MATTERS DISCUSSED AT THE MEETING:

Community Safety

Discussion around key issues raised by residents, including;

- Fear of crime
- Property Crime
- Anti-Social Behaviour
- Traveller Encampments
- Issues around speeding, school parking & the effect on the local environment
- Enforcement eg 20mph limits

Issue	Action
1. Traveller Encampments – Mark Croxford explained the law around moving an encampment on	
and the notice periods for eviction from council owned land. Reference made to the recent	
travellers who had camped at Sarehole Mill & Chinnbrook Recreation Ground creating nuisance &	
asb. Following this an injunction had been successfully sought for both sites and The Dell. Sites	
had been identified and approved for 2 transit sites and a 3 rd was being brought back into use.	

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When these were operational the council would pursue an injunction to cover all city owned land and if this could not be achieved would apply for an injunction to cover all parks.

2. Community Safety – property crime and anti-social behaviour and fear of crime identified as main issues. Sgt O'Keefe reported that the PSPO was in operation to 2020 and consideration would be given to extending beyond. The fear of crime was not unique to the ward and crime statistics showed that crime had increased slightly in the ward however the perception was greater. The team patrolled where trends were emerging and currently this was Moseley Village & Mossfield Road. House invasions were high priority and were dealt with by dedicated teams.
Begging was also an issue and the Alternative Giving scheme was explained as an alternative to giving the homeless money direct.

Chris Hamilton outlined the role of the Community Safety Partnership team and the type of work that was undertaken with community groups & providers in Moseley.

Moorcroft Road - Residents of Moorcroft Road made a number of comments regarding the increase in crime in the road during the past 12 months. There had been a dramatic rise in opportunistic crime eg car crime, break-ins, including when people were in their homes and this was making residents feel vulnerable and unsafe in their own homes. Residents asked/commented –

- What action were the police/partners taking to tackle this increase?
- Why was there such an increase in Moorcroft Road?
- What action could residents take?
- A clear message was requested
- There had been an assault in Moorcroft Road and property/car crimes happened regularly
- Residents did not feel their concerns were being heard
- The police website did not show any crimes occurring in Moorcroft Road despite so many being reported

Sgt O'Keefe said that local intelligence was used but there was no specific group or reasons for the crimes in Moorcroft Road. He explained Street Watch and said that it made a difference to
