MATTERS DISCUSSED AT THE MEETING INCLUDING LOCAL CONCERNS:

Local Policing:

Inspector Glynis Tomlinson advised the audience of key local police issue including car crime, burglary and aggressive begging. A police task force has been recently successful in recovering 1000 cars that had been stolen and a number of key arrests have been carried out. Although crime in Sutton Coldfield is markedly reducing the perception of crime is one of concern. The general feeling from the audience was that the local newspaper should be persuaded to look at some of the more positive news stories in Sutton.

The Inspector stressed the need to be vigilant i.e. local cars and windows and to potentially invest in steering locks.

Goldlieslie Road – Number of Inconsiderate parking issues in the area.

New Community Watch set up on Kempson Avenue

Planning Issues

Wylde Green Public House – The owners have sold the site. A local brochure from the new owners Adlington titled – ‘Consultation Proposed Apartments with Care’ states: “The proposed development includes one, two and three bedroom apartments, all with fully fitted kitchens with integrated appliances, some with en-suite shower rooms and most with a patio or walk-on balcony. With the developers anticipating to start in August

Local feeling was strongly opposed to the development and the audience were advised to each separately register their concern to the Planning Committee at the appropriate time.

ACTION – COUNCILLOR YIP to circulate a leaflet to the local area when the planning consultation is confirmed.

Nat West Bank – current proposal for a tanning salon and barber shop

Penns Lane – Birmingham City Council looking at the notion of a Compulsory Purchase Order for the disused land.
