Review application received on 9<sup>th</sup> October 2017 from the Chief Inspector of Weights and Measures in respect the premises at 9 Faraday Avenue, Quinton, Birmingham, B32 1JP.

Representations have been received from two Responsible Authorities.

# 4. Compliance Issues:

# 4.1 Consistency with relevant Council Policies, Plans or Strategies:

The report complies with the City Council's Statement of Licensing Policy and the Council's Corporate Plan to improve the standard of all licensed persons, premises and vehicles in the City.

# 5. Relevant background/chronology of key events:

The Chief Officer of Weights and Measures applied on 9<sup>th</sup> October 2017 for a review of the Premises Licence under Section 51 of the Licensing Act 2003 for the premises at 9 Faraday Avenue, Quinton, Birmingham, B32 1JP.

Representations have been received from West Midlands Police and Birmingham City Council Licensing Enforcement, as responsible authorities, which are attached at Appendices 1 & 2.

Review application is attached, see Appendix 3.

The Premises Licence is attached at Appendix 4.

Site location plans are attached at Appendix 5.

When carrying out its licensing functions, a licensing authority must have regard to Birmingham City Council's Statement of Licensing Policy and the Guidance issued by the Secretary of State under s182 of the Licensing Act 2003.

The Licensing Authority is also required to take such steps as it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives, which are: -

- a. The prevention of crime and disorder;
- b. Public safety;

Dear Licensing,

West Midlands Police have received and reviewed the application made by Birmingham City Council Trading Standards for the review of Just Drinks, 9 Faraday Avenue, Quinton, B32 1JP.

West Midlands Police wish to join in this review application on the grounds of the prevention of crime and disorder, public safety and the protection of children from harm.

Just on the facts alone from the review application West Midlands Police have grave concerns around the running of these premises. The test purchase conducted by BCC Trading standards shows that there is no control of these premises and that they are prepared to sell alcohol to a minor just so that they can make more money.

There is no justification for selling alcohol to a minor and so West Midlands Police can only conclude that it is being done for the sole purpose of making more money.

These premises are not unknown to West Midlands Police, with intelligence stemming from 2015 through to present day, that the premises are involved in the sale of single cigarettes and alcohol to persons under the age of 18. The result of the test purchase gives some credence to this intelligence, and indicates that this is common practice, and not just a one off.

On the 20<sup>th</sup> August 2015 officers from West Midlands Police witnessed a female leaving the premises with alcohol in a bag, when she was challenged she was found to be 16 years of age. The staff member from the premises was challenged and admitted selling alcohol to the girl without asking for identification. The seller who it is believed to be the brother in law of the owner was issued with a fixed penalty notice

West Midlands Police are also very concerned around the responses of the Premise Licence Holder and DPS for this venue. During her interview the Premise Licence Holder showed a complete disregard to the licensing objectives and is clearly being used by others to be the front of this business when in fact it is run, managed and controlled by the licence holders husband and brother in law.

On these grounds West Midlands Police wish to join in the review and fully support BCC Trading Standards and also that the premise licence should be revoked. This is backed by the Sec 182 guidance, section 11.27 details a list of crimes that should be treated particularly seriously, one of the listed offences is "for the illegal purchase and consumption of alcohol by minors which impacts on the health, educational attainment, employment prospects and propensity for crime of young people".

Section 11.28 goes further that were reviews are used for these offences that the licensing committee are expected to consider the revocation of the premise licence even for the first instance.

We would appreciate if you will add these representations to the review application

# 3d) Committee conditions to promote the prevention of public nuisance

CCTV cameras at the back and front of the premises together with two inside to cover the till area and the shop as a whole shall be installed and operated at the premises; footage from CCTV shall be kept for a period of 28 days and be made available to responsible authorities on request.

An incident book shall be kept at the premises and made available to responsible authorities on request.

#### 3e) Committee condition to promote the protection of children from harm

A challenge 25 policy shall be operated at the premises.

Signage shall be displayed at the premises advising of the challenge 25 policy.

A refusals book shall be kept at the premises and made available to responsible authorities on request.

#### **Background Information**

In March 2017 the Trading Standards Team received intelligence from West Midlands Police indicating persons working at the premises were selling cigarettes and alcohol to persons under the age of 18.

In April 2017 Officers from Trading Standards and West Midlands Police made a joint visit to the premises. The premises licence holder and designated premises supervisor Miss Shaughnessy was issued with an advisory notice.

On the 28<sup>th</sup> July 2017 the Trading Standards carried out a test purchase at the premises and alcohol was sold to a child.

## Guidance issued under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003

#### Review of a premises licence following persistent sales of alcohol to children

- 11.27 There is certain criminal activity that may arise in connection with licensed premises which should be treated particularly seriously. These are the use of the licensed premises:
  - for the illegal purchase and consumption of alcohol by minors which impacts on the health, educational attainment, employment prospects and propensity for crime of young people;
- 11.28 It is envisaged that licensing authorities, the police, the Home Office (Immigration Enforcement) and other law enforcement agencies, which are responsible authorities, will use the review procedures effectively to deter such activities and crime. Where reviews arise and the licensing authority determines that the crime prevention objective is being undermined through the premises being used to further crimes, it is expected that revocation of the licence even in the first instance should be seriously considered.

11.30 Where persistent sales of alcohol to children have occurred at premises, responsible authorities should consider applying for a review of the licence, whether there has been a prosecution for the offence under section 147A or a closure notice has been given under section 169A of the 2003 Act. In determining the review, the licensing authority should consider revoking the licence if it considers this outcome is appropriate. Responsible authorities should consider taking steps to ensure that a review of the licence is routine in these circumstances.

# The Birmingham City Council Statement of Licensing Policy states:-

#### 21.15 Sale of Alcohol to Children

- 21.15.1 The Council considers that the sale of alcohol to children, or supply of alcohol in the case of a club, is a particularly serious offence.
- 21.15.2 There has been considerable research on the detrimental impact in areas where alcohol is accessed by children, in particular with regard to health, crime and disorder and anti-social behaviour. The Council, therefore, expects all licence holders to set out in their operating schedules the measures and management controls in place to prevent alcohol being sold or served to children (other than in the limited circumstances permitted under the Act) and to demonstrate all reasonable precautions and due diligence to prevent sales to under age persons whilst trading.
- 21.15.3 The Council considers that 'Challenge 25' policies, where the individual attempting to purchase alcohol must prove he/she is 18 or over if he/she appears to be under 25, are in many circumstances an effective way of preventing the sale of alcohol to children.
- 21.15.4 The Council expects licensed premises to embrace this initiative and premises licensed for the sale or supply of alcohol, particularly off-sales, to display prominent signage informing customers that it is an offence to sell 41 or allow the sale of alcohol to children, to buy or attempt to buy it on a child's behalf, and for children to buy or attempt to buy it themselves.
- 21.15.5 Where the Council is required to review a licence due to the sale of alcohol to children the presumption will be for the licensee to demonstrate what systems were in place to try and prevent the situation arising.
- 21.15.6 If the Licensing Sub-Committee is not persuaded that appropriate, reasonable steps were taken by the licensee then the committee will take action to ensure the licensing objectives are promoted and may suspend or even revoke the licence of the premises licence holder or remove the designated premises supervisor.

## Licensing Enforcement Team Recommendations to the Licensing Committee

As a Licensing Authority Birmingham City Council must carry out its licensing functions with a view to promoting the licensing objectives contained in the Act and in line with its Licensing Policy. Both the Act and the Birmingham City Council Licensing Policy stress the importance which must be given to the protection of children and young persons from the harms of alcohol.

Unfortunately when children and young person's consume alcohol it can result in risk-taking behaviour, aggression and injury and can require urgent medical attention. It can also result in children and young people being left vulnerable to exploitation and the influences, or pressures of others.

The premises licence granted to Miss Shaughnessy already has a condition attached as the result of a previous committee hearing requiring her to operate a Challenge 25 age verification policy to prevent sales of alcohol to children and young persons under the age of 18.

Had this policy been applied correctly there should never have been an occasions when alcohol was sold to a person under 18.

Comments made by Miss Shaughnessy in interview indicate she was aware of issues with a family member serving underage people, yet she failed to take any meaningful steps to prevent this.

This is a family business and when considering all the factors and circumstances the Licensing Enforcement Team does not consider further conditions applied to the premises licence would be effective in preventing further sales of alcohol to children and young persons.

Miss Shaughnessy and her family members have demonstrated a total lack of social responsibility and social conscience in relation to the sales of alcohol and the Licensing Enforcement Team has no hesitation in recommending the Licensing Committee consider the revocation of this premises licence on the grounds of:-

- · Crime and Disorder;
- · Public Safety; and
- · Protection of Children from Harm.

In March 2017 Birmingham Trading Standards received intelligence from the Bartley Green Neighbourhood Police team that a shop known as Just Drinks, 9 Faraday Avenue, Quinton, Birmingham, B32 1JP was selling cigarettes and alcohol to persons under the age of 18.

It is an offence to sell cigarettes and alcohol to persons under 18 years of age.

Consequently a visit was made to the shop on 4<sup>th</sup> April 2017 by Trading Standards Enforcement Officer Paul Elison and police officers from the local neighbourhood team. On this visit officer Elison issued an advice notice to Miss Clair Shaughnessy who was the DPS and Premise Licence holder for the shop. The notice stated amongst other things; "This department has received information that tobacco and alcohol have been supplied to persons under 18yrs old. This must cease. TSO/police use child volunteers to test purchase such items your premises will be selected"; Miss Shaughnessy signed for this and was given a copy and said she would be more vigilant in future.

On 28<sup>th</sup> July 2017 Trading Standards were undertaking a test purchase exercise with a 14yr old female volunteer.

At approximately 11.10 a.m. the volunteer went into Just Drinks. Trading Standards Officer Martin Williams followed a few paces behind in order to witness what occurred.

The volunteer went to the rear of the shop picked up a 275ml bottle of 4% alcohol WKD Blue vodka drink and took it to the counter. Here she presented it to a middle aged woman who was sitting behind the counter. The woman did not ask her age or ask for any identification but just said; "80p please".

The volunteer paid her then left the premises with the bottle of alcohol.

A few minutes later Officer Williams returned to the shop with local police officers and spoke to the same woman behind the counter, she gave her name as Denise Shaughnessy and said she was the mother of the Premise Licence holder and DPS Clair Shaughnessy. She admitted she had sold the alcohol to the young volunteer and had not asked her age or for any ID.

At this point Clair Shaughnessy arrived and Officer Williams explained to them both that the sale could constitute and offence under the Licensing Act 2003 and that the facts would be reported. Clair Shaughnessy was issued with a trader's notice to this effect which she duly signed.

On 25<sup>th</sup> August 2017 Officer Williams formally interviewed both women about the events of 28<sup>th</sup> July 2017. The interviews were conducted under caution in accordance with The Police and Criminal Evidence Act 1984. Both women were interviewed separately.

In the interview with Clair Shaughnessy a few issues were raised that were of concern to officer Williams:

- She said that although she was Premises Licence holder and DPS she had not spent much
  time in the shop recently. Other than her mother her husband Najim Saqib worked in the
  shop along with his brother. She did not know how to pronounce his full name but
  thought it was something like Janghir Ali.
- She said this man was in the shop from when her mother leaves at 12/12.30 till the shop closes around 10.30pm. She then said; "and then my other half normally goes down about 8 o'clock till close. Course I don't really go down there anymore now"
- She said that the business was all in her name completely including the bank account.

- She said; "I'm everything but I didn't want it was his idea Naj's idea but he says, "I
  don't want nothing in my name. I want everything in your name."
- She went on to say that she had told her husband's brother many times to stop serving
  products to underage people that they should not have as he was the main person that did
  it. She did not think her husband or his brother listened to her warnings.
- It also appeared that they were not using a refusals book even though she had asked them to.
- She said she had threatened to transfer the licence into her husband's name to avoid her getting into trouble but he did not want her to.
- At the end of the interview when she was asked if she wanted to say anything she said;
   "if anything comes of it just take my licence off me because I don't want to no more,
   I've had enough."

When Denise Shaughnessy, the seller of the alcohol was interviewed she said she had only been serving in the shop for no-more than 6 weeks and had no previous experience selling in any shops before let alone serving alcohol to young people. She said that her daughter had told her not to serve to underage people but nothing was ever put in writing.

This does appear to show that she was not trained properly or should have been left in charge in the shop on her own with little or no experience.

Please provide as much information as possible to support the application (please read guidance note 3)

Following the comments made by Clair Shaughnessy it is felt that this shop is not under the proper control of the DPS and Premises Licence holder as she appears to have little control of the other family members, namely her husband and his brother who appear to spend most of the time in the shop. However on this occasion the sale was actually made by her mother.

She has said that she has tried to control their actions but it appears to no avail.

This shop has had a history of complaints made against it for selling tobacco and alcohol to minors and it is felt that nothing other than revoking the alcohol licence will put a stop to this.

The premises had received more than fair warning on 4<sup>th</sup> April 2017 that an underage test purchase would be made in the near future.

The recent previous history of shop is as follows;

In April 2014 a complaint came from Crimestoppers that the shop was selling counterfeit cigarettes, split packs for teenagers and sold alcohol to children under 18. A visit made by Trading Standards later in the year was undertaken where 12 packs of illicit cigarettes and 5 bottles of illicit vodka were found in the shop. A warning letter was issued to Clair Shaughnessy on this occasion due to it being the first offence.

In January 2016 a complaint was received that amongst other things the shop was selling single cigarettes and alcohol to people who are underage. A follow up visit was made to the shop by Trading Standards on 25<sup>th</sup> February 2016 where advice and a warning about these practices was given by the visiting officer.

On 31<sup>st</sup> May 2016 Trading Standards received a complaint from a woman who said that her 17 year old daughter had been sold Smirnoff ice alcohol by a man from the shop who told her to hide it in her bag. She also said they were serving cigarettes to underage children. A follow up visit was made to the shop by Trading Standards officers on 9<sup>th</sup> June 2016 where another trader's notice warning was issued, this time to Mr Ali who was serving in the shop.

In view of this sale and previous history it is considered appropriate to seek a review of the licence with a recommendation that it be revoked. Selling alcohol to children is a very serious matter and is in breach of the licensing objectives. It is a criminal offence. Equally being found in possession of illicit goods is also a criminal matter and dealing in such goods brings crime into neighbourhoods and could also have an impact on the purchasers health as dealing in illicit goods, without knowing the provenance could result in unsafe products being supplied.

No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence (a) at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or (b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.

Every retail sale or supply of alcohol made under this licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol. The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy. The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either— (a) a holographic mark, or (b) an ultraviolet feature.

The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and a holographic mark.

(1) A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price. (2) In this condition:- (a) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula  $P = D + (D \times V)$ , where (i) P is the permitted price, (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and (iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol; (b) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979; (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence— (i) the holder of the premises licence, (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence; (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994. (3) Where the permitted price would not be a whole number of pennies, the permitted price shall be taken to be the price rounded up to the nearest penny. (4) Where the permitted price on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax, the permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.






My letter is to ask you to decline the application for a License at Suras OFF License so that they are not allowed to sail alcohol at right please.

All persons involved in the sale of alcohol will receive initial and subsequent 6 monthly refresher training by the Designated Premises Supervisor or an appropriately accredited training provider with regards to the law in relation to the sale of alcohol. This will be recorded in a staff training register and will include, signature of the member of staff the DPS or an appropriately accredited training provider together with the date.
- 9. At any time when there is no Personal License holder on the premises there must be at least one member of staff on duty inside the premise who has been authorised by the DPS. Any such person should have seen, read and be fully aware of the conditions of the premise licence and take all steps to ensure that such conditions are adhered to whilst they have responsibility for the premise.
- 10. A record should be kept detailing, the name and address relative to the person left in charge of the premise and the times and dates when the authority to cover exists, in writing.
- 11. These should be individual entries covering short periods of time only and should not exceed more than a three week period.
- 12. The authorised person should also sign on each occasion that he/she has physically seen inspected and is fully aware of all the conditions attached to the premise licence. The DPS should sign to acknowledge that they agree to the authorised person being in charge of the premise for any times specified. The records of these matters should be kept fully updated at all times.
- All Records shall be retained at the premises for a period of no less than 12 months and made available to responsible authorities on request.

If a customer appears to be under 25 years of age and cannot prove that they are eligible to purchase the age restricted item with a valid UK or Ireland Photocard Driving Licence, a valid Passport or PASS accredited proof of age scheme card, they will be refused service. NOTES ON DEMONSTRATING ENTITLEMENT TO WORK IN THE UK

# Entitlement to work/immigration status for individual applicants and applications from partnerships which are not limited liability partnerships:

A licence may not be held by an individual or an individual in a partnership who is resident in the UK who:

- does not have the right to live and work in the UK; or
- is subject to a condition preventing him or her from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity.

Any premises licence issued in respect of an application made on or after 6 April 2017 will become invalid if the holder ceases to be entitled to work in the UK.

Applicants must demonstrate that they have an entitlement to work in the UK and are not subject to a condition preventing them from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity. They do this by providing with this application copies or scanned copies of the following documents (which do not need to be certified).

#### Documents which demonstrate entitlement to work in the UK

- An expired or current passport showing the holder, or a person named in the passport as the child of the holder, is A British citizen or a citizen of the UK and Colonies having the right of abode in the UK [please see note below about which sections of the passport to copy].
- An expired or current passport or national identity card showing the holder, or a person named in the passport
  as the child of the holder, is a national of a European Economic Area country or Switzerland.
- A Registration Certificate or document certifying permanent residence issued by the Home Office to a national of a European Economic Area country or Switzerland.
- A Permanent Residence Card issued by the Home Office to the family member of a national of a European Economic Area country or Switzerland.
- A current Biometric Immigration Document (Biometric Residence Permit) Issued by the Home Office to the
  holder indicating that the person named is allowed to stay indefinitely in the UK, or has no time limit on their
  stay in the UK.
- A current passport endorsed to show that the holder is exempt from immigration control, is allowed to stay indefinitely in the UK, has the right of abode in the UK, or has no time limit on their stay in the UK.
- A current Immigration Status Document issued by the Home Office to the holder with an endorsement indicating that the named person is allowed to stay indefinitely in the UK or has no time limit on their stay in the UK, when produced in combination with an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
- A full birth or adoption certificate issued in the UK which includes the name(s) of at least one of the holder's
  parents or adoptive parents, when produced in combination with an official document giving the person's
  permanent National insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
- A birth or adoption certificate issued in the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man or Ireland when produced in
  combination with an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their
  name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
- A certificate of registration or naturalisation as a British citizen, when produced in combination with an
  official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a
  Government agency or a previous employer.
- A current passport endorsed to show that the holder is allowed to stay in the UK and is currently allowed to
  work and is not subject to a condition preventing the holder from doing work relating to the carrying on of a
  licensable activity.

- A current Biometric Immigration Document (Biometric Residence Permit) issued by the Home Office to the holder which indicates that the named person can currently stay in the UK and is allowed to work relation to the carrying on of a licensable activity.
- A current Residence Card issued by the Home Office to a person who is not a national of a European Economic
  Area state or Switzerland but who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights or
  residence
- A current Immigration Status Document containing a photograph issued by the Home Office to the holder
  with an endorsement indicating that the named person may stay in the UK, and is allowed to work and is not
  subject to a condition preventing the holder from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity
  when produced in combination with an official document giving the person's permanent National insurance
  number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
- A Certificate of Application, less than 6 months old, issued by the Home Office under regulation 17(3) or 18A
   (2) of the Immigration (European Economic Area) Regulations 2006, to a person who is not a national of a European Economic Area state or Switzerland but who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights of residence.
- Reasonable evidence that the person has an outstanding application to vary their permission to be in the UK
  with the Home Office such as the Home Office acknowledgement letter or proof of postage evidence, or
  reasonable evidence that the person has an appeal or administrative review pending on an immigration
  decision, such as an appeal or administrative review reference number.
- Reasonable evidence that a person who is not a national of a European Economic Area state or Switzerland but
  who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights of residence in exercising treaty rights in
  the UK including:-
  - evidence of the applicant's own identity such as a passport,
  - evidence of their relationship with the European Economic Area family member e.g. a marriage certificate, civil partnership certificate or birth certificate, and
  - evidence that the European Economic Area national has a right of permanent residence in the UK or is one of the following if they have been in the UK for more than 3 months:
    - (i) working e.g. employment contract, wage slips, letter from the employer,
  - (ii) self-employed e.g. contracts, invoices, or audited accounts with a bank,
  - (iii) studying e.g. letter from the school, college or university and evidence of sufficient funds; or
  - (iv) self-sufficient e.g. bank statements.

Family members of European Economic Area nationals who are studying or financially independent must also provide evidence that the European Economic Area national and any family members hold comprehensive sickness insurance in the UK. This can include a private medical insurance policy, an EHIC card or an S1, S2 or S3 form.

**Original documents must not be sent to licensing authorities.** If the document copied is a passport, a copy of the following pages should be provided:-

- (i) any page containing the holder's personal details including nationality;
- (ii) any page containing the holder's photograph;
- (iii) any page containing the holder's signature;
- (iv) any page containing the date of expiry; and
- (v) any page containing information indicating the holder has permission to enter or remain in the UK and is permitted to work.

If the document is not a passport, a copy of the whole document should be provided.

Your right to work will be checked as part of your licensing application and this could involve us checking your immigration status with the Home Office. We may otherwise share information with the Home Office. Your licence application will not be determined until you have complied with this guidance.

NOTES ON REGULATED ENTERTAINMENT

In terms of specific regulated entertainments please note that:

- Plays: no licence is required for performances between 08:00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience
  does not exceed 500.
- Films: no licence is required for 'not-for-profit' film exhibition held in community premises between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day provided that the audience does not exceed 500 and the organiser (a) gets consent to the screening from a person who is responsible for the premises; and (b) ensures that each such screening abides by age classification ratings.
- Indoor sporting events: no licence is required for performances between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 1000.
- Boxing or Wrestling Entertainment: no licence is required for a contest, exhibition or display of Greco-Roman
  wrestling, or freestyle wrestling between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not
  exceed 1000. Combined fighting sports defined as a contest, exhibition or display which combines boxing or
  wrestling with one or more martial arts are licensable as a boxing or wrestling entertainment rather than an
  indoor sporting event.
- Live music: no licence permission is required for:
  - a performance of unamplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, on any premises.
  - a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day on premises authorised to sell alcohol for consumption on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
  - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a workplace that is not licensed to sell alcohol on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
  - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a church hall, village hall, community hall, or other similar community premises, that is not licensed by a premises licence to sell alcohol, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance from a person who is responsible for the premises.
  - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, at the non-residential premises of (i) a local authority, or (ii) a school, or (iii) a hospital, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance on the relevant premises from: (i) the local authority concerned, or (ii) the school or (iii) the health care provider for the hospital.
- Recorded Music: no licence permission is required for:
  - o any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day on premises authorised to sell alcohol for consumption on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
  - any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a church hall, village hall, community hall, or other similar community premises, that is not licensed by a premises licence to sell alcohol, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance from a person who is responsible for the premises.
  - o any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, at the non-residential premises of (i) a local authority, or (ii) a school, or (iii) a hospital, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance on the relevant premises from: (i) the local authority concerned, or (ii) the school proprietor or (iii) the health care provider for the hospital.

- Dance: no licence is required for performances between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the
  audience does not exceed 500. However, a performance which amounts to adult entertainment remains
  licensable.
- Cross activity exemptions: no licence is required between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, with no limit on audience size for:
  - o any entertainment taking place on the premises of the local authority where the entertainment is provided by or on behalf of the local authority;
  - o any entertainment taking place on the hospital premises of the health care provider where the entertainment is provided by or on behalf of the health care provider;
  - any entertainment taking place on the premises of the school where the entertainment is provided by or on behalf of the school proprietor; and
  - o any entertainment (excluding films and a boxing or wrestling entertainment) taking place at a travelling circus, provided that (a) it takes place within a moveable structure that accommodates the audience, and (b) that the travelling circus has not been located on the same site for more than 28 consecutive days.
