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- 2. <u>Plans for the New Train Station & Clean Air Proposals</u> Gavin Smith made the following points and responded to residents questions;
 - Plans were underway to open 3 new stations in the south of the city – Kings Heath, Moseley & Hazelwell – on the sites of the former stations.
 - The stations would offer alternative travel, reduce traffic and improve local economies.
 - Stations would be up and running by 2021
 - Stations would be fully accessible, with 2 platforms that would accommodate 6 carriages, covered by canopies. There would be lifts, information screens, CCTV, public address systems and help points. The stations would not be staffed.
 - Kings Heath station had presented a challenge for emergency escape as the site of the original station was adjacent to Home Base car park. The current plan envisaged a path from railway to Highbury Park. It was possible that a secondary means of escape from the embankment into the allotments and out into the Park might be needed but the preferred option was a refuge on railway land.
 - Stations were being designed with pedestrians, cyclists and public transport connections in mind. There would be no car parks as the stations were not designed for park and ride.
 - Rail network was at saturation so there was ongoing work

Councillor Trickett emphasised the importance of the allotments and that if the refuge was not possible, there must be consultation with residents *before* a decision was made about the allotments

 with Network Rail to ensure new train service was compatible with the cross city line. Currently anticipating 2 trains an hour to Birmingham and Kings Norton. Trains would be new model ultra-low emissions diesel. Details of the drop in sessions provided and importance of residents expressing their views stressed

 Security concerns expressed regarding unmanned stations There were 10,000 school children in the local area and the new station opening was an opportunity to promote safety. It was suggested that road safety week be used as an opportunity for representatives to visit schools. The future for a Balsall Heath Station was queried. 	Gavin Smith welcomed the opportunity for the industry to engage with schools and undertook to speak at the conclusion of the meeting about visiting local schools. There were no plans for Balsall Heath Station currently and no funding
