safety. The revocation notice was prepared for dispatch on 7 February 2024. O's badge was recovered from his vehicle, which was still being held by West Midlands Police, and returned by PC Greg Ward, the Police Taxi Liaison Officer, on 9 February 2024.
- 4.3 On 19 February 2024, information supplied by Solihull Metropolitan Borough Council, was submitted for consideration by a senior officer acting under delegated authority, from your committee. The information supplied confirmed a Birmingham licensed private hire driver, identified here as P, had, had his Solihull private hire driver's licence revoked in February 2020, following an allegation of sexual assault against a fare paying passenger.
- 4.4 The matter came to light because of a Licensing Enforcement Team investigation into an allegation of inappropriate behaviour on the part of the driver, made just one month after the grant of P's licence.
- 4.5 In April 2023, P had declared on his licence application that he had never had a licence refused or revoked. However, the enforcement officer received information suggesting the allegation may not have been an isolated incident. This was confirmed when she contacted Licensing at Solihull MBC. Concerned this information indicated a worrying pattern of behaviour, the enforcement officer referred the matter to a senior officer, who after careful consideration of the information supplied, revoked P's licence with immediate effect in the interest of public safety.
- 4.6 On 13 March 2024, information was supplied by West Midlands Police, indicating a Birmingham licensed private hire driver, identified here as Q, had been arrested on 10 March 2023 on suspicion of rape. The female victim was understood to be a passenger.

4.7 The matter was referred to a senior officer acting under authority delegated by your committee. After careful consideration of the circumstances, the officer determined to revoke Q's private hire driver's licence with immediate effect, in the interest of public safety. The revocation notice was delivered in person, by PC Greg Ward, Police Taxi Liaison Officer.

5 Legal Implications

5.1 Any action to suspend or revoke a licence can be appealed via the Magistrate's Court. Where an appeal is lodged, the Licensing Authority will be required to defend the Panel decision.

6 Financial Implications

6.1 Legal costs incurred through an appeal are funded within the ring-fenced Licensing Service budget. Legal Services will seek to recover costs whenever an appellant is unsuccessful. The decision to award costs, the amount involved and payment timing, is at the discretion of the Court.

6.2 No issues have been identified. The actions referred to above were necessarily undertaken in the course of fulfilling a statutory duty.

7 Other Implications

7.1 How are the recommended decisions consistent with the City Council's priorities, plans and strategies?

7.2 The work detailed in this report contributes to the outcome 'A Bold Safe Birmingham': through delivering against the priorities of "make the city safer", and "protect and safeguard vulnerable citizens".
