


- December 2017 Birmingham confirmed as 2022 Host City

Context




- An area of growth identified in the Birmingham Development Plan







Infrastructure Interventions



- poor public realm
- no surface level crossings
- lack of identity
- under utilised sites
- buildings in poor condition

Birchfield Island



- lack of presence
- unattractive gateway
- poor streetscape
- narrow footway

Perry Barr Station

- At least 300 apprenticeship opportunities working with tier 1 contractors to exceed this
- Drafted a Jobs & Skills Strategy
- More than 3,000 jobs on site during the construction of the Village
- Drafted Social Value Charter with Procurement
- Construction phase engagement for Athletes Village and Stadium through Procurement and Planning
- CITB Construction Skills Fund Application for an on-site training facility to support 650 new entrants into construction related training, work experience, jobs and apprenticeships
- Commercial units on site creating 160 jobs in legacy

Jobs and Skills

- December 2017 Games awarded
- March 2018 LRF funding secured facilitating early acquisitions
- Spring 2018 All land required for phase 1 residential area assembled
- June 2018 Authority to make CPO granted by Cabinet
- June 2018 Demolition on site commenced
- August 2018 HIF funding application submitted
- August 2018 Phase 1 planning application submitted
- October 2018 HIF funding approval granted

Achievements to Date

- October 2018 CPO Order to be made
- November 2018 Report to Cabinet Acceptance of HIF funding and appointment of main construction contractor
- Winter 2018 Outline planning application for phase 2 legacy development plans
- February 2019 Phase 1 construction commences
- December 2021 Handover of Village to the OC for the Games
- July 2022 Commonwealth Games

Next Steps

- Engagement with the CGFP and Games Partners regarding the development of the 'Games Time Village'
- Engagement with CGA's regarding the development of the Village and site visits
- Engagement with local communities and key stakeholders re Village plans
- Engagement with neighbours adjacent to the site
- Cross integration of programme plans e.g. SPRINT, station works, highways works and new school
- Regular updates to Corporate Boards and Steering Groups

Ongoing Activity
