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	Regeneration  Bali Paddock reported on the current phase of regeneration and advised that a decision was currently awaited in respect of the second CPO. The completion of the site was due in 2017	
	In response to queries the meeting was advised;	
	<ul> <li>i) Details regarding the supermarket could not be given but once contracts were signed the store would be built within 18 months. The Chair added that Councillors had requested this be included in the contract.</li> <li>ii) There was a policy not to build one bedroom properties but the new properties would include 2 bed houses and flats.</li> <li>iii) There were no plans to refurbish neighbouring properties although the life/cost of refurbishing tower blocks was currently under review. Residents commented that upgrading surrounding properties to bring in line with the new build would assist with sales.</li> <li>iv) There was no 'returners policy' for ex-residents and all had to go through the bidding system. Although it had been found that as the demotion had taken longer than expected, once people had settled in a 'temporary' area they did not want to move again.</li> <li>The Chair referred to the allocations policy which was under review and the issue of tenants who had lived in an area for many years having no automatic right to return.</li> <li>Residents requested information regarding the number of one bed properties requested across the City and an indication of where people had come from to live in Stockmans Close.</li> </ul>	Bali Paddock
