<u>Licensing and Public Protection Committee – 20 April 2016</u>

MINUTES OF THE LAST MEETING – 16 MARCH 2016

At this juncture due to copies of the above-mentioned minutes not being available to members at this time of the meeting, it was agreed that they would considered towards the end of the meeting when members had received and read the minutes during the meeting.

REVIEW OF CHARGES FOR HIGHWAYSERVICES FOR 2016/17

The following report of the Director, Highways and Resilience was submitted:-

(See document No. 1)

Kamyar Tavassoli, Highways Infrastructure Manager, whilst providing a comprehensive breakdown of the report specifically highlighted in 4.4 of the report the introduction of a non refundable £75.00 application fee for certain licenses.

He stated that over the years people applied for permits and then half way through the process abandoned the application which had resulted in the local authority carrying out the work. It was envisaged with the introduction of the fee, that this would reduce abortive applications as the customer was investing in the process, and it would also enable the recovery of approximately £65,000 overall with an increase of revenue of £54,000 to the local authority.

Upon further consideration, it was:-

REGULATION AND ENFORCEMENT SERVICE PLAN 2016/2017

The following report of the Acting Director of Regulation and Enforcement was submitted:-

(See document No. 2)

Chris Neville, Head of Licensing, made introductory comments to the report informing members that it sets out the business plans for regulation and enforcement for the coming year and subsequently detailed the areas that this covered. He highlighted that it sets out the priorities ahead which took into account local, national and regional issues as well as corporate priorities.

He referred to Appendix 5 of the report which detailed the Trading Standards Service Plan and the challenges for the year ahead in adapting to the pressures faced by the reduction in size of the workforce as a result of savings delivering of £242,000 achieved through the loss of 7 posts which would be responded to by a revision of priorities with a greater reliance of intelligence led investigations to ensure maximum effectiveness with the resources available. Once they had been identified and finalised the priorities would be brought back to committee for oversight and approval. He made reference to one of the recommendations adopted through the future council programme which formed part of the budget consultation, was for trading standards to develop a commercial model for business support to underwrite the cost of delivering what was a non statutory function for the department in terms of advising businesses. As a result of this, the service would no longer be offering free advice to businesses and as part of a business support package, were planning to expand the collaboration with the 'no rogue traders here' website and trader approval scheme and place on a more commercial footing.

He reported that another important development for Trading Standards was to see whether neighbouring authorities in the West Midlands would be interested in using the West Midlands Combined Authority as a vehicle to deliver a joined up trading service across the country.

He referred to the Licensing Service Plan detailed in Appendix 3 and highlighted that they had now completed the move into new council owned office accommodation. He stated that in order to deliver the recommendations of the service review for licensing, it had streamlined the application process for drivers by removing itself from administrating appointments for drivers with the disability resource centre, the driving test centre at Montague Street and occupational health had also stopped taking cash payments for taxi and private hire licences which has reduced the need for high levels of security within office and reduced costs.

He reported that as part of the modernisation process, it had recently identified a supplier for a replacement computer system which would link the licence application process to enforcement and eventually, it would enable all applications for licences including hackney carriage and private hire to be made on line.

In 2016/17 Licensing would renew the conditions for hackney carriage and private hire drivers and operators and it would also refresh the requirements of vehicle signs. It was noted that some of the most significant work ahead for licensing was to develop an omissions policy that would link vehicle licensing to the clean air zone and the need for Birmingham to meet air quality standards.

Mark Croxford, Head of Environmental Health, reported on the Environmental Health Service Plan illustrated in Appendix 2 of the report. He detailed the number of inspections that had been undertaken and highlighted that most of the statistics were up until January and therefore more would be added up until March. He highlighted that in addition to the statutory inspections carried out there had been a number of non-statutory inspections undertaken due to complaints or new businesses that had set up and required inspections.

He referred to 2.4 of the report which detailed the budget and following the pest control reduction for earnings the department had managed to balance the budget across Environmental Health and Pest Control. Reference was made to the freeze on recruitment and training and that only essential expenditure was being approved. He stated that in 2016/17 there was a £24,000 saving to be made which was the reduction in the dog welfare investigations and in addition to that, there was a £10k income target from joint working with Trading Standards to try and sell some advisory services. The pest control income target had been reduced now in the core budget standing at £0.9m which was still significant, but was more achievable than the previous year's target.

He referred to 2.5 of the report relating to the service improvements which included the work of the Waste Enforcement Unit which would continue. He referred in his report to partnership working with transportation and other colleagues in the city and outside the city to establish the clean air zones which was going to become more demanding.

It was reported that Pest Control would be looking to maximise the commercial offer and had been working well with other departments within the Council as well as looking at external contracts. Reference was made to the introduction of dog micro-chipping for all dogs in Birmingham although the information on the micro chip did not have to be kept up to date. It was noted that this item would be reported back next year.

It was highlighted that there was still continuing pressures on teams to deliver the statutory programmes however work would be prioritised and there was an assurance that inspections for high risks premises would be completed before low risk premises.

He referred to 2.10 of the report and referred to the issues relating to the provision of the data relating to the fixed penalty report and the environmental health and pest control statistics which appeared to be connected with the data entry. He highlighted that they had recently lost 3 pest control officers and 5 environmental health officers and would be reviewing shortly how many of those the department could afford to replace.

He concluded by referring to page 35 highlighting that next year the work programme would be similar to last year.

At this juncture, Andrea Haynes, Head of Coroners and Mortuary, Registration and Bereavement Services, referred to the Service Plan detailed in Appendix 1 of the report.

She referred to the increase of 12.2% deaths notified to the coroner that provided a driver to the service to make further improvements to processes and procedures. She subsequently detailed the improvements that had been made in 2015/16 with the appointment of a full time area coroner which reduced the need, for assistant coroners covering absences. There was the introduction of a new IT system CIVICA which met the needs of the service and in time would provide greater efficiency and improve services to the

bereaved. She referred to the successful TUPE transfer of west Midlands Police Staff that had moved over to the city council which provided a more managed service.

It was reported that there had been the re-finalisation of the bank holiday out of England service which met customer needs and legal requirements. There has also been the introduction of access to a non-invasive CTPM facility for the bereaved families.

She reported that in 2016 there were challenges for the service which the service would need to respond to and there would be further enhancement to the CIVICA system which would provide a greater efficiency and include closer working with hospitals. To ensure 95% of inquests were completed within 6 months and other performance indicators were in line with national averages, there would be the need to manage the increase of referrals of DOLS cases and ensure that compliance was met with the chief officer's coroners' quidelines.

She reported that due to the challenging budget for 2016/17 they were working in finance to look to introduce a video link in the coroner's court which should reduce the need to call witnesses and also reduce the need for their expenses. It was noted that the contract for removal of bodies was expiring this year and they were looking to see whether any savings could be made when the contract went out for renewal. The coroner worked closely with doctors and hospitals to improve the education around referrals and hopefully this should help to reduce the number of referrals that came into the coroner's service. There had been a change in legislation so there may be the potential to increase income from the public mortuary and there may be arrangements that could be made with the local authority and neighbouring authorities which would allow post mortems to take place in the public mortuary.

She referred to the intensive workload of the registry office in 2015 which had provided the driver for the service streamlining its processes and procedures. The main improvements included the Stopford electronic diary system which was a web based application which takes birth registration appointments on line and since it was implemented, it had helped in reducing the number of customer phone calls to the service and it was in keeping with the city council as a priority to channel shift.

It was reported that last year the service had worked towards becoming self sufficient and various initiatives had been introduced which included up front payments for notices of marriage and some income generation schemes. The service had successfully implemented changes in marriage and civil partnership legislation, and the emergency bereavement out of hours' service has also been enhanced with the out of England removal orders. The provision of death registration appointments had been revised to improve the availability of urgent emergency appointments and a new bespoke index system had been introduced.

She referred to the need to respond to the financial challenge for 2016/17 and was therefore finding alternative ways of resourcing the registry office which included working with DWP in offering work experience placements and also

introducing more flexibility to job roles. The service would continue to work to becoming more self-sufficient by the introduction of new income generation schemes which included the provision of enhanced marriage ceremonies. It was noted that the service would continue to make effective use of the Stopford electronic diary system by the introduction of the online notification of the marriage appointment facilities and work towards the online death registration appointments for a further channel shift. In addition the service would be looking to consider extending the number of registration appointments made available during the normal working week and look to implement a full registration service on Saturdays.

In response to Councillor Kennedy's questions and comments the following points were made.

Mark Croxford referred to the dog welfare issue and confirmed that they were signposting new jobs to the RSPCA whilst trying to complete the existing jobs, adding that the service had ceased on 1 April 2016. He referred to the reduction in staff and the transferral of some existing workloads to officers that had taken place in order for savings to be made. With regard to the MAPPS system he agreed to make subsequent arrangements for Councillor Kennedy to visit the department.

Chris Neville confirmed that they had worked in partnership with 'No Rogue Traders' for a number of years and it was the organisation that had invited the city council to work alongside them. Although aware of other organisations that provided trader assurance schemes, 'No Rogue Traders' offered a greater level of scrutiny of businesses compared to others. However, if others approached and wanted to work alongside the city council, 'No Rogue Traders' had never been guaranteed any sort of exclusive contract. He referred to the area of work they were looking to do in terms of increasing revenue which was charging for checking businesses with 'No Rogue Traders' before they were approved which currently did not happen

Chris Neville referred to DOLS and confirmed that he could not foresee a problem writing to the Government Minister or local MPs addressing the legislative aspect and subsequently agreed to do this.

Councillor Moore referred to the number of food inspections and whilst appreciated priority should be given to the high risk premises highlighted the importance of not forgetting the higher quality ones that could start slipping with their standards.

Mark Croxford confirmed, that whilst completing the statutory minimum programme this year, they did struggle with a further 90 inspections that were carried out, which were the ones carried over from the previous computer system and had caused difficulties. He referred to the high level of changes to new businesses and reiterated that whilst they had struggled they had completed the statutory programme.

In response to further comments and questions from Councillor Moore the following points were made.

Mark Croxford highlighted that 'Building Watch' was an excellent programme, which consisted of partnership working between the city council, West Midlands Fire Service and other partners in trying to protect buildings as well as people who were using derelict buildings. He referred to the work that had taken place in sealing and securing buildings to ensure that they were not brought into use. At the moment, there was no funding however where it was identified that somewhere was a high risk, the city council should still be looking to have it secured and there was the need to look to colleagues in Planning, regarding whether buildings could be brought into use or demolished.

Chris Neville referred to the challenge with the budget savings for Licensing and for the department the overspend was occurring in the general licensing section where fees were largely capped at the moment and that they were maintaining vacancies where posts would not be filled. He stated that they were discussing with colleagues in Finance, to see whether there was scope around the allocation of central establishment charges in the city council, where departments had charged for the use of centralised services and the appropriateness of licensing paying for some of those services, in order to see if that numbers could be reduced which would reduce pressure on the licensing budget. He added that they were definitely aware there was an issue and were looking at ways of addressing this.

In response to Councillor Dad's enquiry relating to the new case management system, Andrea Haynes, confirmed that the purpose of the system was to help with the inputting of papers when they had referrals. She stated that it was a management system. They were hoping to move forward by linking with local hospitals so they could download information in advance which would reduce time. She further stated that she could not provide accurate timescales regarding the building of the partnerships with the hospitals however the coroner was discussing with various hospitals as a means in trying to move forward this year.

The Chair suggested that the department presented a further report to Committee.

Following a further comment from Councillor Dad regarding how elected members could contribute in working together with the coroner's service in helping to make improvements, Andrea Haynes confirmed that she met with the coroner regularly and at the next meeting, would look to putting together a programme of interested parties and how they could work effectively.

In response to comments and questions from Councillor Clinton the following points were made:-

Mark Croxford referred to the animal welfare issue and the financial cuts and stated that although Mr Kalsi, Assistant Director of Finance was looking into this area the savings had to be implemented now. He stated that if funding was recovered they would have to recruit to deliver the service again. He confirmed that they had lost an officer from another section and his work had transferred to the dog wardens at the moment. Dealing with stray dogs

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required two officers to work together due to the need to maintain health and safety, as it was too dangerous to reduce to one officer on their own.

Mark Croxford referred to the chipping of dogs and although thought that it would make matters easier highlighted that it was proving to be somewhat of a challenge. He further referred to the national research programme whereby a number of local authorities were involved and subsequently agreed to submit a report to committee that addressed a number of these issues.

In response to the Chair's request for a commitment from the department to progress what was happening with the questions raised at the last meeting regarding the dog warden, Mark Croxford referred to the petition that had been submitted to city council and confirmed that Alison Harwood was working hard with Mr Kalsi and others to respond to the petition which was all interlinked.

The Chair put the recommendation contained in the report at agenda item No. 5 to the meeting and this was agreed unanimously.

CONDITIONS OF LICENCE FOR PRIVATE HIRE OPERATORS, DRIVERS AND VEHICLES

The following report of the Acting Director of Regulation and Enforcement was submitted:-

(See document No. 3)

Shawn Woodcock, Licencing Operations Manager, made introductory comments to the report relating to the proposal of a new set of conditions to the licences issues in respect of private hire operators. He subsequently highlighted that the main changes to the conditions; were the removal of the legal requirements, a change to signage conditions and the introduction of new technology. Guidance had been produced to assist operators which included legal requirements and suggestions of what might be best practice. This was attached in appendix 3 of the report.

He reported that if committee approved the new set of conditions, it would come into effect following the introduction of the proposed vehicle signage policy, but due to the fact that the department could only issue the conditions on grant, or renewal of licences which it would take at least 12 months before all operators would be operating under these new proposed conditions.

In response to Councillor Moore's comments and concerns regarding the incompleteness of the consultation, Shawn Woodcock confirmed that the committee had not seen the first draft which had contained a great many conditions. He confirmed that having taken on board the responses from the trade, the enforcement team and some legal advice, it was considered not

legal for the city to place conditions on private hire operators that operated hackney carriages from out of town. He added that those conditions could not be introduced and that was why some of the responses referred to conditions that councillors had not seen because the conditions had been removed completely.

In response to the Chair's enquiry as to whether the main response was from Star Cars, Shawn Woodcock confirmed that they had only received 3 responses and reiterated the legal view was that the city could not stop out of town hackney carriages carrying out private hire work. He stated that operators that operated in the city were allowed to employ and give private hire work to hackney carriage drivers not licensed by the city.

The Chair commented that many operators were setting up offices outside the city in neighbouring towns then using those offices to take bookings from the city and sending their drivers to work in the city.

Mr Woodcock agreed that was what was happening, however, confirmed that this was not the practice with hackney carriages. They were using private hire and subsequently provided an example: that if a company (A cars) had an operators base in Birmingham to operate private hire, and then if they set up (B cars) in another town and employed private hire drivers from that town, they could now since the Deregulation Act sub-contract work from A cars to B cars and carry out work in Birmingham and there was nothing the city could do to prevent this from happening.

Following further comments and queries raised by Councillor Moore and Kennedy relating to the report, the Chair suggested that as there needed to be a greater understanding within the report, that it be deferred and submitted to a future meeting when clarification had been sought.

Chris Neville confirmed that it would not be a problem even if the Committee agreed to the new conditions today they would not be applied, as it was dependent upon the other sets of conditions relating to the signage and therefore the actual implementation date would be some time away. He confirmed that there was still time to resubmit the report in a slightly different format. He added that Shawn had tried to provide the most recent version in order to avoid presenting lots of iterations of the same document, but that officers could go back to the starting point and present it that way.

The Chair confirmed that it was a wise decision to defer the report as she was constantly being lobbied and receiving letters from drivers of how operators were distributing the work.

That the report be deferred for a more comprehensive report to be submitted to committee.

<u>Licensing and Public Protection Committee – 20 April 2016</u>

SETTING THE FIXED PENALTY NOTICE AMOUNT FOR THE UNAUTHORISED DEPOSIT OF WASTE (FIXED PENALTIES) REGULATIONS 2016

The following report of the Acting Director of Regulation and Enforcement was submitted:-

(See document No. 4)

Mark Croxford, Head of Environmental Health made introductory comments to the report relating to the unauthorised deposit of waste (Fixed Penalties) Regulations 2016 which would come into force on 9 May 2016. These regulations introduced a new fixed penalty notice and the local authority was requested to set an alternative fixed penalty amount to the default tariffs set within the regulations. He highlighted that they were not trying to move away from their enforcement policy but use this as an alternative, adding that it would be case dependant.

Councillor Kennedy highlighted the importance of deterring people from these acts and the need to publicise to the public at large that people were being prosecuted when caught committing these crimes. He suggested that officers should look at what could be done internally to publicise this area of work.

Mark Croxford confirmed that one of the most visited areas on the council's web site was the prosecutions pages and subsequently agreed to take members' comments on board.

Councillor Moore confirmed that there needed to be tougher action taken and suggested that the maximum fine of £400 should be introduced which was seconded by Councillor Ward.

Following concern highlighted by Councillor Leddy relating to the dumping of asbestos, Mark Croxford stressed that the department did take into consideration the public risk element.

In response to further comments from members, Mark Croxford stated that the signage was out of date and would have to be replaced as time progressed. He referred to the efforts made by officers in addressing fly-tipping and the Waste Enforcement Unit that were tracking people. He added that in order that more prosecutions could take place there needed to be the assistance of residents providing local intelligence which was sometimes lacking.

He highlighted that he was not sure if the lower amount would be more effective and although he did not envisage a great many tickets being issued, was more than happy to review over time. He subsequently explained the administrative difficulties that had occurred when there had been a reduced fixed penalty amount.

Following further comments from members regarding how the council were going to tackle this major issue which affected areas all across the city, Mark Croxford highlighted that Jacqui Kennedy, Director of Place was working extremely hard to try and tie all of the services together in addressing this issue. He confirmed that they were increasing their enforcement activity and Page 18,0638

catching more people than before. He stated that the education of the public was proving difficult but that they were doing all that they could and that efforts were being made in all departments in tackling this issue, including the collection of waste.

Chris Neville reiterated the importance that co-operation from the public was needed and subsequently provided an example where a resident would not provide the necessary information for fear of repercussions. Mark Croxford concluded that in responding to the Leader of the council, the priorities now across the board were dealing with rubbish and fly-tipping and that resources were being used in a variety of ways in addressing this area of work.

Upon further consideration, it was:-

649 **RESOLVED:-**

- i. It was agreed unanimously that the Committee determines a fixed penalty amount of £400, as moved by Councillor Moore and seconded by Councillor Clinton, for Section 33(1)(a) Environmental Protection Act 1990 offences. The maximum fine of £400 was recommended, to go some way to covering the costs of the investigation.
- It was agreed unanimously that the Committee did not set any reduced ii. fixed penalty amount and if the case progressed to Court the Court would seek to recover the full costs for what were not trivial offences.

REGULATING FACE TO FACE FUNDRAISING PFRA SITE MANAGEMENT **AGREEMENT**

The following report of the Acting Director of Regulation and Enforcement was submitted:-

(See document No. 5)

Chris Neville, Head of Licensing made reference to the report relating to face to face fundraising and provided a brief overview as to why Birmingham's application, for a byelaw, was rejected by the Secretary of State on the grounds that the city had not attempted to control the practice, by signing a Site Management Agreement (SMA) with the Public Fundraising Association (PFRA). He referred to the attached draft agreement that was a revised version which detailed various improvements compared to the first version.

Chris Neville highlighted that the city centre would be divided into 7 zones with up to 4 fundraisers at any one time at each location compared to the 6 per zone that was originally requested. It had also been agreed to limit the number of zones in operation at any given day from 6 down to 3 and therefore through this agreement, the highest number of fundraisers that could be working in the city at any given day would be 12 people. It would also mean that on Wednesdays only 2 zones would operate and none of the zones would join each other on a day when zones were working. It was noted that Victoria Square and also Broad Street had been removed as a zone due to its

proximity to the war memorial, and that New Street would be completely free of fundraisers on Wednesdays and Saturdays.

Chris Neville explained that he had proposed to the PFRA that the maximum number of fundraisers in a given zone should be limited to 2. The PFRA said that it had consulted with its members and had proposed a compromise of 4. It considered that it had moved as far as possible in terms of reaching a compromise with the city council.

He stated that the committee had to balance the needs and ability of charities to raise income against public feeling who often regarded fundraisers as a nuisance. He therefore invited the Committee to consider the PFRA proposals and decide whether to ask it to review the proposals with a view to limiting the number of collectors to 2 per zone or whether to agree the proposals outlined in the appendix. He stated that once the agreement had been signed, there would be an 8 week period before it came into force and would be subject to review in 6 and 12 months time.

Councillor Leddy referred to the issues relating to chuggers and highlighted that the public did not want to be approached by them and that there were too many sites. He stated that it was not promoting a welcoming attitude for people visiting the city and the impact it was having on the overall economy needed to be taken into account.

He therefore proposed a motion which was seconded by Councillor Ward that 2 zones should be made available to the PFRA for 2 days only per week with a maximum of 4 operatives at any one zone. The suggested zones would be named by officers in a report to this committee, following consultation with PFRA, Retail Birmingham and other BID organisations within the city centre and that the zones should be known as sites.

Councillor Moore referred to the past where he had suggested looking at a management agreement with the PFRA and highlighted that the agreement submitted was an improvement. He agreed that chugging was a major issue in the city centre and although would like to see it stopped altogether, it was not an option. He stated there was always going to be an element of having to allow some charities to collect money or details and that these were national organisations that did try and do public good which the committee needed to be mindful of.

He highlighted the importance of reaching an agreement with the PFRA sooner rather than later, as otherwise, the issue would remain unregulated and unresolved. He highlighted that if an agreement was entered into and if it was not working, then discussions could commence with regard to reducing the numbers once the evidence was in place.

Councillor Kennedy commented that the agreement should be able to be reviewed in the future if the committee agreed to the management proposals as they stood, otherwise, believed that once the threshold had been agreed there could be no turning back.

Chris Neville confirmed that what was suggested by Councillor Leddy was acceptable however there was a valid point in what Councillor Moore had raised in reaching an early agreement in order to prevent the practice continuing to be unregulated. He highlighted that it was not an issue in carrying out a consultation then returning to PFRA which in effect would be the counter proposal.

He confirmed that there would be a delay which would be the time it would take to carry out the consultation which they would endeavour to do as soon as possible. He further confirmed that if an agreement was reached today, it would take effect from 8 weeks however, any counter proposals made would involve some time in needing to re-negotiate with the PFRA and if it involved consultation, it would take time to consult and therefore add a little longer to the time.

Stuart Evans referred to the agreement as it stood and confirmed that it would be subject to review after 6 months after it was signed, and then once every 12 months, if necessary, or earlier if there was just cause to do so. It was noted that all amendments would be agreed in writing before becoming effective. Either party could withdraw from this agreement, giving 3 months' notice in writing.

Chris Neville suggested on that basis, that it might be possible for the committee to agree a short term agreement of 3 months with PFRA, whilst the city carried out a consultation as suggested by Councillor Leddy.

Councillor Moore made several comments relating to the number of zones which excluded a great deal of the city centre, and subsequently referred to the new proposal put forward by Councillor Leddy and highlighted the importance of a decision that needed to be taken today. He disagreed with Councillor Kennedy's comment regarding the threshold, adding that any complaints could be addressed as part of the review. He stated that it was better to have something in place now which would significantly reduce the number of fundraisers that were in the city at the moment.

The Chair referred to the complaints from residents with regard to chuggers and the need for the city to act in order to address this issue. She further referred to Councillor Leddy's motion which she suggested could be added to the agreement as it stood, with it operating for a 3 month period and could become part of the negotiation on signing the document.

Councillor Leddy referred to what Chris had suggested regarding a consultation and that an addendum to the resolution that a 3 month agreement was drawn up with PFRA whilst the consultation took place.

Chris Neville confirmed that it would make an improvement to the existing situation and also to try and get something better moving forward based on some consultation.

Stuart Evans referred to the motion that was put forward and clarified that it was based on 4 face to face fundraises for a 3 month period whilst negotiations take place to try and reduce it down.

<u>Licensing and Public Protection Committee - 20 April 2016</u>

In response to Councillor Kennedy's suggestion of a caveat due to ongoing changes to the city, Stuart Evans confirmed that there would be the allowance for discretion for the city in any changes to the city centre.

Chris Neville detailed the timeline for the introduction of the agreement whereupon there would be an 8 week period leading up to the agreement whilst the PFRA organised their charities and schedules. He confirmed that nothing would be taking place on the streets for 8 weeks, and then there would be the 3 month trial period which allowed a 5 month time period to carry out the consultation.

Upon further consideration, it was:-

650 **RESOLVED**:-

- i. It was agreed unanimously, that the Committee agreed the acceptance of the Site Management Agreement between PRFA and Birmingham City Council which limited the number of face to face fundraisers in any zone at any point in time to a maximum of 4 with no more than 3 zones in operation at any one time for a 3 month period, as moved by Councillor Leddy and seconded by Councillor Ward.
- ii. It was agreed unanimously, that the Committee resolved to ask officers to consult with the PRFA, Retail Birmingham and other BID management organisations within the city centre during the 3-month period of the agreement with a view to reducing the number of sites to 2 for 2 days per week with a maximum of 4 workers per site at any one time.

PROPOSALS FOR VEHICLE EMISSION STANDARDS FOR HACKNEY CARRIAGE AND PRIVATE HIRE VEHICLES

The following report of the Acting Director of Regulation and Enforcement was submitted:-

(See document No. 6)

Chris Neville, Head of Licensing, provided a comprehensive breakdown of the report.

The Chair highlighted the importance of acting now and the fact that there was a four-year timescale to bring the city's fleet of hackney and private hire vehicles up to a standard that was going to meet the requirements of the Clean Air Zone. She added that the sooner action was taken the better rather than leaving it to the last minute where problems could be encountered.

Chris Neville clarified that the report referred to the city centre and stated that if standards for vehicles were not set, this could result in a zone which only the cleanest vehicles could enter, thereby displacing the more polluting vehicles into the suburbs.

<u>Licensing and Public Protection Committee – 20 April 2016</u>

He confirmed that standards also applied to light goods vehicles, heavy goods vehicles and buses whereby Transportation Section were addressing this by developing policies and discussing with transport providers. He confirmed that a great deal of work was being done on how that element of it would be managed. He highlighted that the concern of the committee was the taxi and private hire element.

Mark Croxford, Head of Environmental Health, referred to the dilution factor and with reduced numbers of vehicles using the zone due to restrictions this would reduce the amount of pollution. He further referred to one of the air monitoring stations that had been moved to the inner city which would provide a more accurate idea of standards and the requirements that were to be met and therefore work was now being undertaken by the environmental protection unit. He stated that he would in time be able to provide updates as work progressed.

Councillor Moore commented that Option 3 was possibly the best way forward in tackling this issue. He appreciated that there was a huge financial burden on the trade for those who had to meet the requirements, if they wished to enter the clean air zone without any additional cost, however added that it would be a more improved service for the public travelling in newer and cleaner vehicles in addition to the health benefits.

Following further comments from Councillor Moore relating to the impact on the out of town hackney carriages operating as private hire in the city which could have an adverse impact due to the clean air zones, Chris Neville stated that if they came into the city centre they would have to pay whatever the penalty charge was which could make it economically unviable for them.

The Chair put the recommendations contained in the report at agenda item No. 10 to a vote and these were agreed unanimously.

651 **RESOLVED:-**

- i. That the Committee considered the implications of a policy to set emissions standards for hackney carriages and private hire vehicles to meet the standards that will apply to Clean Air Zone in Birmingham; namely Euro 4 for petrol engines and Euro VI /6 for diesel engines.
- ii. That officers be instructed to produce a draft policy for a future meeting based on the outcome of the Committee's deliberations.
- iii. That officers engaged with the neighbouring West Midlands Licensing authorities to discuss proposals for a regional emissions standard for hackney carriages and private hire vehicles.

PROSECUTIONS AND CAUTIONS FEBRUARY 2016

The following report of the Director of Regulation and Enforcement was submitted:-

(See document No. 7)

Mark Croxford, Head of Environmental Health, provided a comprehensive breakdown of the report.

Councillor Moore expressed his disappointment with the low level fine for the dumping of a three piece suite which he added was an item that was disposed of on a regular basis across the city. He highlighted that it was good to see a few more dog offences recorded with regard to the health and safety aspect in protecting the public. He further highlighted the importance of not discounting visiting eating establishments that had passed the standard however in time could slip.

In response to Councillor Kennedy's enquiry relating to the contract that had been passed by Cabinet for littering, Mark Croxford stated that they were looking at letting the contract for litter and it was citywide. He confirmed that it was called fixed penalty patrols 1 and 2 whereby (1) pertained to the city centre, and (2) pertained to the outer city.

He stated that if anybody identified ongoing problems with littering, the department were more than happy to direct the fixed penalty patrols to those areas. He added that they worked across the city and should there be any ongoing problems they would deal with them.

Upon further consideration, it was

That the report be noted.

CONTROL OF SEX ESTABLISHMENTS - SEXUAL ENTERTAINMENT VENUE, MEDUSA LODGE GENTLEMENS CLUB, 139 – 147 HURST STREET, SOUTHSIDE, BIRMINGHAM B5 6SD

1. <u>Summary</u>

- 1.1 Birmingham City Council's Sexual Entertainment Venue Policy became effective from 1st November 2014.
- 1.2 An application has been received for the transfer of the Sexual Entertainment Venue (SEV) Licence in respect of premises known as Medusa Lodge Gentlemen's Club, 139 147 Hurst Street, Southside, Birmingham B5 6SD.
- 1.3 There is a statutory requirement for applicants to advertise in the local press and post notices on the premises giving passers by the opportunity to comment or object within a specified time period.
- 1.4 An objection has been received from a member of the public within this time period.
- 1.5 The criteria when considering the grant or transfer of a Sexual Entertainment Venue Licence are outlined in paragraph 5 of this report.

2. Recommendation

2.1 The Committee is requested to consider the transfer application and the objection received and to determine this matter having regard to the options contained in paragraph 6.1 of the report.

3. Background

- 3.1 An application has been received to transfer the Sexual Entertainment Venue licence in respect of Medusa Lodge Gentlemen's Club, 139 147 Hurst Street, Southside, Birmingham B5 6SD from Starwhite Limited to Warwood Limited. A copy of the application is attached at Appendix 1.
- 3.2 The current licence was granted by the Licensing & Public Protection Committee on the 16th December 2015. A copy of that licence is attached at Appendix 2.
- 3.3 It should be noted that there is no request to change the operation of the business or to vary any of the terms and conditions subject to which the existing licence is granted.
- 3.4 The nature of the entertainment as described on the application form is lap dancing, pole dancing, table dancing, exotic dancing together with Burlesque / cabaret and similar adult entertainment. The applicant has confirmed the relevant entertainment involves full nudity.
- 3.5 The applicant has confirmed that the venues Operating Policies & Procedures including the Club Rules and External Scheme have not changed since the existing licence was granted. Copies of the existing Policies & Procedures and External Scheme are attached at Appendices 3 & 4 respectively.
- 3.6 A plan of the premises detailing where the Sexual Entertainment takes place is also part of the application procedure. A copy of the A4 plan is attached at Appendix 5.

4. Consultation

- 4.1 The applicant was required to advertise the application in a local newspaper, post a notice outside of the premises for a period of 21 days and serve a copy of the application to the Chief Officer of Police.
- 4.2 In addition upon receipt of an application the Licensing Section consults with the relevant Local Policing Unit, the Licensing Enforcement Team and also notifies the appropriate Ward Councillors.
- 4.3 West Midlands Police have not objected to the transfer application.
- 4.4 A Licensing Enforcement Officer conducted a site visit on the 7th April 2016 and has confirmed as there is no change to any of the operating systems and the company directors are the same for each company they have no objection to the transfer application
- 4.5 An objection has been received from a member of the public. A copy of which is attached at Appendix 6.

- 4.6 A copy of the Council approved standard conditions for Sexual Entertainment Venue licences are contained within the current Sexual Entertainment Venue policy a copy of which is attached at Appendix 7.
- 4.7 A location plan showing the proximity of other licensed Sexual Entertainment Venues to the premises, is attached at Appendix 8.
- 4.8 All parties have been invited to attend the hearing.

5. Matters for Consideration

- 5.1 When considering an application for the grant or transfer of a licence, the Committee should have regard to any observations submitted to it by the Chief Officer of Police and any objections that the Licensing Authority has received from anyone else within 28 days of the date of the application.
- 5.2 Subject to any new information produced at the hearing it does not appear that any of the mandatory grounds of refusal apply to the application currently due for consideration. For example, a licence shall not be granted to a person who is under the age of 18 or who has had a previous application for the same premises refused within the last 12 months.
- 5.3 The only discretionary grounds upon which the Council may refuse an application are those grounds specified in Schedule 3 paragraph 12(3) of the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1982 as amended:
 - a) that the applicant is unsuitable to hold the licence by reason of having been convicted of an offence or any other reason;
 - b) that if the licence were to be granted, renewed or transferred the business to which it relates would be managed by, or carried on for the benefit of a person, other than the applicant, who would be refused the grant of such a licence if he made the application himself;
 - c) that the number of sex establishments, or of sex establishments of a particular kind, in the relevant locality at the time the application is made is equal to or exceeds the number which the authority consider is appropriate for that locality;
 - d) that the grant or renewal of the licence would be inappropriate, having regard:
 - (i) to the character of the relevant locality; or
 - (ii) to the use to which any premises in the vicinity are put; or
 - (iii) to the layout, character or condition of the premises, vehicle, vessel or stall in respect of which the application is made.

6. Options Available

6.1 The Committee may:

- 6.1.1 Grant the application as it stands in which case the licence will be subject to the Council approved Standard Conditions.
- 6.1.2 Grant the application as it stands subject to the Council approved Standard Conditions unless they have been expressly excluded or varied and/or other Specific Conditions or restrictions that the Committee deem reasonable, necessary proportionate and justifiable.
- 6.1.3 Refuse the application on one or more of the grounds as outlined in paragraph 5.3 above.

7. Right of Appeal

- 7.1 An applicant has a right of appeal to the Magistrates Court against decisions to refuse to grant, renew, vary or transfer a licence, the imposition of conditions or the revocation of an existing licence.
- 7.2 It should be noted that although no right of appeal lies against a decision made on the discretionary grounds set out in paragraphs 5.3(c & d) above, the applicant could challenge a refusal on the aforementioned grounds by way of a judicial review.

8. Implications for Resources

- 8.1 A fee of £1,918 is payable for the transfer of a Sexual Entertainment Venue licence, if the application is subsequently refused then 50% of the fee will be refundable.
- 8.2 In the event of an appeal hearing, the Magistrates power to award costs derives from Section 64 of the Magistrates Courts Act 1980 which entitles them to make such order as they think just and reasonable.

9. <u>Implications for Policy Priorities</u>

9.1 The application that is the subject of this report should be considered in accordance with the published Birmingham City Council Sexual Entertainment Venue Policy.

10. Public Sector Equality Duty

10.1 No specific implications have been identified.

MANAGEMENT MANUAL

RECEPTION & SECURITY

General

The company employs the services of C.N.A. Risk Management to inspect all door procedures/security, in addition to assessing all related staff to maintain an efficient and well-run business.

All door persons are required by law to be SIA registered.

During all opening hours there must be a minimum of one security staff on the door at all times, and a minimum of two security person inside the club.

Duties of Security Staff

Security Staff must:

Sign in and out of the club, noting their badge number. Records of this are kept for a 3-month period.

Wear their licensed badge at all times whilst on duty.

Ensure all customers who appear to be 25 or under to produce appropriate photo identification e.g., passport, driving licence or proof of age card carrying a "PASS" logo.

Ensure queuing, drugs and dispersal policies are enforced.

When working on the door wear "high visibility" jackets.

Not allow customers to leave the premises with bottles, glasses or any alcoholic drinks.

When working outside the premises or engaged in dispersal of patrons at the close of business will wear "high visibility" Florissant clothing.

Remove all fire escape chains and bolts of the club. This is done 1 hour before club opening.

Sweep the front of the club when needed before opening.

Help to prepare the club for opening; this includes assisting with lighting, music, clearing of refuse etc and general tidying.

Maintain clear, prompt and accurate records in the Incident and Accident Book on all such incidents and ensure that each and every entry is checked and signed by the Manager on duty on the date of entry.

Warmly greet customers and other staff of Medusa Lodge upon their entry to the club. Never to meet rudeness with rudeness but report any difficulty immediately to the Manager on duty at the time;

After 2.00am, security staff must be particularly vigilant in their duties;

Make certain that all staff and dancers are safely escorted to their cars and taxis when the club closes.

Remain in the area outside of the venue until customers have left the immediate vicinity and to assist in actively encouraging customers not to congregate outside the venue

Help direct customers to the nearest taxi ranks or other transportation away from the area.

Close the club securely at the end of the night, including regular checks of fire escapes, toilets, windows, dance booths, doors and front doors etc.

CUSTOMERS

General

Customers must be over the age of 18 years old to enter the club. In cases of doubt i.e. they look 25 or less, Security staff must request appropriate photo identification e.g., passport, driving licence or proof of age card carrying a "PASS" logo.

Customers must abide by the strict dress code: smart or smart/casual strictly no sportswear, ripped jeans, sleeveless tops, caps or any other items of clothing which may cause offence to staff, dancers or other customers. Management reserve the right to ask any customer to adjust their appearance etc. or refuse entry if necessary.

Customers are not admitted if the Door Staff consider that they are under the influence of alcohol or drugs or otherwise not in a fit state to use the Club's facilities.

Medusa Lodge imposes a zero tolerance to any drug use. (Please refer to our drugs policy) If any customer offends this rule, they will be escorted from the premises; full report will be made to the police.

The Manager on duty has the absolute discretion to ask any customer to leave if he considers that there is, has or is about to be a breach of the Clubs Rules or any conduct that would bring the Club into disrepute.

Customers' interaction with dancers

A dancer will eventually approach a customer after he has entered the club. She politely informs the customer of the cost of a dance, and if necessary, explains what it entails.

Customers who choose to have a dance will be taken to a private dance booth by the dancer, who will begin dancing, and will continue for the duration of one song (approx. 3 minutes).

Under no circumstances are customers allowed to invite dancers to meet them outside of the club or exchange any contact details. This rule is enforced to inhibit the act of prostitution. If a customer attempts to exchange contact details or solicits services of prostitution or any other illegal activity, the dancer is requested to report this to management immediately and the customer will be asked to leave immediately. Thereafter, management can and will enforce a ban on that customer.

Customers are not permitted to touch or be touched by dancers during the duration of a private dance.

All dance booths are equipped with CCTV cameras for safety.

Signs displaying Club rules are clearly visible upon entry at the club reception, and within the Club. The Door Staff will draw customers' attention to these when necessary.

DANCERS

General

Before a dancer is permitted to perform at the Club, the following procedures take place:

Identification for the dancer is inspected on her arrival at the Club reception to ensure she is over the age of 18 years.

(Appropriate photo identification e.g., passport, driving licence or proof of

(Appropriate photo identification e.g., passport, driving licence or proof of age card carrying a "PASS" logo.)

The dancer will be asked to display: Photo identification and two other forms of identification such as a utility bill and a chequebook.

The dancer must then be shown around the club, showed the fire exits and be informed of the Club Rules.

The dancer is required to perform an audition on stage consisting of a single performance of topless dancing. The dancer must wear a long dress and suitable shoes for this audition.

If the manager on duty decides that the dancer is suitable she is taken to the office to read and sign the Medusa Lodge Code of Conduct, and photocopies of her identification are made and kept with her dancer file. These files contain relevant personal information and are securely stored in the management office.

Medusa Lodge imposes a zero tolerance to any drug use. If any dancer offends this rule, they will be escorted from the premises; full report may be made to the police.

The Manager on duty has the absolute discretion to ask any dancer to leave if he/she considers that there is, has or is about to be a breach of the Clubs Rules or any conduct that would bring the Club into disrepute.

Performance of a Dance

Dancers are required to perform on stage throughout the evening on several occasions. These consist of pole dances for the duration of two songs, where the dancer must be topless for the second song.

When a dancer approaches a customer she asks him whether he would like to have a dance, and she politely informs the customer of the cost of a dance, and if necessary, explains what it entails.

Customers, who choose to have a fully nude dance for the cost of £20, will be taken to a private dance booth by the dancer, who will begin dancing, and will continue for the duration of one song (approx. 3 mins).

Under no circumstances are dancers allowed to invite customers to meet them outside of the club or exchange any contact details. This rule is enforced to inhibit the act of prostitution. If management are informed that a dancer has solicited prostitution or any other illegal activity, she will be asked to leave the premises immediately and banned from the Club.

All dance booths are equipped with CCTV cameras for safety. Dancers are aware of these safety measures.

Dancers are not permitted to touch customers, or be touched, during the duration of a dance.

BAR/WAITRESSING STAFF

General

Before a person is permitted to work at the Club, the following procedures take place:

Identification for the person is inspected on their arrival at the Club reception to ensure they are over the age of 18 years. Customers must be over the age of 18 years old to enter the club. In cases of doubt i.e. they look 25 or less, Security staff must request appropriate photo identification e.g., passport, driving licence or proof of age card carrying a "PASS" logo.

The person will be asked to display: Photo identification and two other forms of identification such as a utility bill and a chequebook.

The person must then be shown around the club, showed the fire exits and be informed of the Club Rules.

Before a member of staff begins work at the Club, a file must be compiled consisting of copies of their identification, a signed copy of the Staff Procedure form, a signed Risk Assessment form and relevant personal information for that person.

Full-time staff that are not already qualified are requested to undertake a Licence Course to obtain their Personal Licence Certificate.

Staff must not consume alcohol before or during their shift commences.

The Club's zero tolerance to drugs policy applies to all staff.

Staff must be courteous to all stakeholders of the Club, namely: dancers, other staff and customers.

In consideration of the payment by the DANCER of the LICENSE FEE set out in clause 2 of this agreement, the CLUB agrees to permit the DANCER to enter and remain on the premises on the terms and conditions set out in the clauses below.

- 1.0 At all times whilst on the premises, the dancer shall comply with -
- 1.1 The terms of the clubs license as set out in attachment A to this agreement:
- 1.2 The CLUBS House Rules as set out in attachment B
- 2.0 Subject to clause 1 above, the Dancers may -
- 2.1 Dance for whichever customer as often and in such ways as the Dancer and Customer may agree.
- 2.2 Charge such a fee as the Dancer and Customer may agree:
- Provide such services (e.g. dances, collection of drinks, conversation etc)
- 3.0 The fees payable to the Club by the Dancer for this License shall be as follows -
- 3.1 £20 (twenty pounds Stirling) per evening:
- 3.2 £7 (seven pounds Stirling) per dance:
- 3.3 Any fine levied under the House Rules of the Club as out in the attachment B.
- 4.0 Any fees then due and payable to the club by the Dancer shall be paid to the Manager on duty prior to the Dancer leaving the premises on any evening.

- 5.0 The Dancers warrants and confirms that:
- 5.1 She is over eighteen years of age:

Signed on behalf of the Club

- 5.2 She has never been arrested for and or charged with or convicted of prostitution or any related offences:
- 5.3 She has never been arrested for and or charged with or convicted of the possession or sale of illegal drugs and
- 5.4 She will be responsible for payment of al tax and national insurance payments on income that she earns whilst performing on the premises.
- 6.0 The Club and the Dancer may at any time terminate this license without any liability to the other for such fees under Clause 3 as many then be due by the Dancer to the Club.
- **7.0** For the avoidance of doubt, the dancer and the Club acknowledge and agree that:
- 7.1 The Dancer has no authority to enter into any contract on behalf of the Club;
- 7.2 in contracting with the customer at the Club, the Dancer is acting on her behalf and not on behalf of the Club

Drugs Policy

Medusa Lodge maintains a zero tolerance policy with regard to drugs. The sale, purchase and/or consumption of drugs on Medusa Lodge premises by patrons or employees are strictly forbidden.

Employees are asked to be aware of drug activity, and report any suspicious behaviour to management or a direct supervisor. Employees are never to approach anyone suspected of drug activity.

Illegal drugs are classified, in part, as follows:

- Class A, or 'hard' drugs, including HEROIN (smack, junk, horse, gear), LSD (blotter, micro dots), Ecstasy (E, pills) and Cocaine (Charlie, scniff, coke, crack, line, bump)
- Class B, 'soft' drugs, including Marijuana (pot, weed, grass) and Amphetamines (speed, uppers)

Employees are asked to look for the warning signs of drug dealings and use, including the following:

- Bits of plastic wrap, paper, particularly in the toilets;
- Rolled bank notes
- · Works, including needles, spoons, rubber bands
- The smell of marijuana, metallic or chemical smoke
- More than one person in a toilet stall at one time
- Stumbling, vomiting, nervousness, jumpiness, incoherent speech, involuntary movement of limbs, jaw or tongue, inability to communicate, glazed eyes, profuse sweating etc.
- Any search will include a search/incident reference when customers or staff are suspected of being under the influence/in possession of drugs.
- Regular checks of the toilet areas for signs of drug use, checks to be logged in premises book.
- Poster to be placed in prevolent areas explaining ramifications for drug use on premises. Police will be called and a life ban from the premises.

Medusa Lodge Customer Dispersal Policy

Medusa Lodge accepts that our responsibilities cannot simply end at our front door and that, by contributing to a 'better managed' end of night, we can deliver a safer town centre. We are, therefore, eager to develop, in partnership with the police and council, a dispersal policy which will seek to reduce the pressure on the police at the end of trading, ease customers' passage home and minimise the likelihood of local residents being disturbed.

Transport

Probably the biggest single factor triggering disorder and disturbance is a lack of public and private transport at the end of the evening, preventing the swift dispersal of customers away from the venue. There are a number of steps operators can take to reduce transport related problems:

- We will provide a safe place for customers to wait for taxis (particularly lone females) Our staff will be more than happy to call cabs for customers.
- We will advertise reliable services by providing free phone numbers for licensed mini-cabs and details of nearby taxi ranks, bus timetables or other local transport networks.
- We will agree an operating policy with local private and public hire vehicles (001 taxis), banning the sounding of horns after 11pm and arranging the most suitable pick up drop off point to cause residents the least disturbance.

Car Parking

We will advise customers of the best car park to use through our website so that customers leave in a direction with minimum disturbance to local residents.

Staffing

During the last half hour of trading, the service points in each bar may be reduced and some staff reallocated to collect glasses or work in the cloakroom. This will assist customer departure and reduces the potential for people to carry glassware out of the premises. We will have door supervisors outside of the venue at the end of the night to supervise dispersal.

Cloakroom

The cloakroom will be set up in order to assist the swift return of coats with staffing and control systems increased in the period prior to closure.

Music & Lighting (internal)

During the last 20 minutes of trading, the DJ may typically play slower music and reduce the volume of the music played. In addition, lighting levels can be manipulated to encourage the gradual dispersal of patrons during the last part of trading and the drinking up period.

Lighting (external)

We use of bright lights at the exit of the venue to encourage customers to leave more quietly. We are happy to liaise with the local council to establish guidelines on the positioning of these lights, which will also prompt customers to leave the area quickly and enhance CCTV coverage.

Minimising Noise on Exit

We will position a manager in the area close to the main exit to oversee the end of night departure period. The DJ will make announcements to remind customers to be considerate on leaving the premises. Highly visible notices will be placed in the foyer requesting exiting customers to leave quietly and to respect neighbours and their properties.

Bottles or glasses

No customers will be allowed to leave the premises with bottles or glasses.


Door staff

Our door team will play a key role in the implementation of several aspects of our dispersal policy:

- Encouraging customers to drink-up and progress to the exit within a venue throughout the latter part of drinking-up time:
- Drawing the attention of exiting customers to the notices in the foyer and ask them to be considerate;
- Ensuring the removal of all bottles and glasses from departing customers;
- Actively encouraging customers not to congregate outside the venue; and
- Directing customers to the nearest taxi ranks or other transportation away from the area.


We will work with the local authority and Police to review this policy if / or when issues should arise. This policy is a work in progress.



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1. Introduction

- 1.1 Birmingham City Council ("the Council) is able to regulate sex establishments through Schedule 3 of the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1982 ("the 1982 Act"), in particular sex shops and sex cinemas.
- 1.2 On 6 April 2010 the Policing and Crime Act 2009 ("the 2009 Act") came into force and amended Schedule 3 of the 1982 Act. Sexual Entertainment Venues ("SEVs") were added as a category of sex establishments to enable local authorities to regulate those premises which provide lap dancing, pole dancing, table dancing, strip shows, peep shows and live sex shows and other similar entertainment.
- 1.3 The Council resolved on 12 October 2010 to adopt the new amendments to gain regulatory control of SEVs with effect from 3 January 2011. Consequently, this SEV policy applies to the whole of Birmingham.
- 1.4 The adoption of Schedule 3 allows the Council to prescribe standard conditions and fees for the grant, variation, renewal and transfer of SEV licences and the appropriate number of premises to be licensed in a relevant locality, which may be nil.
- 1.5 The aim of this policy is to provide guidance for prospective applicants, existing licence holders, those who may wish to object to an application and members of the Licensing and Public Protection Committee when making a determination on an application. This policy will be reviewed regularly and revised where necessary.
- 1.6 Each application will be dealt with on its own merits
- 1.7 Consideration will be given to the provisions of the Human Rights Act 1998, the Provision of Services Regulations 2009 and the Home Office guidance issued in March 2010 entitled "Sexual Entertainment Venues Guidance for England and Wales" when considering applications for SEVs.
- 1.8 The Council does not take a moral stance in adopting this policy. The Council recognises that Parliament has made it lawful to operate sex establishments and that such businesses are a legitimate part of the retail and leisure industries. It is the Council's role as a Licensing Authority to regulate such premises in accordance with the law.

2. Sexual Entertainment Venues

- 2.1 An SEV is defined in the 2009 Act as "any premises at which relevant entertainment is provided before a live audience for the financial gain of the organiser or the entertainer".
- 2.2 The meaning of 'relevant entertainment' is "any live performance or live display of nudity which is of such a nature that, ignoring financial gain it must

reasonably be assumed to be provided solely or principally for the purpose of sexually stimulating any member of an audience (whether by verbal or other means)". An audience can consist of just one person.

- 2.3 This definitions would apply to the following forms of entertainment [as they are commonly known]: lap dancing; pole dancing; table dancing; strip shows; peep shows and live sex shows. This list is not exhaustive and should only be treated as indicative. The decision to licence premises as sexual entertainment venues shall depend on the content of the relevant entertainment rather than the name given to it.
- 2.4 The 2009 Act provides exemptions from the definition of SEVs as follows:
 - Sex shops and sex cinemas (which are separately defined in Schedule 3 to the 1982 Act).
 - Premises which provide relevant entertainment on an infrequent basis.
 These are detailed as premises where:
 - (a) no relevant entertainment has been provided on more than 11 occasions within a 12 month period;
 - (b) no such occasion has begun within a period of one month beginning with the end of the previous occasion; and
 - (c) no such occasion has lasted longer than 24 hours.
 - Other premises or types of performances or displays exempted by an order of the Secretary of State.
 - · Private dwellings to which the public are not admitted
- 2.5 Premises which provide regulated entertainment on an infrequent basis will continue to be regulated under the 2003 Act insofar as they are providing regulated entertainment under that Act either by virtue of a premises licence or club premises certificate or a temporary events notice issued under that Act
- 2.6 In practice this means that the vast majority of lap dancing clubs and similar venues will require both a SEV licence for the provision of relevant entertainment and a premises licence or club premises certificate for the sale of alcohol or provisions of other types of regulated entertainment not covered by the definition of relevant entertainment.
- 2.7 Live music or the playing of recorded music which is integral to the provision of relevant entertainment such as lap dancing for which a SEV licence is required is specifically excluded from the definition of regulated entertainment in the 2003 Act. Therefore, a SEV will not require a premises licence or club premises certificate just because it plays recorded music for a performer to dance to.

3. Waivers

3.1 Schedule 3 of the 1982 Act makes provision for the Council to grant a waiver from the requirement to hold a sex establishment licence in any case where it

considers that to require a licence would be unreasonable or inappropriate. A waiver may be for such a period as the Council thinks fit. Applications for waivers will be considered in exceptional circumstances.

3.2 The Council may at any time give a person who would require a licence but for a waiver, notice that the waiver is to terminate on a date not less than 28 days from the date the notice is given.

4. Making an Application

- 4.1 The 1982 Act provides a maximum licence period of one year. The authority may grant a shorter licence if it thinks fit. A shorter period may be granted for example where a licensee wants a licence for a limited period for a trade exhibition or a show.
- 4.2 An application for the **grant, variation, renewal** or **transfer** of a licence must be made in writing to the Licensing Authority together with the application fee in accordance with the requirements set out below.
- 4.3 There are three separate notice requirements:
 - The applicant must, within seven days after the date of the application, publish an advertisement in a local newspaper circulating in the local authority's area. A suggested form of advertisement is available on request from the Licensing Section.
 - Where the application is in respect of premises the applicant must display a notice of the application on or near the premises where it can be conveniently read by the public. The notice must be displayed for 21 days starting with the date of application. Again a suggested form of notice is available on request.
 - 3. The applicant must send a copy of the application to the Chief Officer of Police no later than seven days after the date of the application. Where the application is made electronically it is for the Local Authority itself to send the copy within seven days of receipt of the application.
- 4.4 The application form can be used for grant, variation, transfer and renewal applications. Applicants must provide their name, address, age (where the applicant is an individual), the premises address and the proposed licensed name of the premises.
- 4.5 Applicants must, at the time of submission of a new grant or variation application, provide a scheme showing the exterior design for consideration by the Licensing Authority before the premises are opened for business in order to ensure that exterior design of the premises complies with the Standard Conditions of Licence.

- 4.6 In addition applicants must, at the time of submission of a new grant or variation application, provide a plan showing the interior layout of the premises and where relevant entertainment will take place for consideration by the Licensing Authority.
- 4.7 Applicants for SEVs must also submit a copy of their "club rules" and customer code of conduct. Such club rules must contain the required conduct of performers.
- 4.8 Such club rules will form part of the conditions of licence (if granted) and may be subject to amendment by the Licensing Authority prior to approval.
- 4.9 Applicants must provide evidence to the satisfaction of the Licensing Service of the registration for, and payment of business rates for the premises in question at the time of application.
- 4.9 Officers of the Licensing Service may, as part of the application process, visit the relevant locality of the premises to establish and report on whether there are any characteristics of the locality which may require consideration by the Licensing and Public Protection Committee.
- 4.10 Officers of the Licensing Service may also consult with colleagues from other Departments such as Planning
- 4.11 With regards to online application tacit authorisation does not apply to applications for SEV licences. This means the applicant must wait for the Licensing Authority to determine the application before they can operate a SEV.

5. Fees

- 5.1 The 1982 Act permits the authority to set a reasonable fee. Fees for Sex Establishments are reviewed annually by the Licensing and Public Protection Committee and set at a level appropriate to recover the costs of carrying out the licensing function under that Act namely: administration (including any hearings or appeals), inspection and compliance.
- 5.2 The above process is also applicable to the function of licensing SEVs and the appropriate fees for applications can be found on the Council's website at: www.birmingham.gov.uk/licensingfeesandcharges.
- 5.3 Application fees must be paid in full at the time of submission of the application.

6. Making Objections to Applications

6.1 The 1982 Act permits a wide range of persons to raise objections about the grant, renewal, variation or transfer of a SEV licence. Objectors can include residents, resident associations, trade associations, businesses, Councillors (providing they do not sit on the Licensing and Public Protection Committee),

regulatory agencies such as Planning and Environmental Health, or MPs. The Police are a statutory consultee for all applications.

- 6.2 Objections must be made in writing (email is acceptable) no later than 28 days after the date of the application to the Licensing Authority and should include the following:
 - the name and address of the person or organisation making the objection;
 - the premises to which the objection relates;
 - the proximity of the premises to the person making the objection, a sketch map or plan may be helpful to show this.
- 6.3 Objectors should limit their objection to matters which are relevant to the statutory grounds for refusal as set out in the 1982 Act. The relevant grounds for objection are:
 - That the applicant is unsuitable to hold an SEV Licence;
 - That the SEV, if granted would be carried on for the benefit of person/s who would be refused an SEV licence if they had applied themselves;
 - That the layout, character or condition of the premises are inappropriate for the proposed SEV;
 - That the use of the premises as an SEV would be inappropriate due to the use of premises in the vicinity;
 - That the use of the premises as an SEV would be inappropriate due to the character of the relevant locality; and/or
 - That the number of sex establishments or sex establishments of a particular type is inappropriate in the relevant locality.

Any objections received by the Licensing Authority which do not relate to the grounds set out in the 1982 Act will be rejected by the Licensing Service.

- 6.4 The courts have consistently stated that moral objections are inadmissible in such applications and will therefore be rejected.
- 6.5 Objections will be considered by the Licensing and Public Protection Committee determining the application. The applicant will be informed of any objections received in respect of their application and the objection(s) will become public documents. (However, objector's personal details such as name, address and telephone number will be removed.) A copy of the hearing procedure will be sent to the applicant and any objectors prior to the hearing.

7. Determination of an Application

7.1 All applications for the grant of a SEV licence will be determined by the Licensing and Public Protection Committee. Valid objections to any application will be considered by the Licensing Committee or delegated to a Licensing Sub Committee at the hearing to consider the application.

Applicants and objectors will be given an equal opportunity to state their case in accordance with the Licensing and Public Protection Committee's procedure for hearings, which is available from the Licensing Service.

7.2 The 1982 Act provides five mandatory grounds and four discretionary grounds for refusal of a SEV licence. Each application for a SEV will be decided upon its own merits and the Licensing Authority will give clear reasons for its decisions. Any decision to refuse a licence MUST be relevant to one or more of the following grounds:

7.3 Mandatory grounds for refusal

Specific mandatory grounds for refusal of a licence are set out in paragraph 12(1) (a to e) of Schedule 3 in the 1982 Act. A licence cannot be granted:

- (a) to any person under the age of 18 years;
- (b) to any person who is for the time being disqualified due to the person having had a previous licence revoked in the area of the appropriate authority within the last 12 months;
- (c) to any person, other than a body corporate, who is not resident in an EEA State or was not so resident throughout the period of six months immediately preceding the date when the application was made; or
- (d) to a body corporate which is not incorporated in an EEA State; or
- (e) to any person who has, within a period of 12 months immediately preceding that date when the application was made, been refused that grant or renewal of a licence for the premises, vehicle, vessel or stall in respect of which the application is made, unless the refusal has been reversed on appeal.

7.4 Discretionary grounds for refusal

The only discretionary grounds upon which the Council may refuse an application for the grant or renewal of a licence on one or more of the grounds specified in Schedule 3 paragraph 12(3) are that:

- (a) the applicant is unsuitable to hold the licence by reason of having been convicted of an offence or for any other reasons;
- (b) if the licence were to be granted, renewed or transferred the business to which it relates would be managed by or carried on for the benefit of a person, other than the applicant, who would be refused the grant, renewal or transfer of such a licence if he/she made the application himself/herself;
- (c) the number of sex establishments, or of sex establishments of a particular kind, in the relevant locality at the time the application is made is equal to or exceeds the number which the authority consider is appropriate for the locality;
- (d) the grant or renewal of the licence would be inappropriate, having regard:
 - (i) to the character of the relevant locality; or
 - (ii) to the use to which any premises in the vicinity are put; or
 - (iii) to the layout, character or condition of the premises, vehicle, vessel or stall in respect of which the application is made.

8. Suitability of an Applicant

- 8.1 In respect of 7.4(a) and (b) above with regard to the suitability of an applicant to hold a licence, the criteria for Members to consider include, but are not limited to:
 - that the operator is honest
 - that the operator is qualified by experience to run the type of sex establishment in question
 - that the operator understands the general conditions
 - that the operator is proposing a management structure which delivers compliance with the operating conditions e.g. through managerial competence, presence, a credible management structure, enforcement of rules internally, a viable business plan and policies for welfare of performers
 - that the operator can be relied upon to act in the best interests of performers e.g. in how they are remunerated, the facilities they enjoy, how they are protected and how and by whom their physical and psychological welfare is monitored
 - that the operator can be relied upon to protect the public e.g. transparent charging, freedom from solicitation
 - that the operator can show a track record of management of compliant premises, or that he/she will employ individuals who have such a track record
 - Compliance with other regulatory and taxation schemes

9. Suitability of Premises

- 9.1 The Council would expect that when an application for an SEV licence at permanent commercial property is made, that the applicant will be able to demonstrate that the layout, character and/or condition of the premises is appropriate to the relevant entertainment proposed at the premises.
- 9.2 The Council would expect that when an application for an SEV licence at permanent commercial property is made, that property should have the appropriate planning consent.

10. Use of Premises in the Vicinity

- 10.1 In considering the grant, renewal or variation of the licence would be inappropriate to the use which any premises in the vicinity are put, the Licensing Authority shall consider, among other considerations:
 - (a) the fact that the premises are sited in a residential area;
 - (b) the premises are sited near shops used by or directed to families or children, or no frontages frequently passed by the same;
 - the premises are sited near properties which are sensitive for religious purposes e.g. synagogues, churches, mosques, temples;
 - (d) the premises are sited near premises or areas which are sensitive because they are frequented by children, young persons or families, including but not limited to educational establishments, leisure facilities

- such as parks, libraries or swimming pools, markets and covered markets:
- (e) the premises are sited near places and or buildings of historical/cultural interest, tourist attractions.
- (f) the premises are sited near civic buildings

11. Character of the Relevant Locality

- 11.1 With reference to paragraph 8.4(d) 'relevant locality' for the purposes of paragraph 12 of Schedule 3 of the Act means:
 - (i) in relation to the premises, the locality where they are situated, and
 - (ii) in relation to a vehicle, vessel or stall, any locality where it is desired to use it as a Sexual Entertainment Venue.
- 11.2 In considering if the grant, renewal or variation of the licence would be inappropriate, having regard to the character of the relevant locality or to the use of which any premises in the vicinity are put, the Licensing Authority shall consider, among other considerations, whether the grant of the application would be inappropriate, having regard to:
 - (a) the fact that the premises are sited in a residential area;
 - (b) the premises are sited near shops used by or directed to families or children, or no frontages frequently passed by the same;
 - (c) the premises are sited near properties which are sensitive for religious purposes e.g. synagogues, churches, mosques, temples;
 - (d) the premises are sited near premises or areas which are sensitive because they are frequented by children, young persons or families, including but not limited to educational establishments, leisure facilities such as parks, libraries or swimming pools, markets and covered markets:
 - (e) the premises are sited near places and or buildings of historical/cultural interest, tourist attractions.
 - (f) the premises are sited near civic buildings
- 11.3 The Council will consider relevant locality on a case by case basis taking into account the particular circumstances of each case. However, the Council will not seek to define locality as the whole of the Council's administrative area or an entire town.

12. Appropriate Number of Sexual Entertainment Venues

12.1 As set out within paragraph 7.4(c) above, paragraph 12 of Schedule 3 provides that a Local Authority may refuse an application if it is satisfied that the number of sex establishments or sex establishments of a particular kind in the relevant locality at the time the application is made is equal to or exceeds the number which the authority consider is appropriate for that locality. The Council is able to determine that the appropriate number for a locality is nil.

- 12.2 The Council may choose to set an upper limit guide on the number of SEVs which it considers appropriate in any area within the Council's administrative control. Each application MUST in any event be considered on its merits at the time the application is determined by the local authority.
- 12.3 The Council considers that the City Centre, being that part of the City which falls within the ring road (A4540) is an area in which it is appropriate to have an upper limit guide on the number of SEVs within it. The Council considers the appropriate upper limit for this area is eight.

13. Conditions

- 13.1 When issuing an SEV licence the Licensing Authority is permitted to issue it on such terms and conditions and subject to restrictions as specified at the time the licence is issued either in the form of conditions specific to the individual or standard conditions applicable to all SEVs.
- 13.2 The Council has decided to produce regulations prescribing standard conditions and these shall apply to every licence granted, varied, renewed or transferred by the authority unless they have been expressly excluded or varied. These regulations are attached to this policy at Annex A.
- 13.3 It is an offence to operate an SEV without a licence or contravene a condition of the licence. The maximum penalty upon conviction is £20,000

14. Renewal Applications

- 14.1 Provided an application for renewal has been accepted by the Licensing Service prior to the date of expiry, the licence shall be deemed to remain in force until such time as the renewal is determined by the Council, or the application is withdrawn.
- 14.2 The statutory requirements for advertising and giving notice, are the same as those applying to initial grants, which are dealt with at paragraphs 5-13. Renewal applications will be dealt with by way of delegated authority to officers, unless there are any objections or other matters of concern, in which case, the application will be heard by the Committee.

15. Revocation of a Sexual Entertainment Venue Licence

- 15.1 A licence can be revoked by the Council at any time on any one of the grounds set out in 7.3(a e) or any one of the grounds set out in 7.4(a and b) of the policy.
- 15.2 The Council will not revoke a licence without the licence holder being given an opportunity to appear before the Licensing and Public Protection Committee and be heard.
- 15.3 Where a licence is revoked, the Council shall give the licensee a statement in writing of reasons for its decision within seven days of the request being

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- made. Where a licence is revoked its holder will be disqualified from holding or obtaining a licence in the area of the Local Authority for a period of 12 months from the date of revocation.
- 15.4 When the authority revokes a licence, the decision does not take effect until the time for bringing an appeal has expired and if an appeal is brought until the determination or abandonment of that appeal.

16. Cancellation of a Sexual Entertainment Venue Licence

- 16.1 The Council may at the written request of the licence holder cancel the licence.
- 16.2 If a licence holder dies then the licence will be deemed to have been granted to the licence holder's personal representatives and will remain in force for three months from the date of the licence holder's death and will then expire.
- 16.3 The Council can, however, on the application of the licence holder's personal representatives extend the three month period if the Council is satisfied that an extension is necessary for the purpose of winding up the late licence holder's estate. The Council will only do so where there are no circumstances that make such an extension undesirable.

17. Variation of a Sexual Entertainment Venue Licence

- 17.1 A licence holder may at any time apply to vary a term, condition or restriction of a licence or apply to change the location of a licensed vessel. The statutory requirements for advertising, giving notice, consideration by the Council, hearings and the giving of the reasons are the same as those applying to initial grants, which are dealt with at paragraphs 5-12. On receiving such an application, the Council can either:
 - (a) make the variation as requested;
 - (b) make such variations as it thinks fit;
 - (c) refuse the application.
- 17.2 The applicant will be given an opportunity to attend a Licensing and Public Protection Committee before a decision is made to make a variation other than that being applied for or to refuse the application.
- 17.3 Where the Council imposes some other term, condition or restriction other than one sought in the variation application, the decision does not take effect until the time for bringing an appeal has expired and if an appeal is brought until the determination or abandonment of that appeal.

18. Right to Appeal a Decision

- 18.1 The decisions against which a right of appeal lies are refusals for the grants, renewals, variations or transfers, the imposition of conditions and also revocation.
- 18.2 Appeals must be made to the Magistrates Court within 21 days, starting from the date the applicant is notified of the Licensing Authority's decision.
- 18.3 It is important to note that appeals only lie against the mandatory refusals on the basis that the mandatory ground does not apply to the applicant/licence holder. Further, no appeal lies against the Licensing Authority's decision made on the discretionary grounds set out at paragraphs 7.4(c and d), namely:
 - that it is inappropriate to grant or renew a licence on the grounds of the character of the locality or the number of premises in it; or
 - the use of premises in the vicinity or the layout, character or condition of the premises.
- 18.4 The only discretionary grounds against which an appeal lies are those in paragraph 7.4(a and b) relating to the suitability of the applicant, the manager and/or the beneficiary of the operation.

ANNEX A

BIRMINGHAM CITY COUNCIL

STANDARD CONDITIONS FOR SEXUAL ENTERTAINMENT VENUES (SEV)

These regulations are made under paragraph 13(1) of Schedule 3 to the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1982 (the "1982 Act") as amended by the Policing and Crime Act 2009 (the "2009 Act") to prescribe conditions. In these Regulations, except when the context otherwise requires, the following expressions shall have the following meanings:

- (i) "The Council" shall mean the Birmingham City Council and all enquiries concerning these Regulations and its conditions shall be directed to Licensing Section, Crystal Court, Aston Cross Business Village, 50 Rocky Lane, Aston, Birmingham, B6 5RQ, 0121 303 9896. licensing@birmingham.gov.uk
- (ii) These conditions apply to all premises licensed as a "sexual entertainment venue" as defined by the said 1982 Act that is to say terms, conditions and restrictions on or subject to which licences under Schedule 3 of the 1982 Act are in general to be granted, renewed, varied or transferred.
- (iii) "Sexual Entertainment Venue" ('SEV') means any premises at which relevant entertainment is provided before a live audience, directly or indirectly for the financial gain of the organiser or the entertainer.
- (iv) "Premises" includes any vessel, vehicle or stall but does not include any private dwelling to which the public is not admitted.
- (v) 'Relevant Entertainment' means any live performance or any live display of nudity which is of such a nature that, ignoring financial gain, it must reasonably be assumed to be provided solely or principally for the purpose of

- sexually stimulating any member of the audience (whether by verbal or other means).
- (vi) The Council may at any time waive, modify or vary these conditions or impose additional special conditions in any particular case.
- (vii) If the Licensee wishes any of the terms of the licence to be varied an application must be made to the Council.
- (viii) In the event of a conflict between the prescribed conditions and special conditions contained in a SEV licence the special conditions shall prevail.

OPENING HOURS

The licensed premises shall not be open or used for the purposes for which
the licence is granted except between the hours prescribed within the licence
or those hours of operation determined by the Licensing and Public Protection
Committee.

WINDOW, FASCIA BOARD ADVERTISEMENT AND DISPLAYS

- Save for the entrance lobby, the interior of the premises shall not be visible to
 passers-by and to that intent the licensee shall ensure the area of the
 premises in which relevant entertainment is offered shall not be capable of
 being seen from outside the premises.
- 3. The windows, doors, fascia board, walls and all external parts of the premises including the roof shall not contain any form of writing, sign or display save for:
 - (a) The address of the premises.
 - (b) The licensed name of the premises.
 - (c) A notice stating the opening hours of the establishment.
 - (d) In the case of a licence granted to a body corporate:

- (i) If the premises name is not the same as the full name of the body corporate then such corporate name and;
- (ii) If the premises are also the body's registered office for the purposes of the Companies Acts then an indication in a form acceptable to the company that such is the case.
- 4. The lettering used in respect of such permitted items shall be of such colour and style as may be approved by the Council.
- 5. The licensee shall not permit the display outside of the premises of photographs or other images, which indicate or suggest that relevant entertainment takes place in the premises.

LICENSED NAME

- 6. At the time of granting the licence in respect of the premises the Council will authorise a name referred to as "The Licensed Name" by which it is intended that the premises shall be known and the licensee shall ensure that the premises are known solely by that name and by no other, save as provided for by the paragraph below.
- 7. To change the licensed name, an application shall be made to the Council not less than 28 days prior to the proposed change and the Council shall have an absolute and unfettered discretion to allow or refuse such change.

EXHIBITION OF LICENCE

- a) A copy of the licence (two pages) shall be suitably framed and exhibited in a position that can easily be read by all persons entering the premises.
 - b) The conditions of licence and all such documents listed as Appendices to said licence shall be retained in a clean and legible condition and immediately available for inspection by anyone who so requests.

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9. The licensee shall retain a copy of a form signed by each employee and performer confirming that they have read and understood the licence and conditions. The copy shall be retained for a period of six months after they cease work at the premises. A copy of the licence and conditions shall be given to each performer.

RESPONSIBILITY OF THE LICENSEE

- 10. The licensee or a responsible person over 18 years of age nominated by them in writing for the purpose of managing the SEV in their absence shall be in charge of and upon the premises during the whole time they are open to the public.
- 11. The written nomination referred to in condition 10 above shall be maintained in a daily register, kept on the premises and made continuously available for inspection by an officer authorised by the Council or police officer.
- 12. The person in charge shall not be engaged in any duties that will prevent them from exercising general supervision and they shall be assisted as necessary by suitable adult persons to ensure adequate supervision.
- 13. The licensee must ensure that there is a current insurance policy in force to cover the performers whilst the premises are open and that a copy is displayed in areas where all staff have access.

EMPLOYEES AND MANAGEMENT STAFF

14. The licensee shall keep and maintain at the licensed premises a written record of the names, addresses, and copies of photographic proof of age documents of all persons employed or performers permitted to operate within the licensed premises whether upon a full or part time basis and shall, upon request by an authorised officer of the Council or police officer, make such

- records available for inspection to them. (see Conditions regarding Door Supervisors)
- 15. Condition 14 does not relate to persons engaged to carry out repairs or provide services from external companies to the premises, however, such persons must be aged 18 years and over if the premises are open for the purpose of providing sexual entertainment.
- 16. The licensee shall ensure that all persons employed or permitted to work within the licensed premises hold the appropriate rights to work and shall keep copies of any documentation used to verify the details of these rights where necessary.
- 17. The licensee shall maintain a register of the names, addresses and dates of birth of such person or persons (whether employees or otherwise connected with the business) who have authority to manage the premises in the licensee's absence.
- 18. Where the licensee is a body corporate or an unincorporated body any change of director, company secretary or other person responsible for the management of the body is to be notified to the Licensing Authority

CHANGE OF LOCATION AND ALTERATIONS TO PREMISES

- 19. Where the licensed premises is a vessel or stall, the licensee shall not move the licensed vessel or stall from the location specified in the licence unless a variation application is submitted for the Council's determination giving not less than 28 days notice. n.b. this requirement shall not apply to a vessel or stall which habitually operates from a fixed location but which is regularly moved (whether under its own propulsion or otherwise) from another place such location as is specified in the licence.
- 20. Alterations or additions, either internal or external and whether permanent or temporary, to the structures, lighting or layout of the premises as shown on

the plan, including any change in the permitted signs on display shall not be made except with the prior approval of the Council.

CLUB RULES

- Any club rules imposed on the performers shall be displayed in a prominent position within the premises for all employees to have easy access whilst at work.
- 22. A copy of the club rules shall be provided to performers engaged by the premises by means of a written contract signed by the recipient. Copies of the same must be retained on the premises and produced to an authorised officer of the Council or police officer on request.

FEES

23. Receipts or records of payments received should be provided to performers where "house fees" are charged or when any fines are issued.

PERFORMANCES

- 24. No person under the age of 18 shall be permitted to be on the licensed premises when sexual entertainment is provided. A notice shall be clearly displayed at the entrance to the premises in a prominent position stating that "No person under 18 will be admitted when sexual entertainment is being provided" so that it can be easily read by persons entering the premises.
- 25. Each area where relevant entertainment is conducted shall be supervised and/or contain a panic alarm for the safety of performers.
- 26. A customer code of conduct shall be prominently displayed in each area to which the public are admitted.
- 27. Performers shall be aged not less than 18 years.

- 28. Full nudity is only permitted in the approved designated areas, as stipulated or shown on the approved plan attached to the licence. In all other public areas within the premises the performers and employees must at all times wear at least a G string (female) and or pouch (male) covering the genitalia
- 29. During all performances (including performances usually termed 'private dances') there must not be any deliberate contact, by the performer, with any patron or person within the audience except:
 - Leading a patron by the hand to and from a chair or private room or designated dance area.
 - b). Simple handshake greeting at the beginning and/or end of the performance.
 - c). A customary ("peck on the cheek") kiss at the end of the performance.
 - d). the placing of monetary notes or dance vouchers into the hand or garter worn by the performer.
- No performances shall include any sex act involving any other persons or objects (or involve any form of auto-erotic stimulation).
- 31. A price list shall be displayed in a prominent position giving the price and the duration of any 'private dances'.
- 32. Any person employed to supervise or attend to the exterior or entrance area of the premises must, at all times be suitably and sensibly dressed so as not to indicate or suggest the nature of the relevant entertainment taking place at the premises.
- 33. No fastening or lock of any description shall be fitted upon any booth or cubicle or other area within the premises except as shown on the plan; within the toilets, within the performers' dressing rooms and/or staff areas.

- 34. At all times during a performance, performers shall have unrestricted access to a dressing room.
- 35. Patrons or members of the audience shall not take photographs or record digital images of performers within the premises via a camera or mobile phones

DOOR SUPERVISORS

- 36. The licensee shall ensure all door supervisors employed or contracted to work on the premises are suitably licensed by The Security Industry Authority or appropriate agency.
- 37. Where door staff are used, the licensee shall maintain profiles for all door staff that are, or have been, working at the premises in the last six months. The profile is to contain proof of identity (copy of passport /photo driving licence) and proof of address dated within the last six months (bank statement /utility bill). Separate proof of address is not necessary when the proof of identity is a photo driving licence. All profiles are to be made immediately available to Authorised Officers upon request.
- 38. An adequate number of licensed door supervisors, based on a risk assessment undertaken by the licensee, shall be on duty on the premises whilst relevant entertainment takes place.
- 39. At least one door supervisor shall be on duty at the premises at all times when the relevant entertainment takes place.

CCTV

40. CCTV shall be installed in each room within the premises where the public has access save for the toilet and staff only areas. All cameras shall continuously record whilst the premises are open to the public and recordings shall be kept available for a minimum of twenty-eight days.

- 41. A member of staff who is fully trained in the use of the CCTV system shall be on duty at all times when the premises are open until the premises are clear of customers.
- 42. The premises will provide copies of any recordings upon request by a police officer or an authorised officer of the Council within 24 hours of the request.

TOUTING FOR BUSINESS AWAY FROM THE PREMISES.

- 43. The licensee shall not allow the use of vehicles including limousines for the promotion of the relevant entertainment.
- 44. The collection of patrons and or potential clients is not permitted unless the vehicle is licensed in accordance with the provisions of the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1976.
- 45. The licensee shall not permit any person whilst on a public thoroughfare to encourage any other person to visit the SEV premises by any means.
- 46. The licensee shall endeavour to ensure any marketing communications associated with the SEV or relevant entertainment shall comply with the code of practice as issued by the Advertising Standards Authority.

ADMISSION OF AUTHORISED OFFICERS


47. Officers of the Council, Police, and other authorised agencies who are furnished with authorities (which will be produced on request) shall be admitted immediately to all parts of the premises at all reasonable times and at any time the premises are open for business.

LICENSING AUTHORITY POLICIES, PROCEDURES AND DELEGATIONS

1. <u>Summary</u>

- 1.1 This report outlines the policies, procedures and delegations, which have been built up over a number of years in relation to licensing and registration issues, allowing the Licensing Authority to delegate the bulk of the administration associated with the licensing regime to be carried out by Officers.
- 1.2 It also ensures that the Committee itself acts in a manner which is as open and consistent as circumstances allow.
- 1.3 The report consolidates existing policy, procedures and delegations and updates those policies in line with current working practices, it also contains links to relevant policy documents, conditions and byelaws to provide a more complete overview of the Licensing Functions.
- 1.4 The format of the report has been revised for ease of reference. The report does not contain any proposed amendments to existing policies.

2. Recommendations

- 2.1 That the Committee notes the policies approved by City Council:
 - relating to the Gambling Act 2005 and approved in 2016
 - regarding Sexual Entertainment Venues and approved in 2014;
 - relating to the Licensing Act 2003 and approved in 2015.
- 2.2 That the Committee approves the policies and procedures and delegations contained in the report.

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3. <u>Background</u>

- 3.1 The City Council has a number of licensing, regulatory and registration powers and duties and the exercise of these powers and duties are delegated to the Licensing and Public Protection Committee. The granting and issuing of specific licences, permits and registrations is delegated to the Director of Regulation and Enforcement on the understanding that any applications giving rise to concern or difficulty may be referred to the Licensing and Public Protection Committee or its sub-committees for determination where appropriate.
- 3.2 The Licensing Service is responsible for the administration of grants, renewals and transfers as appropriate of hackney carriage and private hire vehicles, drivers and operators licences and for issuing licences under the Licensing Act 2003 and Gambling Act 2005, sex establishment and animal welfare legislation, and issuing permits for charitable collections and massage and special treatments etc. as well as the associated variations, amendments and transfers, which are carried out under policies delegated by your Committee.
- 3.3 The office of the Licensing Service is situated at 1-3 Ashted Lock, Birmingham Science Park, Dartmouth Middleway, Birmingham, B7 4AZ.
- 3.4 The format of the report has been revised for ease of reference. The report does not contain any proposed amendments to existing policies.

4. Licensing and Public Protection Committee

- 4.1 The licensing function of the City Council is disposed of through the processes and procedures of the Licensing and Public Protection Committee, sub-committees and officers by virtue of the Local Government Acts and other relevant statutory provisions.
- 4.2 The Court of Appeal stated in the "Hope and Glory" case (2011) that the licensing function of the licensing authority is an administrative function, by contrast with the function of the magistrates, which is a judicial function. The Court of Appeal said this:

"The licensing authority has a duty, in accordance with the rule of law, to behave fairly in the decision-making procedure, but the decision itself is not a judicial or quasi-judicial act. It is the exercise of power delegated by the people as a whole to decide what the public interest requires."

This means that it must act in accordance with the two rules of natural justice. These are firstly that everyone has a right to be heard and secondly the rule against bias.

4.3 The right to be heard requires that a person directly affected by the matter under consideration must be given a fair opportunity both to state his/her case and to know of and to respond to any objections.

4.4 The rule against bias prohibits members participating in any decision if they have a financial or other interest in the outcome. Members will be familiar with this requirement from their general duties as Councillors.

4.5 Further guidance on the determination of matters concerning licensing appears at Annexe 1.

4.6 The provisions as set out in the appendices to this report summarise your Committee's policies in respect of the activities it licences.

5. Consultation

5.1 This report seeks to reproduce in one document a number of policies which have been implemented over a number of years. It does not seek to introduce any new policies, nor revise any existing policies.

6. <u>Implications for Resources</u>

6.1 It is the responsibility of the Committee Chairman and the Director of Regulation and Enforcement to ensure the services provided by the Committee are contained within the approved budget.

6.2 In relation to Village Greens there is an annual budget allocation of £50,000 associated with this function.

7. Implications for Policy Priorities

7.1 The issues addressed in this report relate to the City Council priorities associated with creating a cleaner, greener and safer city and providing excellent services.

8. Implications for Equality and Diversity

8.1 The matters identified in this report are in accordance with Regulation and Enforcement's enforcement policies which ensure that equality issues have been addressed.

Since March 2001 licensed hackney carriage and private hire drivers in England have been under a duty to carry guide, hearing and other prescribed assistance dogs in their vehicles without additional charge. Drivers can apply for an exemption from the duty on medical grounds if they have a condition that is aggravated by contact with dogs to allow them to continue in the trade. GENERAL LICENSING

The General Licensing Team is responsible for a wide range of licensing functions, which include sales of alcohol, late night refreshment, regulated entertainment, sex establishments, charitable collections, scrap metal and gambling premises.





Administration of the Animal Welfare licensing function is under the remit of Environmental Health. The Senior Animal Welfare Officer and the administration team are located at Garretts Green. Inspection and enforcement is carried out by the Senior Animal Welfare Officer.

Massage and Special Treatment Establishments Birmingham City Council Act 1990.

- Only a very small number of local authorities in the country have similar powers. The
 legislation was originally aimed at controlling massage and various treatments which could
 carry a health and safety risk to the public, e.g. water borne disease and exposure to UV
 rays. The Act has led to a whole range of premises being included, from health and fitness
 centres to hairdressing salons.
- Anyone conducting an establishment for treatment by way of massage is required to be licensed; other forms of treatment also include Solaria, Therapeutic Spa Baths, Sauna, Turkish Baths, Aromatherapy massage and Herbal Baths.
- Each licensed premises is subject to an annual visit by a Licensing Enforcement Officer.
- When considering applications for licences consultation is carried out with West Midlands Police. There are also statutory requirements placed on applicants to post notices on the premises giving passers-by opportunity to comment or object.
- All licences are subject to a set of conditions which regulate the manner in which the premises must be operated.



Sex Establishments

Schedule 3 to the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1982 (the "Act").

The Act gives local authorities the adoptive powers to control sex establishments which are defined as a sex shop, a sex cinema or a sexual entertainment venue (SEV)

Sex Shops and Sex Cinemas

A sex shop is a premises used for a business, which consists, to a significant degree, of selling what are termed sex articles. These commonly include magazines, DVDs and different forms of sex aids.

A sex cinema is any premises used to a significant degree for showing of films, which are concerned primarily with, or relate to, or are intended to stimulate or encourage sexual activity.

The key words in the statutory definition are the words "to a significant degree". This is not defined by the Act but case law suggests 'significant' implies a higher standard than 'more than trifling'. In almost all cases the ratio between the sexual and other aspects of the business would be material: the absolute quantity of sales, the character of the remainder of the business, the nature of the display and the nature of the articles themselves are all considerations. No single factor is decisive and the Committee must decide which considerations are material and what weight to attach to them.

When considering applications for licences consultation is carried out with West Midlands Police, Ward Councillors and the Licensing Enforcement Team. There are also statutory requirements placed on applicants to advertise in the local press and post notices on the premises giving passers-by opportunity to comment or object.

The criteria for consideration are:

- the suitability of the applicant;
- whether the person applying will actually be responsible for operating the business
- the location and suitability of the premises; and
- whether the number of sex establishments within that locality is equal to or exceeds the number which the Council considers appropriate for the area.

Other than where the suitability of the applicant is concerned, there is no automatic right of appeal against a decision to refuse a licence and, therefore, an applicant's only remedy would normally be by way of judicial review.



Sex Shop Conditions



Sexual Entertainment Venues

A Sexual Entertainment Venue (SEV) is defined as "any premises at which relevant entertainment is provided before a live audience for the financial gain of the organiser or the entertainer".

The meaning of 'relevant entertainment' is "any live performance or live display of nudity which is of such nature that it must reasonably be assumed to be provided solely or principally for the purpose of sexually stimulating any member of an audience (whether by verbal or other means)".

These definitions would apply to the following forms of entertainment as they are commonly known: lap dancing; pole dancing; strip shows; peep shows; and live sex shows.

The legislation provides exemptions from the definitions of SEVs as follows:

- Sex shops and sex cinemas (these are separately defined in Schedule 3 to the 1982 Act).
- Premises which provide relevant entertainment on an infrequent basis.

These are detailed as premises where:

- no relevant entertainment has been provided on more than 11 occasions within a 12 month period
- no such occasion has begun within a period of one month beginning with the end of the previous occasion; and
- no such occasion has lasted longer than 24 hours.

On 12th October 2010, Birmingham City Council resolved to adopt the provisions to control SEVs. A separate Sexual Entertainment Venue Policy, to apply to the whole of Birmingham, was published and became effective from 3 January 2011.

This Policy is was revised in October 2014 and was effective since 1 November 2014. .

The Sexual Entertainment Venue Policy document contains full details of the licensing regime applicable to Birmingham including application procedures, standard conditions and delegations. The Standard conditions were revised with effect from 1st November 2014 (on all licences granted or renewed after that date).



Charitable Street Collections



Police, Factories etc., (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1916.

The Act prescribes Regulations, which govern the conduct of collections being made for charitable or other purposes in any street or public place.

This could include a collecting box or tin, or even the sale of any articles or magazines where there is a representation at the point of sale that part of the proceeds are being applied to charitable or other purposes.

Organisations do not have to be a registered charity but checks are made to ascertain that the organisation is genuine, and for new organisations or charities, copies of the latest accounts may be requested. Details of the promoter are forwarded to the West Midlands Police to afford them the opportunity to comment on the suitability of the applicant. The promoter of the collection or permit holder is also required to submit a return within one month of the collection taking place to show the amount collected and details of how the proceeds have been applied particularly on expenses.

In September each year, an advertisement is placed on the Birmingham City Council website inviting applications to be lodged by 1 November for the following year. In order to allow for a fair opportunity of collection dates for all prospective charitable organisations, applications are restricted to either one collection that covers the "whole city" or two

separate dates for a selection of districts.

All applications received by 1 November each year are given priority for dates and areas and efforts are made to allocate preferred dates to each of the individual organisations. To avoid any clash of interest permits are not granted to two separate organisations to collect in the same place on the same day. For those organisations applying later than 1 November, applications are allocated on a first come first served basis provided that the requested date and area is still available.

"Face to face" fundraising usually relates to the collection of direct debits / standing orders from shoppers/pedestrians. Such appeals are normally conducted by professional fundraising companies that are remunerated by charities. Where a professional fundraiser is involved in a charitable street collection on behalf of a charity, our procedures require that a copy of the statutory fundraising agreement is submitted with the application as this gives details of the costs of the fundraising.

Under the Model Street Collection Regulations, "no payment shall be made out of the proceeds of a collection, directly or indirectly, to any other person connected with the promotion or conduct of the collection other than payments which have been specifically approved by the Council."

All such face-to-face street collection applications are, therefore, referred to Committee for consideration with the expectation that an applicant demonstrates how any potential donors are made fully aware of the remuneration costs involved and the relationship between the company and the charity.

There is no right of appeal against the refusal to grant a street collection permit.

The Charities Act 2006 was introduced to change the way in which charitable collections were regulated, however, the Act was implemented in phases and to date the provisions relating to public charitable collections have still not been introduced.

It should be noted that a part of the Charities Act 2006 that was introduced, amended the Charities Act 1992 in relation to the statement required to be made by professional fundraisers when raising money for particular charitable institutions. The statement must give the method by which the fundraiser's remuneration in connection of the appeal is determined and the notifiable amount of that remuneration.

House to House Collections

House to House Collections Act 1939.

Whereas street collection permits are normally issued to cover a period of one or two days, a house to house collection licence can be granted for any period up to one year. With regard to vetting and checking to ascertain whether the organisation applying is genuine or not, the same procedures apply as for street collections.

There is a requirement for the promoter of the collection to make a return following the collection.

Collections generally take place from door to door or from one public house to another.

Some of the larger well-known charities such as British Red Cross, Christian Aid, Shelter,
RNLI etc., have a Government exemption from having to apply for a licence, but most of the
smaller, and particularly local groups and organisations need a licence before they can
collect money (or articles which they intend to give away or sell later), from door to door.

As with the procedure for street collections, where a charitable organisation is utilising the

services of a professional fundraising company, our procedures require that a copy of the statutory fundraising agreement is submitted with the application.

Unlike street collections, there is a statutory right of appeal against the refusal to grant a house to house collection licence. In this case, the right of appeal is to the Secretary of State, and the grounds for refusal are set out in the Act.

Skin Piercers

Alcohol Restricted Areas (Designated Public Place Orders (DPPO))

The Criminal Justice and Police Act 2001 (as amended).

This legislation included a number of powers to combat crime and disorder, including measures to deal with alcohol related problems. The Act gives local authorities the power to designate areas 'Alcohol Restricted Areas' where it will become an offence for any person to drink alcohol after being requested not to do so by a Police Officer.

In October 2014 this legislation was revoked, meaning extant DPPOs would remain in effect for three years from that date, but no further DPPOs can be granted. All extant DPPOs will expire October 2017

The provisions have been replaced by Public Space Protection Orders which are not within the scope of the Licensing Service.

Village Greens

or above.

The Commons Act 2006

The Local Authority is the 'Registration Authority' for the purposes of the legislation.

Applications can seek the inclusion in the register of town and village greens of land which is claimed to have qualified for registration by virtue of continuous usage by inhabitants of the locality for lawful sports and pastimes as of right over a period of 20 years. In order for an application to succeed it must satisfy all parts of the statutory test.

Applications are reported to the Licensing and Public Protection Committee.

In cases where objections give rise to a serious dispute of fact between the applicant and the objectors, a public inquiry may be held before an independent inspector, who will then put forward a recommendation to the Registration Authority.

The final decision will be taken by the Licensing and Public Protection Committee, or a Licensing Sub-committee if so delegated.

Animal Welfare

Animal Boarding

Animal Boarding Establishments Act 1963

Anyone involved in the business of providing accommodation for other peoples animals (being cats or dogs), is required to obtain a licence form the local authority.

Inspections are undertaken by the Senior Animal Welfare Officer, prior to licence approval. Licensed premises now include home dog boarders, where individuals board dogs in their own home and also dog day care centres.

Dog Breeding

Breeding of Dogs Acts 1973 and 1991

Legislation prescribes standards of management and accommodation in relation to the business of breeding dogs.

In addition to the inspection by the Senior Animal Welfare Officer the Act requires that the services of an independent veterinary surgeon or practitioner is used for inspecting prospective establishments in respect of applications for the grant of a new licence

Pet Shops

Pet Animals Act 1951.

The Act regulates the sale of pet animals which includes a provision that a pet animal cannot be sold to a person under the age of 16. Conditions which are applied to premises promote animal health and welfare.

Performing Animals

The Performing Animals (Regulations) Act 1925

The Act covers the use of animals in film and stage performances, at circuses, and as part of exhibitions etc. More recently these provisions are applied to persons who use animals during educational talks and demonstrations at children's parties. It is an offence for anyone to train or exhibit a performing animal unless they are registered.

Dangerous Wild Animals

The Dangerous Wild Animals Act 1976 (as amended)

The Act contains a schedule detailing a variety of animals for the purposes of the Act e.g. venomous snakes and certain monkeys etc.

Zoos, pet shops and circuses are exempt from the provisions of the Act. There are no current licences, however, the Act provides powers to the Council to seize any animal being kept on premises which are unlicensed.

There is a requirement for an independent report to be obtained from a veterinary surgeon or practitioner before a licence can be granted.

Riding Establishments

Riding Establishments Acts 1964 and 1970

Stables which hire out horses or ponies for riding or instruction must be licensed under the provisions of the Riding Establishments Act 1964 and 1970. When considering applications there is a requirement for an independent report to be obtained from a veterinary surgeon or practitioner. An applicant for the grant or renewal of a licence must undergo or present an enhanced criminal record check (not more than 3 months old) with the submission of an application form. Once licensed, a licence holder must ensure that an enhanced criminal record check is conducted for any person in their employ that may come into contact with any persons under the age of 17 years that will be using the services of the riding establishment.

Zoos

Zoo Licensing Act 1981

This Act classes any establishment, other than a circus or pet shop, where animals are kept for public exhibition as a Zoo.

Licences are initially granted for four years and then renewable every six years.

Zoos must observe standards of modern zoo practice which have been specified by the Secretary of State.

Inspections are carried out annually by the Senior Animal Welfare Officer, however, at least twice during the term of the licence; a formal inspection must be carried out by a veterinary surgeon or practitioner in addition to an inspector appointed by the Secretary of State.

Enforcement

Licensing Enforcement Officers and Licensing Compliance Officers are issued with an identity card and authorisation. They enforce the provisions of the legislation for which they are authorised. This includes but is not limited to:

- Birmingham City Council Act 1990
- Equalities Act 2010
- Gambling Act 2005
- House to House Collections Act 1939
- Licensing Act 2003
- Local Government Act 1972 (Section 222)
- Local Government Act 2003
- Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1976 Part II
- Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1982 Part I, II, VII
- Police Factories, etc. (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1916 (Street Collections)
- Private Hire Vehicles (Carriage of Guide Dogs etc.) Act 2002
- Private Security Industry Act 2001
- Town Police Clauses Act 1847 and 1889
- Hackney Carriage Byelaw, 26 June 2008

Officers undertake inspections, offer advice, deal with requests for assistance, investigate complaints and take part in planned exercises including operations with other enforcement agencies.

The premises and individuals licensed under the above Acts will be risk rated and inspected as and when appropriate in line with that rating, to ensure compliance with the legislation and any conditions attached to their licences. Inspections may also take place upon the grant, renewal or transfer of a licence or upon the receipt of a complaint.

Private hire operators will be risk rated and inspected an appropriate number of times during the year. Officers will check that the documents and records relating to drivers, vehicles and bookings are as prescribed by their conditions of licence. All operators will receive at least one inspection during the course of the operational year.

Stop check exercises are regularly undertaken with the assistance of the Police. Licensed vehicles are stopped and inspected to ensure that they and their drivers are complying with conditions of licence and are safe to carry members of the public. If defects on the vehicle are noted such as loose radios, bald tyres or defective lights, the plate licence may be suspended until the issues are rectified.

As well as routine inspections and high visibility exercises, Officers undertake exercises, where they pose as members of the public and make test purchases. Again this is to check licensees are complying with the legislation and their conditions of licence.

Officers also work jointly with agencies such as the Police and DVSA (formerly VOSA). Further information can be found within the Regulation and Enforcement, Enforcement Policy.

GOOD PRACTICE AND PROCEDURE

The following are points that your Committee should bear in mind when making decisions concerning individual licences and should be read in conjunction with the Members' Code of Conduct and the Member/Officer Protocol. They are based on the large number of legal cases in which the courts, including the European Courts, have considered different aspects of a local authority's licensing functions. However, your Committee should be aware that in certain cases there are additional requirements resulting from specific legislation.

1. Political/Party Group Meetings

Group meetings should be concerned with policy reports, not the discussion of individual licence applications etc. The use of a party political whip is inconsistent with the rules of natural justice and should be avoided by Councillors sitting on the Licensing and Public Protection Committee.

2. Members

Members should be mindful of the requirements concerning the disclosure of interests and when it is necessary for a member to vacate a meeting. In cases of doubt the Director of Legal Services, or his representative, should be consulted. Details are set out in the Council Constitution.

3. Social Media

What are social media?

Social media is the term to describe websites and online tools which allow people to interact with each other by creating their own content. The content could, for example, be blogs, videos or short messages, known as tweets, via twitter.

On social media sites users share information, discuss opinions and may create interest groups or pages. Ultimately people use these sites and tools to build online communities and networks which encourage participation and engagement.

Types of Social Media:

 Blogging and microblogging – online journals – Twitter is an example of microblogging, where entries are limited to 140 characters

- Online Forums people with similar interests sharing information and opinions AccyWeb is an example
- Social networking sites these facilitate connections between people who already
 know each other, often in a social context, but are increasingly used by businesses to
 promote their products or services- Facebook is an example
- Video and photo publishing sharing videos and photographs worldwide Flickr is an example

Some general legal issues:

- Libel If you publish an untrue statement about a person which is damaging to their reputation, they may take a libel action against you. The same thing may happen if, for example, someone else publishes something libellous on your website, you know about it and don't take swift action to remove it. A successful libel claim could result in the award of damages against you,
- Copyright Placing images or text on your site from a copyrighted source (for example extracts from publications or photos), without obtaining permission, is likely to breach copyright laws. Therefore don't publish anything you are unsure about, or obtain prior permission. A successful claim for breach of copyright would be likely to lead to an award of damages against you.
- **Data Protection** Do not publish the personal data of individuals unless you have their express permission.
- Bias and Predetermination if you are involved in making licensing decisions, do not say anything through social media (or indeed anywhere) that suggests you have completely and irrevocably made your mind up on an issue that is due to be formally decided upon. While your likely view on a particular application may be well known, you need to be able to show that you attended the committee or hearing prepared to take on board and weigh all the evidence and arguments, and were genuinely persuadable to a different view. If you weren't, the decision may be later challenged as invalid. If a person has suffered some sort of detriment as a result of such an invalid decision, they may have a claim against the council for damages.
- Wednesbury Unreasonableness members must also always been seen to acting reasonably in relation to the Committee process and consideration of all applications; if detriment arises a Third Party may commence Judicial Review proceedings.

Use of Social Media by Members of Committee

- Although the use of Social Media can be an invaluable tool for a Member of the Council/Committee Member it is important that such usage is properly managed at all times and that particularly a clear distinction is maintained between Private usage and Member usage. It is important that Social Media is not perceived by any Third Party to interfere with the proper decision making process. Members are advised to exercise extreme caution before commenting on social media, or in the conventional press, on any licensing decisions which they are, or are likely to be involved in making. This is to ensure that their comments may not be interpreted to mean that members have already determined a licence application, which could be used against the local authority.
- The same applies to Council Members who are not members of the Licensing & Public Protection Committee, but whose comments or actions on social media could be misinterpreted. If elected Members make any comments when representing residents who are objecting to licence applications they must not link their comments in any way to members of the Committee.
- During Committee hearings it is particularly important that mobile communication devices, including telephones and tablet computers or Social Media are not used, whether for research or communication purposes. The use of any form of Social Media or mobile telephones at Committee may lead to an inference of bias, predetermination or Wednesbury Unreasonableness.

4. The Applicant

Ordinarily the applicant should be given the opportunity of being heard by your Committee before the application is determined, even if this is not an express requirement of the relevant statute. The applicant should also be allowed to be accompanied by a legal or other representative if they so desire.

5. Third Parties to a Hearing

Any person or body wishing to make representations or objections in respect of an application or notice should be given the opportunity to do so. Subject to any statutory restriction the nature of the representations or objections should be disclosed to the applicant in advance of the meeting so that they may consider their response. The identity of an objector should not be disclosed to the applicant without their consent, unless any statutory provision state otherwise.

6. Disclosure of Information

The applicant should be given prior knowledge of the nature of the Council's concerns, and of those of any objectors.

The extent of the disclosure should also be sufficient to avoid the applicant having to request an adjournment to allow time for proper consideration of the matters they are obliged to address.

7. Evidence

Each member of your Committee should be supplied with copies of every document that has been supplied both by and to the applicant and any third parties to the hearing. If any new documents are produced at the meeting, each party should have the opportunity to inspect them. In certain cases there may be statutory provisions which require another party's consent, if applicable, to new documentation being introduced at the meeting.

8. Adjournments

Any request for an adjournment should not be refused if to do so would effectively deny the applicant a fair hearing.

9. The Hearing

The procedure is intended as a general framework to ensure the rules of natural justice apply and that a fair hearing is presided over by an "independent and impartial tribunal". The conduct of individual hearings may vary slightly according to circumstances and the discretion of the Chairman. In all cases, however, this general framework will be followed:

- a. Members present should identify themselves so that the applicant may be satisfied that there has been no breach of the rule against bias.
- b. A licensing officer will outline the relevant details of the application or matter under consideration.
- c. Usually the applicant will present his or her case first, at the conclusion of which members may ask questions. A similar opportunity will then be afforded to any third party to a hearing making representations or objections to the application.
- d. The applicant should be given the opportunity to ask questions of those third parties.

e. Once the licensing officer, the applicant and any third party to the hearing have given evidence and answered any questions, the third party shall first be given an opportunity to make brief closing remarks, and then the applicant to make their final closing remarks on the application under question. All parties should leave the room, so that only the Committee, the Committee Manager and the Director of Legal Services' representative remain.

During the hearing members must not discuss the merits of the case. This should be left until the applicant, any objectors and officers involved in the case have left the room.

The only members who may participate in the decision making are those who have seen and heard all the evidence and have been present for the subsequent discussion.

Once the applicant, any third party and officers have left the meeting they may be recalled to provide further information or clarification but all of them must return, not just the person from whom further information is required.

10. The Decision

Once the Committee has reached its decision the parties must be recalled and informed verbally of the decision with the exception of applicants and drivers for a hackney carriage or private hire licence or personal licence who only receive the decision later in writing. If reasons for the decision are to be given, which will usually be the case, this will be done in writing at a later date. Notice of any right of appeal should also be given to the parties.

EYETEASE – REQUEST TO INTRODUCE ADVERTISING ROOF SIGNS FOR HACKNEY CARRIAGE VEHICLES

1. Summary

- 1.1 The Licensing Service has received a request from Mr Carl McGregor of Eyetease, seeking permission to install rooftop advertising signs on Birmingham licensed hackney carriage vehicles.
- 1.2 A similar request was considered and refused by the former Licensing Committee on 20 February 2008.
- 1.3 Mr McGregor has submitted a presentation in support of his request, which is attached as appendix 1 to this report.

2. Recommendations

- 2.1 The Committee is requested to consider the proposal put forward by Eyetease taking into account the current conditions of licence and the existing Committee policy on advertisements.
- 2.2 If your Committee is inclined to agree the request, consideration should be given to adopting the recommendations made at 5.1 in this report.

3. <u>Background</u>

- 3.1 Birmingham City Council has a set of standard conditions which apply to hackney carriage vehicles. Those conditions specify the locations in and on a vehicle which may be used to display advertisements. There is no provision in the current conditions of licence for hackney carriage vehicles for roof top advertising installations.
- 3.2 The current conditions also place restrictions on the subject matter which may appear in those advertisements as detailed in the extract from conditions reproduced below:
 - 16(i) No advertisement shall be displayed upon the interior or exterior of a hackney carriage vehicle which contains, promotes or involves drugs, alcoholic drinks, politics, nudity (partial or otherwise) or sex (including articles or products associated with birth control) without the permission of the City Council.
 - 16(ii) No advertisement which has been prohibited by the Advertising Standards Agency shall be displayed upon the exterior or interior of any Hackney Carriage.
 - 16(iii) No advertisement shall be displayed in such a manner as to contravene the Road Traffic Acts or Road Vehicle (Construction and Use) Regulations for the time being in force.
 - 16(iv) Any advertisement displayed upon the exterior of a hackney carriage shall be located either upon:
 - a) the whole vehicle (whole livery) except in the case of Mercedes Eurocab, Peugeot Euro 7 or Fiat Eurocab vehicles;
 - b) each side of the vehicle;
 - c) the rear windscreen, provided that an advertisement shall only be displayed on the rear windscreen if the advertisement is printed upon a transparent screen which does not obscure the driver's view and further, that the vehicle is fitted with side or wing mirrors;
 - d) on the hubcaps of the vehicle.
 - NB Only **one** advertisement is allowed on any **one** location on the vehicle. For this purpose, both doors constitute **one** location.
 - 16(v) The proprietor shall maintain the advertisement in a clean and tidy condition and shall further remove any advertisement which is damaged, defaced, or out of date.

16(vi) No advertisement shall be displayed within the interior of the vehicle unless it is located upon the underside of the tip-up seat within the vehicle or displayed via an electronic media system with prior consultation with the Licensing Committee.

4. The Application

- 4.1 Mr McGregor's submission contains details of the testing to which his product has been subjected and information relating to its deployment in London.
- 4.2 It is suggested roof top advertising will provide a valuable income stream for drivers and some provision could be made to show Birmingham City Council messages. TOA (Taxi Owners Association) have expressed an interest in the product and Eyetease have indicated TOA would be willing to become the local installation partner for their roof top advertising system.
- 4.3 Mr McGregor has been asked to provide additional information in respect of the impact of the iTaxitop on fuel economy. His response is attached at appendix 2.
- 4.4 The applicant has advised he is happy to attend the meeting and will answer any questions members may wish to put to him.

5 Officer Comments

- 5.1 If after consideration members agree to the proposal to allow roof top advertising signage and approve the iTaxitop for installation on Birmingham vehicles, officers make the following recommendations:
 - Any advertisement displayed via a roof top installation must comply with the Committee's standard advertising requirements with respect to content.
 - ii. No additional advertising media is to be displayed or installed in or on the vehicle at the same time as the roof top advertising unit, other than taxi radio circuit/app booking service logos which should be restricted to the lower panels of the doors on both sides of the vehicle.
 - iii. Permission should be specific to this application and not seen as a general permission to introduce roof top advertising.
 - iv. Installation and removal must be carried out only by the applicant's nominated installer.
 - v. No installation should take place until suitable conditions have been devised and approved for vehicles. Conditions are not put forward for approval at this time as conditions of licence for hackney carriage vehicles are currently under review and new conditions will be presented to your Committee for approval later in the year.
- 5.2 In London the vehicle approval is limited to traditional "London Cabs", unlike Birmingham where a variety of wheelchair accessible vehicles can be

licensed. Restrictions already exist for those van derived vehicles in respect of the placement of advertising and the colour requirement, all vehicles must be black and full body advertising is forbidden in order to ensure the colour of the vehicle is not obscured. Members may wish to consider approving roof top advertising for these vehicles as an alternative to other types of advertising and to further distinguish the vehicles from people carrier types licensed for the purpose of private hire.

- 5.3 Members may also wish to take into consideration the restrictions imposed in London, where installation is limited to a maximum of 1000 vehicles and may only be applied to TX4 types, presumably because they constitute the latest, least polluting types. However it should be noted if such a restriction were applied in Birmingham, the available fleet would be limited to just 54 vehicles.
- 6. Implications for Resources
- 6.1 No specific implications have been identified.
- 7. <u>Implications for Policy Priorities</u>
- 7.1 The contents of this report contribute to the protection, safety and welfare of residents and visitors to the City by ensuring that licensed hackney carriage vehicles are compliant with required vehicle standards.
- 8. Public Sector Equality Duty
- 8.1 No specific issues have been identified.

REVIEWING THE GEOGRAPHICAL KNOWLEDGE TEST FOR PRIVATE HIRE DRIVERS

1. Summary

- 1.1 A recent change to legislation allowing private hire operators to subcontract jobs across Local Authority boundaries, has served to compound the problems already experienced with out of area hackney carriage drivers working for private hire companies across Birmingham.
- 1.2 These changes effectively allow licensed operators to pass jobs to a sister company licensed elsewhere and fulfil those jobs using drivers and vehicles licensed in another authority area. In the opinion of officers, these changes make it increasingly difficult to sustain a Knowledge Test for Private Hire Drivers, when candidates seeking to work in Birmingham are now so easily able to do so, using a licence obtained elsewhere.
- 1.3 This report outlines those changes and suggests an alternative to the Private Hire Knowledge Test which could encourage more drivers to licence in Birmingham.

2. Recommendations

2.1 That your Committee should:

- i. Agree to remove the geographical element from The Knowledge Test for Private Hire Drivers.
- ii. Instruct officers to pursue expansion of the Disability Awareness Training to include Safeguarding training.
- iii. Withdraw the restricted private hire licence and replace existing licences on renewal, with a standard unrestricted licence.

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3. Background

- 3.1 As a Licensing Authority, Birmingham City Council has a statutory obligation to make provision for the licensing of hackney carriage and private hire drivers, vehicles and private hire operators under the provisions of The Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1976 and Town Police Clauses Act 1847.
- 3.2 The main purpose of the licensing regime is to ensure the safety of the public, primarily by ensuring licences are not granted to individuals who cannot be deemed fit and proper, or for vehicles which are not found to be safe or suitable.
- 3.3 The Knowledge Test for Private Hire Drivers owes its existence in no small part to a wish to improve standards and address concerns expressed by a number of operators at the time about the quality of new drivers coming into the trade. Specifically a basic lack of geographical knowledge and in some cases limited understanding of the role and responsibilities of a licensed driver. A working group of councillors from the former Licensing Committee was formed to gather evidence from interested parties and to make recommendations.
- 3.4 At its meeting in April 2009 the former Licensing Committee resolved to introduce a knowledge test for private hire drivers, one of the proposals recommended by the working group. Officers were charged with preparing a further report and bringing specific proposals back to the Committee.
- 3.5 On 15 July 2009 the proposals for the new Private Hire Knowledge Test were presented to the former Licensing Committee and after consideration it was resolved the new test would be introduced with effect from 1 April 2010. The test to be created as a parallel, but much simplified equivalent to the test for hackney carriage drivers.
- 3.6 The test as originally conceived consisted of questions relating to Law and conditions of licence, A to Z exercises and most challenging of all a geographical section requiring candidates to demonstrate a wide knowledge of locations and routes across the city. Although the test has been simplified further and the number of questions reduced, this is essentially still the form the test takes to this day.

4. Practical Application and Effect of the Test

4.1 The introduction of the test was unpopular with applicants from the beginning; the start date of 1 April 2010 was preceded with a rush to beat the deadline and has been followed by many applications for exemption and requests for permission to revive old abandoned applications which predated the introduction of the test.

- 4.2 The test did not retain popularity with operators for very long either as introduction of the test dramatically reduced the number of new drivers coming into the trade. Although not all would have gone on to gain a badge prior to the introduction of the new test as many as fifty new applicants a week applied to take the verbal communication test, afterwards numbers applying for the knowledge test dropped into single figures and many more applicants dropped out without even attempting the test.
- 4.3 It was clear from comments made by applicants and operators alike many believed a boycott of the test would lead to its withdrawal. Some applicants told officers they had been advised the test was impossible and were actively encouraged not to attempt it.
- 4.4 Although numbers passing the test have increased, only 106 new private hire licences were issued during the 2015/2016 operational year.

5. External Factors

- 5.1 Whatever the opinion of applicants and operators, it is possible the test would have been accepted over time and the pass rate may have increased as more people attempted the test. However, external factors intervened in a fashion which served very effectively to undermine the position taken by the former Licensing Committee and subsequently supported by the Licensing and Public Protection Committee.
- 5.2 The first was the increasing exploitation of a quirk in hackney carriage legislation which allows a hackney carriage driver using a licensed hackney carriage vehicle to accept a booking made outside his own licensed district. This was not new, TOA in Birmingham had been taking advantage of this opportunity for years in order to quite legally operate a mixed fleet of Birmingham and Solihull licensed vehicles across Birmingham, Solihull and beyond.
- 5.3 Commencing in the North East of England, exploitation of this loophole to allow fleets of out of area hackney carriage vehicles to be operated by private hire companies began on an ever increasing scale and attempts by local authorities to challenge the practice in The Courts, achieved little beyond clarifying the legality of the practice. By late 2010, drivers unwilling or unable to pass the test in Birmingham were starting to obtain hackney carriage driver and vehicle licences in other authority areas and returning to work for Birmingham Operators.
- 5.4 There has been a willingness on the part of some licensing authorities to put conditions in place to limit the ability of drivers to work out of area, but as one authority did so, another would become the authority of choice for drivers seeking a "flag of convenience".
- 5.5 More important than the use of out of area hackney carriage drivers, is the practical effect of the Deregulation Bill 2015. From 1 October 2015 a private

hire operator has been able to pass jobs to an operator outside his own licensed area. Predictably this has seen Birmingham licensed private hire operators obtaining licences elsewhere with the intention of passing Birmingham jobs to their new bases and fulfilling those jobs using drivers licensed in another authority's district. Effectively a new applicant no longer needs to obtain a private hire licence in Birmingham in order to work as a private hire driver in the city.

- 5.6 If this trend continues and it is likely it will whilst Birmingham maintains a test more challenging than any test existing in surrounding areas, it is probable that fewer and fewer applicants will apply to Birmingham for a driver's licence. Operators could conceivably maintain a licence in Birmingham solely to invite bookings, with all jobs passed across authority borders to another operator and all of those bookings quite legally fulfilled by drivers licensed outside Birmingham. The appendix contains details of the requirements of the Birmingham private hire knowledge test in comparison with the requirements of local authorities most commonly used to obtain licences to be used for the subcontracting of jobs within Birmingham.
- 5.7 The prospect of Birmingham Licensing Enforcement Officers having to deal with a multitude of vehicles licensed by other authorities is rapidly becoming a reality and whilst extended powers to deal with out of town drivers were promised in response to the objections raised when the issue of cross border hiring was first mooted, the reality is no new powers have been granted. Neither the Licensing Enforcement Team, nor your Committee has authority over these drivers or their vehicles.
- 5.8 It is primarily for this reason officers recommend withdrawing the knowledge test for private hire drivers and replacing it with a less demanding, less time consuming procedure. Whilst maintaining high standards in the interests of the travelling public is a laudable aim, the fact is new legislation has made it a relatively simple matter to circumvent any local condition or policy and officers believe changing the application procedure in order to encourage as many drivers as possible to be licensed in Birmingham and so keeping them locally accountable, is very much the better option.

6 An Alternative to the Knowledge Test in its Current Form

- 6.1 Applicants for a private hire driver's licence are currently required to take Disability Awareness Training (DAT) as part of the application process. It is proposed officers should look into the practicalities of expanding the DAT training to include a wider safeguarding element designed to equip candidates to identify and ensure the safety of any vulnerable passenger.
- 6.2 The DAT concludes with a test to check understanding and it is considered important any expanded course should continue to do the same.
- 6.3 Whilst an enhanced DAT course will deal with many behavioural and customer service issues, it will not serve well to test conversational English, or

understanding of legislation or licence conditions. Accordingly it is suggested appropriate information should be made available for download on the Licensing pages of the BCC web site. This information would include a copy of the current conditions of licence and an overview of the legal responsibilities of a driver, very similar to the information included in the current Knowledge Test Folder. This information would be free to download and would equip a driver with the information necessary to pass a simplified Knowledge Test.

- 6.4 A simplified test along the lines of that currently employed for applicants seeking a restricted private hire badge would be relatively easy to devise and could be in place very quickly. The test would be conducted verbally on a one to one basis, but would not include the routes and two point locations which have been perceived as too challenging by a great many would be applicants.
- 6.5 Removal of the main geographical test element should dramatically reduce the amount of time taken to prepare for the test and the remaining elements, which would include an A to Z based navigation exercise and a test on the Law applicable to private hire drivers (overcharging, plying for hire etc.) and licence conditions, will ensure applicants are able to follow directions and communicate effectively with their customers. The resulting test would be considerably shorter, allowing many more tests to be conducted in the available time.
- 6.6 In recognition of the fact holders of the Restricted Private Hire Licence have already passed a simplified knowledge test with geographical elements removed, it is suggested existing licences could reasonably be converted to a standard licence on renewal.

7. <u>Implications for Resources</u>

- 7.1 The matters raised in this report have significant implications for resources. If the knowledge test is maintained, then we are likely to see a significant reduction in the number of licences issued in Birmingham. A consequential reduction in income may have a detrimental effect in the ability of the Licensing Service to undertake enforcement action.
- 7.2 Conversely, if the knowledge test is replaced with a less challenging regime, then we could see an increase in applications and demand for appointments resulting in pressure on the licensing service which has moved to smaller premises and reduced staff numbers since the introduction of the test in 2010.

8. Implications for Policy Priorities

8.1 The contents of this report contribute to the protection, safety and welfare of residents and visitors to the City by ensuring that licensed private hire vehicles are safe and compliant with required vehicle standards.

- 8.2 It also assists in promoting improvements in the standards of services provided by licence holders across the City and the Council's strategic outcome of staying safe in a clean, green city.
- 9. Public Sector Equality Duty
- 9.1 There are no specific implications identified.

BIRMINGHAM CLEAN AIR ZONE UPDATE

1 Summary

- 1.1 In February 2016 a report was brought before this Committee detailing the Air Quality Plans produced by Government in December 2015 and of Government's intent to mandate a Clean Air Zone (CAZ) for Birmingham.
- 1.2 A recommendation from the February report was that an update report would be brought before this Committee within four months. This was logged as minute number 691(ii) and this report seeks to discharge that outstanding minute.
- 1.3 This report seeks to update Committee on progress with the CAZ, although Members are asked to be mindful that as there is constant activity items may have changed / been updated since the report was submitted. Any significant changes / updates will be reported verbally at Committee.

2 Recommendations

- 2.1 That this report discharges minute number 619(ii) from the Committee of 17 February 2016.
- 2.2 That a further update / progress report be brought to this Committee when the scoping study is complete.

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Protection

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3 Legislative Position and Health Effects

3.1 The Committee Report of 17 February 2016 detailed the legislative position around air quality and health effects arising from the same. There are no updates relevant to these items.

4 Government's Proposal – A Clean Air Zone for Birmingham

- 4.1 The Committee Report of 17 February 2016 explained how the Government's Air Quality Plans identified six cities¹ as being non-compliant with air quality targets beyond 2020 and how, to address this non-compliance, Government are mandating the introduction of Clean Air Zones (CAZ) within each city. A CAZ is an area where only the cleanest vehicles are encouraged and action is focussed to improve air quality.
- 4.2 For Birmingham the CAZ will restrict access to buses, coaches and heavy goods vehicles (HGVs) that are less than Euro VI for NO_x, and to vans and Hackney carriages that are less than Euro VI (diesel) and Euro 4 (petrol) for NO_x.
- 4.3 This means that vehicles which do not meet the required standard will be precluded from accessing the zone or be subject to a penalty fine should they enter the zone.
- 4.4 Current thinking with regards to the zone is that it will likely need to encompass the middle ring road (A4540), as this is a 'natural' cordon and the problem areas lie within.
- 4.5 Furthermore, the above standards are believed to be insufficient to deliver full compliance by 2020 within Birmingham and as such additional local measures will need to be undertaken. These measures will be a combination of improved signage and rerouting, switching to different forms of transport (e.g. use of Park and Ride), road improvements and infrastructure for alternative fuels for the introduction of Liquid Petroleum Gas (LPG), Compressed Natural Gas (CNG), Electric and Hydrogen Fuel Cell vehicles. Some of these items are already under consideration by the City Council.
- 4.6 Scoping studies will be undertaken, led by the Local Authority but funded by Government, to identify the most appropriate local measure(s) to take forward to fill the compliance gap including further helping understand the scale of the problem and who may be affected.

5 CAZ Development Update

5.1 Officers from the City Council have been in regular correspondence with Defra to develop the CAZ. These correspondences have included:

- Weekly teleconferences where progress either way can be discussed, tracked and maintained.
- On 18 February representatives from all the cities attended a CAZ meeting at Defra's Nobel House offices in London where discussions took place around how the various CAZ could be introduced, best practice from the London Low Emission Zone, modeling, financing and other related subject matters.
- On 17 May an Air Quality Workshop for senior Council officials is scheduled to be held at Defra's Nobel House offices in London.
- On 25 May an Air Quality Workshop for Officers of all the mandated cities is scheduled to be held at the Environmental Health offices at Manor House in Birmingham.
- 5.2 The current position, at the time of writing this report, is as follows:
 - City Council officers have produced all necessary information as requested by Defra as they arise in the weekly teleconferences.
 - We are awaiting the first draft of the guidance on scoping studies to be issued by Defra, this to include the policy, the procedure, and the outline for tenders.
 - Once the first draft is issued the Cities will need to respond and provide comments to steer the draft to a final issue.
 - Environmental Health are reviewing the areas of non-compliance identified by Defra, by looking to better understand the modeling inputs, with a view to hopefully reducing the areas to more clearly defined road links, from which actual interventions can be considered.
 - The process described in the point above would be assisted through discussion with the contractors who produced this model for Defra. We have requested a meeting through Defra and are awaiting their response.
 - Both Environmental Health and Transportation Strategy are working to review and update their own respective models to assist in the actual scoping work, once the final guidance is issued.
 - Both Environmental Health and Transportation Strategy are reviewing the options for utilizing existing infrastructure to support the CAZ scoping studies, and possible end-phase deployment e.g. through the Urban Traffic Control scheme ANPR cameras.
 - Defra are continuing to explore how funding for the CAZ Scoping Study will be released.
 - Other direct matters under consideration include the timeline for introduction, the legislative vehicle for deployment of the CAZ, discussions with legal experts, etc.
 - There are many other related work items that are feeding into and drawing from the CAZ work e.g. discussions with the ITA, development of a Taxi Emissions Policy, work with Centro and the bus companies, developing policy through the LETCP², etc.

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² Low Emissions Towns and Cities Programme

- 5.3 During the presentation to the report in February the question was raised as to whether private hire vehicles would be covered within the CAZ by the criteria for taxis. This has been answered within a report taken to this Committee by the Head of Licensing in April, wherein it was confirmed that the CAZ would cover both Hackney Carriage and private hire vehicles, and further, Committee made the decision to set a vehicle emission policy for private hire and Hackney Carriage vehicles in line with the CAZ requirements.
- 5.4 The types of vehicles being considered for the CAZ remains unchanged, namely buses, HGV, LGV and taxis, although it is reiterated that even with a CAZ covering these vehicles types there will be a compliance gap and the scoping study will attempt to identify how that gap can be filled.
- 5.5 The area being considered for the CAZ has not changed and remains as being the A4540 ring road, although this is subject to change pending what may arise from the scoping study.

6 Implications for Resources

- 6.1 The resources employed in carrying out the work detailed in this report are partly delivered by Defra in the form of grant and anticipated support funding, whilst Officer time will be contained within this Committee's budget.
- 6.2 Colleagues within Transportation are developing a Project Definition Document to cover the CAZ workstream, this to consider funding for certain work items through the Future Council programme.

7 Implications for Policy Priorities

- 7.1 The management of air quality contributes to fulfilling the policies of Birmingham 2026: Our vision for the future and supports the strategic outcomes set out in the Council Business Plan for 2015+, specifically that of a Prosperous City where local entrepreneurs can thrive; inward investment is attracted; there is a highly skilled workforce. A smart, green and sustainable city with excellent connectivity.
- 7.2 The work undertaken by Environmental Health also supports the Regulation and Enforcement Division's mission statement to provide 'fair regulation for all achieving a safe, clean, green and fair trading city for residents, business and visitors'.
- 7.3 The investigation and delivery of a Clean Air Zone supports the 20 year transport strategy set out within Birmingham Connected, the goal of which is to create a transport system for everyone, one that puts people first and delivers better connections for citizens and businesses; one that improves daily lives by making travel more accessible, more reliable, safer and healthier.

7.4 A link between poor air quality and social deprivation has been established with the more inner city wards suffering the greatest amount of pollution. Consideration of CAZ to limit pollution within the city centre is a worthy endeavor, although care must be taken to ensure that the knock on effects of any restrictions are considered so as to avoid transferring the vehicles and the associated pollution to other sensitive areas.

8 Public Sector Equality Duty

- 8.1 Air pollution has the potential to affect all members of society but can have specific impacts on pregnant women and the unborn child. The concerns about such are widely known and health advice is issued accordingly by relevant medical professionals.
- 8.2 The approach taken to address air quality is such as to protect all members of society and does not discriminate against any group.

VEHICLE EMISSIONS TESTING PROGRAMME

1 Summary

- 1.1 In September 2015, Volkswagen confirmed that they had been using software in their cars, which caused the engines to behave differently during emissions tests compared to real world driving.
- 1.2 This admission prompted the UK Government to commence an investigation into whether this practice was more widespread, and also to understand why real world emissions differed significantly from those under laboratory testing. This became known as the Emissions Testing Programme (ETP)¹.
- 1.3 The ETP report concludes that it did not detect any defeat device in any vehicle other than those from within the Volkswagen Group.
- 1.4 The ETP report also identified the discrepancy between in-laboratory testing and real world emissions across all vehicles tested, with real world driving giving rise to significantly more emissions than detected in the laboratory. The ETP report explains how the testing regime will be improved upon in upcoming years to hopefully reduce or remove the discrepancy in emissions between laboratory tests and real world driving.
- 1.5 This report seeks to introduce the ETP to Committee and provide a summary of the work undertaken. The topic area is of relevance given the Government announcement to mandate a Clean Air Zone in Birmingham.
- 1.6 The ETP did not involve officers from Birmingham City Council and as such this report is merely an informative on the outcomes from this Programme.

2 Recommendation

2.1 That the report be noted.

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

3 Background

- 3.1 In September 2015, Volkswagen confirmed that they had been using software in their cars, which caused the engines to behave differently during emissions tests compared to real world driving. Not only did this cause disruption and distress to the 1.2m Volkswagen users in the UK, it showed a lack of regard for the serious health consequences of nitrogen oxide (NOx) emissions and caused significant damage to the trust consumers have placed in car manufacturers across the country.
- 3.2 This prompted the UK Government to commence an investigation into whether this practice was more widespread, and also to understand better why real world emissions from cars differed significantly from those under laboratory testing. This became known as the Emissions Testing Programme (ETP).

4 Policy Context


- 4.1 As a city Birmingham does not comply with ambient emission limits for nitrogen dioxide (NO₂), the primary source for which is road transport.
- 4.2 Over the years legislated emissions have reduced, including those from road vehicles, and the introduction of the Euro standards for vehicles which direct emissions reductions have had some effect. The following graph taken from the ETP report shows this reduction.



4.3 The greatest contribution of oxides of nitrogen (NO_x) from road vehicles is from diesel engine vehicles, which comprise most of the heavy duty fleet, a

significant bulk of the light duty fleet and around 38% of all passenger cars, an increase from 7% in 1994.

4.4 As stated in 4.2 the Euro standards have been semi-successful in reducing emissions from diesel cars, although the reason why this success is limited is because the permitted limit, as evidenced through in-laboratory testing, is not realized by actual emissions arising from real world driving. The following infogram taken from the ETP report displays this differential.



Diesel cars: Nitrogen oxides (NOX) emissions (in g/km)


4.5 This failure of real-world emissions to meet the tightening emission standards is partly contributing to the ongoing air quality problems within European Member States and, more relevantly, within Birmingham.

5 <u>The Vehicle Approval Regime and Defeat Devices</u>

- 5.1 The current vehicle approval regime is based on type approvals, which involves testing a vehicle against a range of standards or regulations before approval is granted. Only once the manufacturer has the Type Approval Certificate from the Type Approval Authority can it release the vehicle to market.
- 5.2 Insofar as emissions are concerned these are covered by a number of regulations which encompass a range of pollutants. The testing is undertaken on a chassis dynamometer (rolling road) in a laboratory and is known as the

New European Drive Cycle (NEDC). The test cycle used is some 20 years old and has been previously criticized for not being representative of real world driving conditions.

- 5.3 In order to meet the increasingly strict emission levels (see infogram at 4.4) vehicle manufacturers have developed a range of technologies to reduce the NO_x emissions of a diesel vehicle e.g. exhaust gas recirculation, diesel oxidation catalyst.
- 5.4 One option that is not available is what is commonly known as a 'defeat device'. This is a system which results in a vehicle producing significantly higher emissions in normal use than it does when being subjected to the official laboratory emissions test. Importantly, defeat devices are defined as reducing the effectiveness of the vehicle's emissions control, therefore resulting in higher exhaust emissions. In other words, a defeat device would not operate during the official laboratory test, but would become 'active' in specific real-world use conditions. These are also known as cycle recognition / detection software or systems.
- 5.5 The ETP tested a Skoda vehicle (part of the Volkswagen Group) which Volkswagen had identified as having cycle recognition software to compare the standard NEDC test (which the defeat device would detect) with a reversed NEDC test (which the defeat device may not be able to detect).
- 5.6 The following chart shows the outcome of these tests. The orange line is the standard NEDC, whilst the green line is the reverse NEDC. It is evident that the standard NEDC was detected whilst the reverse NEDC was not detected, as evidenced by the reverse NEDC emitting more pollutants i.e. the emissions controls were disabled by the software as it considered the vehicle to be not under emissions testing conditions.



5.7 As can be seen the reverse NEDC was not detected and became a standard for use within the ETP as a test which any cycle detection software would not detect as a test.


6 The Emissions Testing Programme

- 6.1 The ETP was designed to test a range of the best-selling passenger cars in order to ascertain whether there was evidence of systematic use of defeat devices and to inform policy makers on the general trends in vehicle emissions. The programme selected an independent and representative sample of vehicles to test in a variety of conditions using the latest technology.
- 6.2 The criteria involved in the ETP are contained in full in the actual report.
- 6.3 The principal aim of the testing programme was to understand whether there is evidence of use of defeat devices or cycle recognition strategies by manufacturers other than the Volkswagen Group. For this reason, much of the testing revolved around the use of the New European Driving Cycle (NEDC), which is the current emission test for vehicles in type approval and therefore the cycle that such strategies would be designed to recognise.
- 6.4 The test programme was constructed around variations of this cycle with testing being undertaken both in emissions laboratories and on test tracks. Further tests were conducted on public roads to establish the emissions performance of the vehicles in typical real-world use conditions.

Findings


- 6.5 The testing did not find any evidence of the use of cycle recognition strategies in any of the vehicles tested, except those of the Volkswagen Group. Other manufacturer's vehicles did not appear to be able to recognise when they were being tested in the laboratory and so change the emissions strategy of the engine.
- 6.6 A new Volkswagen Golf (Euro 6) was tested and it was confirmed that this vehicle did not employ any cycle recognition system.
- 6.7 The ETP tested both Euro 5 and Euro 6 vehicles on the NEDC in-laboratory cycle under both cold and hot engine conditions. All the Euro 5 vehicles met the legislative standard on the cold conditions, but when the engine was warmed up some vehicles remain compliant but many do not with the highest being 2.4 times above the limit.
- 6.8 For Euro 6 vehicles all met the limit from a cold start, but when the engine was warmed up there was once again a spread with the highest being also 2.4 times above the limit.


- 6.9 With regards to the proceeding paragraphs, it is important to understand that the legislative limit for Euro 5 is 180mg/km whilst for Euro 6 is it 80mg/km and as such Euro 6 vehicles are respectively 'cleaner' than their Euro 5 counterparts.
- 6.10 When the vehicles were taken out onto a test track and therefore not under inlaboratory conditions the results were markedly different, with many more vehicles failing the limit and there being a greater spread. This is evidence for the discrepancy between in-laboratory testing and real world driving. The following graph taken from the ETP displays these results.



- 6.11 The ETP also looked at how these vehicles actually perform on the public road. The results for both Euro 5 and Euro 6 are all above the legislative limit for Euro 5 the average was 1135 mg/km over six times higher than the 180 mg/km official legislative NEDC laboratory test limit, whilst for Euro 6 the best results are less than twice the NEDC limit of 80mg/km, while the worst are more than 12 times higher. For both sets of results it is not appropriate to make comparisons between individual vehicles as conditions varied from test to test.
- 6.12 The graphs on the following page show the outcomes by vehicle for the Euro 5 and Euro 6 public road tests.
- 6.13 The first graph is for Euro 5, the second for Euro 6.
- 6.14 The red line on both graphs is the average across the vehicles tested, whilst the dashed line is the relevant legal limit.
- 6.15 The ETP report provides further analysis of these results along with general comments from manufacturer's and a breakdown between vehicles running

hot or cold. Referral to the actual report will provide a more detailed context for some of these outputs.





7 The Future for Testing

- 7.1 In order to improve on the laboratory v real world discrepancy, two changes are set to be introduced into the testing regime within the next two years.
- 7.2 The first is Real Driving Emissions (RDE) which will run on real roads, in real traffic using portable emissions testing equipment. This is due to be introduced in September 2017.
- 7.3 Further, the underpinning legislation for RDE will allow for independent, third party organisations to conduct their own RDE tests, to verify that vehicles conform to requirements. If a vehicle is found not to comply with the emissions requirements, then the validity of type approval for that vehicle will be open to challenge.
- 7.4 The second change is a new laboratory test cycle known as world-wide harmonized light duty vehicles test procedure (WLTP) and this is a more demanding assessment with many more periods of acceleration and higher speeds which tend to generate pollutants such as NOx. Flexibilities in the current test, often seen as loopholes, have been removed.
- 7.5 Despite the new test being more representative of real-world driving, and therefore more demanding, the regulatory emission limits will stay the same and manufacturers will have to improve the way they control emissions to

make sure they continue to comply on the new cycle. In general WLTP is expected to more than double the stringency of the NOx emissions limit.

8 Implications for the CAZ

- 8.1 It is unclear at this stage how the results of the ETP report will affect the UK position with regards to the Air Quality Plans and for Birmingham how this affects the mandated CAZ.
- 8.2 Discussions with Defra suggest that the EU are investigating the ETP and studies undertaken by a number of other Member States with a view to ascertaining if these are sufficiently robust and comparable from which to devise new emission factors. This is ongoing.
- 8.3 We have been advised to consider what may happen if the emission factors are updated and if the emissions from diesel cars are made worse; effectively to introduce a contingency for this within the scoping work being undertaken.

9 Implications for Resources

9.1 The resources employed in delivering air quality regulation are contained within this Committee's budget.

PROPOSAL PAPER FOR THE CHARGING OF FOOD HYGIENE RATING REVISITS

- 1. Summary
- 1.1 This paper sets out the potential for charging for food hygiene revisits where these have been requested by the food business. Currently there is no charge set, and there are no specific provisions within the Food Hygiene Rating Scheme (FHRS) for the recovery of charges. There is also nothing that explicitly prohibits the charging for revisits.
- 2. Recommendation
- 2.1 That Committee agree to the recharging for food hygiene rating revisits on a cost recovery basis.

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3. Background

- 3.1 The Local Government Act 2003 introduced a general power to charge for the provision of any discretionary service delivered by the council. The charging power is available to 'best value authorities' as defined in Section 1 of The Local Government Act 1999. This includes all councils (County, Unitary Authorities, London Boroughs, Metropolitan Boroughs, and Districts Councils) who can, therefore, utilise this power.
- 3.2 The charging powers do not apply to services which an authority is mandated or has a duty to provide. However, councils can charge for discretionary services, those services they have power to provide but are not obliged or have a duty to provide by law.
- 3.3 The recipient of the discretionary service must be fully advised of the charge and have agreed to pay for the provision of the service before it is delivered.
- 3.4 The 2003 Act powers can only be used where no other control is specified i.e. it cannot be used where charging is prohibited or where another specific charging regime applies.
- 3.5 There is an additional Act that covers re-charging provisions, the Localism Act 2011. The General Power of Competence (GPC) within the Localism Act states that: "A Local Authority has power do anything that individuals generally may do". The 2011 Act follows very closely the requirements of the 2003 Act.

4. <u>Food Hygiene Rating Scheme</u>

- 4.1 FHRS also known as "scores on the doors" is the national scheme operated by the Food Standards Agency to publically reflect the rating of a food business following an unannounced inspection by your officers. The scores range from 0 to 5, zero being the worst score and five being the best.
- 4.2 The only way a score can be assigned to a business is via the food inspection programmes undertaken by local authorities. Under the scheme food business owners may appeal a score within 21 days of an inspection. In addition where a lower score than a business may aspire to has been correctly awarded, a Food Business Operator may request an unannounced inspection 3 months after the rating was correctly given. Annually your officers receive in excess of 100 of these requests per annum. Currently these inspections are undertaken without charge in addition to the annual inspection programme. This report is asking Committee to consider recharging for these discretionary inspections.

5. Matters for Consideration

- 5.1 Whilst the 2011 Act appears the most recent and relevant power to utilise, discussions with Legal Services indicate reservations in relation to the General Powers of Competency definition within this Act. This appears to suggest that a Local Authority can trade or charge for a service that could be provided by others. Whilst FHRS revisits are discretionary, it would not be something that another person could carry out. In essence it is closed business, only we can check on the works that we have asked for, and only we can reissue a rating to the food business.
- We, therefore, propose to rely on the powers in the 2003 Act if Committee are minded to approve charging a re-inspection fee based on cost recovery. In principle we meet the requirements specified in that:
 - We are not mandated to provide the service.
 - We have the power to carry out the service.
 - In principle, following notification of the charge, the business once submitting an application for a revisit will have agreed to pay.
 - There are no prohibitions within the scheme to impose a charge.
- 5.3 It is worth noting that the Secretary of State has the power within the 2003 Act to dis-apply the charging power, although it is not clear if this is a general rule across the country, or if it could be applied to an individual Local Authority and a specific charge. The Secretary of State has also been requested to implement a national scheme to enable cost recovery by local authorites for this work by this Committee, without success.
- 5.4 We estimate that a general cost of £150 would be within the criteria of cost recovery, on the basis that we receive in excess of 100 revisit requests per year this could result in receipts of at least £15,000.

6. Consultation

6.1 This report has been circulated to the Food Standards Agency and other metropolitan local authorities in the region.

7. <u>Implications for Resources</u>

7.1 The additional work for re-inspections is estimated to be in the region of 1/3rd of a full time equivalent Environmental Health Officer per year.

8. Implications for Policy Priorities

8.1 The recommendations are in accordance with Financial Regulations, budget requirements and the Corporate Charging Policy.

- 9. <u>Public Sector Equality Duty</u>
- 9.1 There are no specific implications identified.

FOOD LAW ENFORCEMENT PLAN 2016/2017

- 1. Summary
- 1.1 The Local Government Act 2000 requires each Food Authority to identify its strategy and the resources required to fulfil its Food Safety function each year in the form of a Food Law Enforcement Plan.
- 1.2 The Food Law Enforcement Plan for 2016/2017 which is attached to this covering report includes a review of the food safety activity carried out in 2015/2016.
- 2. Recommendation
- 2.1 That the Food Law Enforcement Plan be agreed.

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3. Background

- 3.1 The Food Law Enforcement Plan sets out the City's commitment to Food Safety Enforcement for the year ahead.
- 3.2 The plan shows the number of food hygiene and food standards interventions which will be required and identifies those areas of work which are considered essential to protecting food safety in Birmingham.
- 3.3 The plan includes the targets that were set for last year (2015/2016) and reviews performance against them.

4. <u>Consultation</u>

4.1 The work outlined in this report involves consultation with interested parties such as the Food Standards Agency, DEFRA, and Public Health England.

5. Implications for Resources

5.1 Whilst the exact costs are difficult to forecast we estimate that the plan will be delivered within the resources available to your Committee at a ratio of 11.8 full time equivalent officers.

6. Implications for Policy Priorities

- 6.1 Safe food is not only crucial to the health and safety of citizens and visitors to the City but the work which is referred to in the Food Law Enforcement Plan is also consistent with other policy priorities including economic success, staying safe and being healthy.
- 6.2 It is important that all groups within Birmingham, as well as visitors to the city, are offered suitable standards of food quality and hygiene to allow them the healthy lifestyle opportunities to which they are entitled. By targeting food safety interventions according to business risk ratings every effort is made to ensure safe food for all.

7. Public Sector Equality Duty

7.1 Equality issues are accounted for during food safety activities carried out by officers.

FOOD LAW ENFORCEMENT PLAN 2016-2017

1. <u>Background</u>

- 1.1 All local authorities are required to produce a Food Law Enforcement Plan which sets out the measures the authority will take to safeguard food safety during the forthcoming financial year and reviews the targets set for the previous year.
- 1.2 Birmingham has approximately 7,560 food premises including manufacturers, wholesalers, retailers and caterers, ranging from small and medium sized businesses to major concerns and this includes 81 food businesses which need specific approval. In addition many other businesses change hands throughout the course of a twelve month period, and currently there are 988 unrated food businesses requiring inspection and rating. This provides a constant challenge to ensure that all food businesses are included in the regular food inspection programme.
- 1.3 As well as carrying out food hygiene and food standards inspections, all food complaints relating to adulteration, composition, labelling, fitness and quality are investigated. An annual food and water sampling programme is carried out to ensure that microbiological, chemical and compositional standards are met, including nationally co-ordinated surveys. All reported outbreaks and sporadic cases of suspected food poisoning are also investigated.
- 1.4 Food safety activities are undertaken in line with the 'Better Regulation Agenda' brought in by the Regulatory Enforcement and Sanctions Act 2008, i.e. being proportionate, accountable, consistent, transparent and targeted. The Act, therefore, places greater emphasis on providing advice and guidance to food businesses in addition to firm but fair enforcement.

2. <u>Demands on the Food Service</u>

- 2.1 Each Local Authority has different demands which impact on the delivery of the food safety service and within Birmingham these include:
 - Ensuring that the statutory inspection targets are met in respect of such a large number of food premises in the largest local authority in England and Wales.
 - Ensuring that an equitable service is delivered in a multi-cultural City so that information on food hygiene and technical advice is accessible to all food traders.
 - Dealing with a high turnover of food businesses and proprietors within the City and maintaining an accurate database to ensure that all food premises are inspected.

2.2 The reduction in officer numbers within Environmental Health will impact on the service, particularly in respect of planned activities

3. Introduction to The Food Law Enforcement Plan for 2016/2017

- 3.1 The priorities for ensuring food safety in Birmingham for 2016/2017 are to:
 - Carry out a programme of food hygiene interventions for the year.
 - Investigate all requests for assistance in relation to food hygiene, food standards and food complaints, including sporadic cases and outbreaks of infectious disease.
 - Carry out a comprehensive food and water sampling programme.
- 3.2 The work plan to safeguard food in Birmingham during the forthcoming year is detailed in Appendix 1.
- 3.3 Some of the figures, such as those for requests for assistance, infection control cases and food alerts given in Appendix 1 are not targets, as these will depend on the number of complaints and requests made which can obviously vary, but are the expected numbers based on the figures for 2015/2016.
- 3.4 The aim is to achieve a level of food safety in Birmingham that is consistent with the City Councils vision of a safer and healthier city.

4. Food Premises Interventions

- 4.1 Under the Statutory Food Law Code of Practice, all food premises are categorised according to an intervention rating score. This determines the frequency of primary food hygiene interventions, from 6 months to 3 years, and depends on the type of food business, the type of food processing or handling undertaken, hygiene and structure of the premises and how well risks are controlled.
- 4.2 These criteria are assessed and scored in Birmingham to give food businesses a rating under the 'National Food Hygiene Rating Scheme' (visit www.ratings.food.gov.uk). The scores for 6428 premises are available via the ratings website and since the launch officers have also been issuing window stickers for display in food premises for all businesses. The ratings range from 0 (urgent improvement necessary) to 5 (very good).
- 4.3 Currently, 85.56% of rated food businesses in Birmingham are classed as 'broadly compliant', which leaves approximately 1,091 which are not, this figure includes 856 0-1 rated premises. Officers will be concentrating on those worst premises i.e. those in the 0-1 range by carrying out additional interventions and taking enforcement action where necessary in order to raise standards to 'broadly compliant'

4.4 The authority will continue to utilize a range of interventions depending on the previous history of the food business. These interventions include inspections, audits, monitoring, surveillance, verification visits, advice and guidance and information/intelligence gathering. The intervention programme will be as indicated below.

The higher risk category A to D premises will still be subjected to full inspections. This includes inspections of premises requiring approval, manufacturers and larger more complex food businesses, these types of businesses add an additional 30 officer days per month demand on resources.

In relation to Category E rated premises, we will critically review the nature of the businesses and base our interventions as follows:

- those businesses with no inspectable risk (vending only, bookmakers retailing drinks only, chemists) will be removed from the programme;
- full inspection of low risk child care establishments following referral from Ofsted:
- full inspections of any premises subject to a food hygiene complaint;
- full inspection of 10% of category E premises where open food is handled:
- the remaining premises will be subject to a self-assessment questionnaire by correspondence.

988 unrated food businesses – these are new registration businesses and those discovered operating that have not yet been inspected.

An identified backlog of 312 category D inspections.

An identified backlog of 4,305 category E interventions, these will be analysed to remove any with no inspectable risk. The remaining will be completed over the next 3 years, with 10% being subject to full inspections with the remaining to be self-assessment.

Approximately 500 new registrations expected this year.

- 4.5 Food standards inspections which cover the quality, labelling and composition of food are rated differently but, where possible, these will be carried out at the same time as food hygiene inspections. Particular emphasis will be placed on food standards during inspections of manufacturers. Officers will also check on the traceability of products and their authenticity during inspections, to detect and reduce food fraud.
- 4.6 The food hygiene and food standards interventions which are required during 2016/2017 are given in Appendix 1.

5. Food Related Complaints and Requests for Assistance

- 5.1 Investigations are carried out into complaints about poor hygiene in food premises and in response to requests for assistance from food proprietors who need additional advice about their business. The number of complaints reached an all-time peak last year of 2,622.
- 5.2 In addition, an average of 455 complaints are received each year from members of the public who are concerned about the food they have bought or eaten. These are investigated on health risk basis and are often complex investigations involving other Local Authorities, national companies and importers where food has originated from outside Birmingham or the UK. The main aim of these investigations is to find out whether the complaint is indicative of a general problem which could have serious implications for public health at a local, regional or national level and to take steps to control any further risk. Where the issue is low risk, investigations will be delayed until the next programmed inspection.
- 5.3 The FSA operates a system to alert the public and food authorities to problems concerning food which does not meet food safety requirements or which is inadequately labelled and where a product recall has been issued. Many of these are for information only where the company concerned has been able to trace and recall most of the product, but some require local authority involvement to contact retailers or caterers to ensure the food is removed from sale. With such a large number of caterers and retailers in the City, this can prove a challenging and time consuming exercise. Where a large scale response is required this will impact on other demands of this plan.

6. Home/Primary Authority Principle

- 6.1 The Service supports the Home Authority Principle set up by LGR (Local Government Regulation) and the Primary Authority Principle set up by BRDO (Better Regulation Delivery Office). This means that a formal partnership arrangement is set up so that one local authority becomes the main point of contact to give the business advice on food policy matters and to advise other local authorities on any complaints they may be investigating within their area.
- 6.2 Regulatory Services has formal partnerships for food safety and food standards matters with:

- 6.3 This is a resource intensive exercise as additional meetings and inspections are required in order to properly advise both the business and other local authorities. Where Primary Authority Partnerships have been agreed, we operate a cost recovery system from the company, with approximately £28,000 recovered this year. For this reason we are looking at converting our existing Home Authority arrangements to Primary Authority Partnerships. We are not able to make a profit on these arrangements, they are purely cost recovery. The principle is supported through our contact with businesses involved in the Greater Birmingham and Solihull Local Enterprise Partnership.
- 6.4 In addition, Birmingham is the originating authority for approximately 150 food manufacturers, whereby the Home Authority principles are applied, although formal partnerships have not been established with these companies. We have a statutory duty to deal with referrals from other Local Authorities where products manufactured in Birmingham are sold in other areas, and problems are identified. There is no requirement for these businesses to enter into a formal partnership arrangement.

7. Food Sampling

- 7.1 A food and water sampling programme will be developed during the year in conjunction with Public Health England (PHE) and the Public Analyst.
- 7.2 The sampling programme will be restricted to national and regional surveys co-ordinated by PHE and CENTSA, the surveys planned and numbers of samples proposed have yet to be agreed due to funding restrictions. There has been a year on year reduction in sampling, from 589 in 2013/2014, 163 in 2014/2015, 61 in 2015/2016 to an unknown number planned for this year. The aim of the programme is to ensure that food and drink supplied, manufactured and sold within Birmingham meets regulatory standards in terms of microbiological safety, labelling, composition and quality, and are accurately described, giving consumers accurate information when purchasing food products.

8. Control of Infectious Diseases

8.1 All outbreaks and sporadic cases of food poisoning and suspected food poisoning are investigated, including potentially serious infections such as typhoid, paratyphoid, dysentery and E. coli 0157. Officers work in close liaison with the Consultants in Communicable Disease Control, Public Health doctors and nurses of the Health Protection Agency to protect the public health of people who live and work in or visit the City. Joint guidelines have been produced to ensure that all cases of infectious disease are investigated

thoroughly. Reciprocal training is carried out to train professionals for both Regulation and Enforcement and the Health Protection Agency.

9. Food Premises Database

- 9.1 It is important that the food premises database is kept as up to date as possible so that all food premises are inspected regularly. To achieve this a range of initiatives are carried out including the registration process, area surveys and officer's working proactively to identify new food premises in their districts. This additional surveillance ensures that new food businesses which have not registered are identified so that they can be included in the food inspection programme.
- 9.2 A number of issues were highlighted relating to the recording of premises on the database, and the ratings applied. A management report has been developed that identifies anomalies in relation to the information held about food businesses, including the ratings applied. This report will be run quarterly and any such anomalies will be corrected. This will ensure that the database is up to date and returns to the FSA are accurate.
- 9.3 There are 98 unrated food businesses that have been identified on the database. These are being included in the inspection programme which will improve the integrity of the database and the returns to the FSA. A regular report will be run to identify unrated premises, to ensure that steps are taken to manage this situation in future.

10. Advice to Businesses

- 10.1 In accordance with the Enforcement Policy, advice is offered wherever possible to food businesses, to assist them in complying with relevant law and the principles of good practice. This advice may be given during inspections or when requests for assistance are received directly from established food traders or from those considering setting up new food businesses.
- 10.2 A special starter pack to help new or proposed food businesses has been developed which is available on the City Council's website (www.birmingham.gov.uk/foodsafety). A wide range of other online leaflets in community languages is also available. The pack is also provided to new businesses at initial inspections when appropriate.
- 10.3 In addition, the food safety web pages on BCC's website provide more information and advice to food businesses and consumers and where to find additional support, such as from the Food Standards Agency.
- 10.4 Officers also work closely with the Events Division to ensure that food and health and safety at large outdoor events in Birmingham are assured. An information pack has been developed for traders to receive in advance and on-the-day inspections will be carried out at events such as Vasaikhi, Eid

Mela, Frankfurt Christmas Market and Taste of Birmingham. The demand in this area of work has increased and the trend continues this year with very high profile events in the city. Additional resources have not been identified to cover this demand and will therefore impact on other parts of this plan.

11. Food Safety and Standards Promotion

- 11.1 Queries from the public will be responded to on food safety matters as part of the overall request for assistance service.
- 11.2 As part of our partnership with Public Health the authority will continue to explore ways to encourage food outlets to provide healthier choices on their menus.
- 11.3 Due to changes in labelling regulations all food business will be required to provide greater information to consumers about allergenic ingredients. Following a significant on-going education programme in the city to prepare businesses for this change, this process will now step up to include planned enforcement at premises deliberately flouting the legislation.

12. Review of work undertaken in 2015/2016

Inspections and legal action

- 12.1 Appendices 1 and 2 give detailed information on the food safety work carried out during 2015/2016.
- 12.2 Some 3,087 food hygiene inspections were carried out in 2015/2016 and 2,674 food standards inspections. This represents 87% of the programmed inspection target and also included a number of low risk inspections to premises not included in the programme but where complaints had been received. The shortfall included Category E premises that are low risk, and overdue Category D premises that are planned to be completed this year.
- 12.3 Officers though concentrated on ensuring that the genuine low scoring premises were improved, by carrying out additional inspections and taking enforcement action where necessary. Although these premises are not automatically re-rated the current rate of improvement after officer action stands at 72%.
- 12.4 Birmingham has 81 food businesses which require specific EC approval. These are premises which produce or store high risk meat, fish or dairy products on a wholesale basis. This is a slight increase compared to last year's figure of 76, this is expected to increase further as a rise in applications has been noted. This process usually involves a number of inspections, a review of the company's food safety management system and an assessment of other conditions before approval can be granted and requires a more indepth knowledge of assessing food safety systems. These types of premises

- were responsible for E.Coli outbreaks investigated by Professor Pennington and represent the highest risk to food safety
- 12.5 During 2015/2016, 116 premises were found to present an imminent risk to health and were closed immediately until all necessary works were carried out. This is significantly above the average number of closures which are normally carried out in Birmingham and a very large increase on last year. Although this could be considered a large number, compared to the total number of inspections carried out, (3087) it only represents 3.75% of premises which seriously failed to meet basic hygiene requirements and put their customers at risk.
- 12.6 31 premises were prosecuted for food hygiene and food labelling related offences, with total fines amounting to £106,761 and costs recovered of over £31,000. In addition 10 businesses received a simple caution. This is a 50% increase in the number of prosecutions compared to previous years.
- 12.7 One of the particular reasons for the rise in enforcement activity was a project to inspect a number of overdue Category A-C premises identified in last years plan. These businesses had a significantly higher proportion subjected to enforcement, including closure, prosecution and the service of legal notices. This demonstrates the importance of regular interventions to ensure food safety. A full report on this project and outcomes will be reported to committee.

Food and water sampling

- 12.8 A range of surveys have been carried out to investigate the microbiological safety of food products as well as composition and labelling. The sampling programme has included surveys of food manufactured in Birmingham as well as a number of surveys on healthy eating claims
- 12.9 As part of the sampling programme, 8 food and water surveys were carried out comprising 122 samples in total. Of these, 16 were unsatisfactory i.e. 13% due to high bacterial counts or adulteration. This is a slightly lower failure rate than in previous years but at a rate that demonstrates the improved targeted and intelligence led programme. All of the issues identified were raised with the companies concerned and their home authorities and follow up action taken to ensure that problems were rectified and where necessary food products removed from sale.

Food Hygiene Rating Scheme

12.10 The ratings website where hygiene scores for businesses are displayed features over 6,000 food businesses. As part of the scheme officers issued window stickers for all businesses in the scheme. We continue to support the introduction of legislation requiring the mandatory display of ratings stickers.

Training

12.11 All officers who carry out food inspections have received training in food safety, although this was less than the 10 hours required, and the ever-popular Birmingham Practical Food Inspection courses were held in June 2015 in conjunction with Birmingham University and Wolverhampton University.

Project Work

- 12.12 Officers have worked in partnership with the Council's events division, an officer was appointed to offer specialist advice concerning food safety at the major outdoor events which took place in the City including, the Christmas German Market, the Vaisakhi celebrations and the Birmingham Carnival. Over 60 inspections were carried out of food businesses at the German Market to ensure the event was a success.
- 12.13 In addition officers from The Food Lead Team have been working with Severn Trent and the Council's events team to address the issues of water supply at outdoor events. Where potable water is supplied it is required to meet drinking quality standards, even where it is not supplied for drinking purposes.
- 12.14 Officers have worked with traders on the Bull Ring Indoor Market to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of temperature control equipment to ensure that products sold remain safe. Further work has been undertaken to improve the hygiene ratings of businesses at the Bull Ring Indoor Market. This is funded by the markets.

13. Trends

- 13.1 Appendix 3 gives statistical information showing the trends in a number of areas of food safety since 2010. The number of food premises in Birmingham and the interventions required has been fairly steady. The number of interventions carried out in 2015-2016, due to excluding the low risk inspections, was 87% of the actual target.
- 13.2 The number of Emergency Prohibition Notices served has fluctuated over the past 6 years, with an average of 51 served per year. The number served in 2015-2016 was significantly above this average, see appendix 3.
- 13.3 The number of Food Hygiene requests for assistance has continued to rise in comparison to the previous year. The numbers are more than double that received in the early 2000's, perhaps showing an increased public awareness of food hygiene and a demand for high quality, and ease of making complaints via the internet. The number of complaints about food has stabilised this year to just at the six year average.

13.4 The number of sporadic cases of infectious disease has decreased last year, after a big rise in 2010/2011 the numbers have been declining. This highlights the need to continue to direct resources at poor performing food businesses and the importance of food safety in the Service Plan in reducing foodborne infection. The number of reported outbreaks of infectious disease has dropped again this year; this is due to most community outbreaks being investigated by Public Health England.

14. Resources

14.1 The food safety work during 2015/2016 was carried out within existing budgets, except where indicated.

HEALTH AND SAFETY LAW ENFORCEMENT PLAN (HSLEP) 2016/2017

- 1. Summary
- 1.1 Local authorities are required, by the Health and Safety Executive's National Local Authority Enforcement Code (May 2013), to produce an annual Health and Safety Law Enforcement Plan (HSLEP).
- 1.2 This requirement is part of section 18(4) of the Health and Safety at Work etc. Act 1974 (HASWA), and requires all enforcing authorities to comply with requirements in the Code.
- 1.3 This document which is Birmingham's HSLEP sets out the health and safety work programme for 2016 2017.
- 2. Recommendation
- 2.1 That the report is noted and the Health and Safety Law Enforcement Plan for 2016/2017 be approved.

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3. <u>Background</u>

- 3.1 To meet the Health & Safety Executive's (HSE) *National Local Authority Enforcement Code*, Birmingham City Council as a Local Authority enforcing health and safety law is required to:
 - make a commitment to improving health and safety outcomes;
 - set out our priorities and plan of interventions for the current year taking into account local and national priorities; and
 - target our interventions to maximise their impact.
- 3.2 To meet these requirements of the current *National Local Authority Enforcement Code*, the City Council should:
 - make a formal corporate commitment to improving health and safety outcomes:
 - implement a written intervention plan which is agreed by senior management including Members, and:
 - include a range of risk-based interventions such as planned inspections, planned enforcement initiatives, investigation of accidents and complaints,
 - b. link health and safety interventions with national, regional and local objectives such as national campaigns, and
 - c. include planning and delivering objectives with other partners and stakeholders.
- 3.3 This Health and Safety Law Enforcement Plan (HSLEP) includes proactive inspections of premises categorised as posing the highest risk identified through either national or local priorities. This enables resources to be directed to those areas where we believe we can have a positive impact in improving health and safety standards.

4. Consultation

4.1 The work outlined in this report is in response to the requirements of the HSE who direct local authorities on health and safety interventions nationally. The work has also been chosen to target high risk incidents that have been reported to the City Council in the previous financial year or are of an ongoing concern.

5. <u>Implications for Resources</u>

5.1 The HSLEP will be delivered within existing budgets. However, priorities may have to be reviewed during the course of the year according to circumstances. For instance, a large number of major accidents may require resources to be diverted from other areas of work identified in the plan.

6. <u>Implications for Policy Priorities</u>

- 6.1 The promotion of health and safety in the workplace, and where required effective enforcement interventions make an essential contribution to the health and well-being of residents and visitors to the City.
- 6.2 There are also direct economic benefits to businesses that are able to manage health and safety to a high standard. These are borne out through reduced absenteeism, insurance premiums, equipment repairs, etc.
- 6.3 The activities undertaken by Environmental Health in relation to health and safety supports the City Councils Business Plan 2016+ and the Leader's 2016 policy statement of working together for a fair, prosperous and democratic Birmingham.

7. Implications for Equality and Diversity

7.1 The inspection and control of workplaces is essential to protect the health, safety and welfare of all people employed in or who are visitors to Birmingham. There have been no specific implications for equality and diversity identified.

HEALTH AND SAFETY LAW ENFORCEMENT PLAN 2016/2017

1.0 Overall aim of the service

- 1.1 The Health & Safety Law Enforcement Plan (HSLEP) represents our commitment to improving health and safety outcomes for employers, employees and visitors to Birmingham. The HSLEP also represents our continued commitment to the Health and Safety Executive's (HSE) Strategy, Helping Great Britain work well 2016¹. It also continues to support the recommendations of the Löfstedt review Reclaiming health and safety for all: An independent review of health and safety regulation².
- 1.2 Through a range of different interventions we will:
 - Work in partnership with businesses to enable them to succeed economically;
 - Secure justice for the victims of poor health and safety provision / management;
 - Help prevent work-related death, injury and ill-health;
 - Deal with serious risks (i.e. those likely to cause serious injury, ill-health, or death);
 - Use risk-based and intelligence-led interventions to target our activities appropriately and proportionately. In accordance with the *National Local Authority Enforcement Code*, we will take a common-sense approach and only target the higher-risk activities and be proportionate and consistent in our enforcement.

2.0 Introduction

- 2.1 Section 18(4) of the *Health and Safety at Work etc. Act 1974* (HASWA) requires that enforcing authorities perform their duties in accordance with guidance from the HSE. This guidance is known as the *National Local Authority Enforcement Code* (the Code).
- 2.2 We will, in line with the Code, continue to reduce the burdens on business, which disproportionate enforcement of health and safety enforcement imposes. We achieve this by employing a range of different ways of dealing with businesses. These include proactive inspections, reactive visits in response to accidents and complaints, mailshots, etc. collectively, these are referred to as "interventions".
- 2.3 One of the key elements of the Code is that local authorities must, annually, publish their HSLEP. This HSLEP sets out the arrangements to demonstrate how we will comply with Section 18 of HASWA, and outlines the work programme for the forthcoming financial year.

2.4 Our work programme incorporates the requirements of the Code; covers a number of the national priorities listed by the HSE within Local Authority Circular 67/2 (revision 5) and takes into account local health and safety priorities which are based on local intelligence mainly generated through incidents / accidents received.

3.0 Primary Authority Partnership (PAP)

3.1 These continue both nationally and in the City Council, to grow. PAPs enable businesses to nominate a single local authority from whom they can receive assured professional advice. All other local authorities are required to adhere to this assured advice when considering taking action against the partner company. Please see section 6.0 for a list of our current "health, safety and welfare" PAPs.

We are continuing to seek opportunities to develop further Partnerships and hope to announce more during 2016/2017.

4.0 The Scope of the Health and Safety Service

4.1 Health and safety regulation within the UK is predominately undertaken by the HSE and local authorities. The *Health and Safety (Enforcing Authority) Regulations 1998* states the sectors the HSE and local authorities regulate, this is largely dependent on the work activity being carried out in the premises. The Environmental Health Section is responsible for enforcing health and safety legislation in a wide range of premises in Birmingham, these include:



- 4.2 There are around 21,000 business premises in Birmingham which come under our jurisdiction for health and safety regulation. Taking a risk based approach to proactive inspections as per HSE guidance, these individual business or specific types of businesses are only inspected where national or local intelligence indicates that there may be an increased risk to the health and safety of employees and or the public. By targeting our resource in this way it ensures that we reduce the burden on compliant and low risk businesses, and focus support on those businesses that need it most.
- 4.3 Our approach to regulation is in line with the HSE³ and our Enforcement Policy⁴, as well as taking into consideration the principles of Better Regulation:
 - Targeted (to take a risk-based approach);
 - Proportionate (such as only intervening where necessary);
 - Accountable (to explain and justify service levels and decisions to the public and to stakeholders);
 - Consistent (to apply regulations consistently to all parties); and
 - Transparent (being open and user-friendly).

5.0 Priorities for this year

5.1 Our key delivery priorities are listed below:

Strategic national priorities

- Investigate notifiable incidents, dangerous occurrences and cases of work-related illness in accordance with national incident selection criteria.
- Undertake a programme of targeted inspections of cooling towers to address the risk of legionnaire's disease.
- Inspect falls from height and workplace transport management in warehousing / distribution premises / other premises where history of falling from height known (not chains).
- Investigate all notifiable incidents where work-related violence is implicated to ensure that the business has both suitable management systems in place, and adequate security measures.

Local priorities

- In conjunction with the national priorities mentioned above, we will also inspect:-
- Manual handling tasks and the risk of falls from height in tyre premises (not chains).
- Food machinery safety in catering premises to ensure that guarding of dangerous moving parts is being maintained.
- Shisha bars to ensure that employees are not being exposed to unacceptable health risks or from unsafe workplace conditions.

Partnership work

- Identify further business partners to enter into Primary Authority Partnerships, and grow existing ones.
- Continue through attendance at the West Midlands Health and Safety Liaison Group to share best practice with local colleagues and participate in relevant intervention work.
- Work with local and multisite businesses and the HSE through attendance at events or partnership work

6.0 Primary Authority Partnerships


We are continuing to develop our PAPs covering England and Wales.

Primary Authority Partnerships allow us to:

- Work closely with the business helping them to apply health and safety regulations to their specific circumstances.
- Provide robust and reliable advice which must be recognised by all local regulators.
- Introduce, where required, a national inspection plan to improve the effectiveness of inspection, avoid repeated checks, and enable better sharing of information.
- Monitor enforcement action to ensure that the business is treated consistently and that responses are proportionate to the issue.
- Recover the costs incurred by managing the partnership including officer time and travelling expenses.

The City Council cannot profit financially from PAPs. However, the Partnerships do promote the positive work of Birmingham City Council nationally.

We have five "Health, safety and welfare" Primary Authority Partnerships with



We will continue discussions with other companies to develop further Partnerships.

REPORT ON THE INTRODUCTION OF COMPULSORY DOG MICROCHIPPING LEGISLATION

- 1. <u>Summary</u>
- 1.1 To advise Committee of The Microchipping of Dogs (England) Regulations 2015 that came into effect on 6th April 2016, which requires all dogs over 8 weeks of age to be microchipped.
- 1.2 To advise on how the Dog Warden/Enforcement Officers will deal with non-compliance.
- 2. Recommendation
- 2.1 That the report be noted.

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3. Background

- 3.1 The Microchipping of Dogs (England) Regulations 2015 came into effect on 6th April 2016. It requires all dogs over the age of 8 weeks to be microchipped. A dog is microchipped where:
 - a microchip which complies with the regulations has been implanted in the dog; and
 - The details of the keeper, as set out in the regulations are recorded on the appropriate database operator.
- 3.2 There are limited exemptions to the requirements, as follows:
 - A veterinary surgeon certifies, on an approved form that a dog should not be microchipped for reasons of the animal's health.
 - That the dog is a certified working dog for the purposes of the Animal Welfare Act 2006.
- 3.3 The regulations are made under the Animal Welfare Act 2006 and are aimed at promoting responsible dog ownership and reducing the numbers of stray and unwanted dogs.
- 3.4 It costs approximately £15 £20 to have a dog microchipped by a private veterinary surgeon and £16 for the keeper of a dog to change or update their details on the database.
- 3.5 In Birmingham, the Dog Warden/Enforcement Officers (DWEO) continues to deal with high numbers of stray dogs. In 2015, some 1,139 stray dogs were seized, of which only 159 were returned directly back to their owners, with the remaining 980 being impounded at the city councils stray dog kennels.
- 3.6 The table below provides numbers of dogs the seized by the DWEO for the first 3 months of the year and also the number of dogs' microchipped.

4. Enforcement of the Microchipping Regulations

4.1 Enforcement of the new regulations falls to the Police, including community support officers and local authorities. It is unclear if the police are to take an active role in this matter.

- 4.2 There is no statutory requirement to enforce The Microchipping of Dogs (England) Regulations 2015. There are, however, moral and financial benefits in reducing the numbers of stray dogs in Birmingham.
- 4.3 An authorised officer, upon detection of a dog that is not microchipped may, if required serve a notice requiring the keeper to have the dog microchipped within 21 days. Where the keeper of a dog has failed to comply with a notice, this is an offence. Where an offence has been committed the keeper may be prosecuted or the Local Authority may arrange for the dog to be microchipped and recover from the keeper the cost of doing so or the Local Authority may take possession of a dog without the consent of the keeper for the purpose of checking whether it is microchipped or for the purpose of microchipping.
- 4.4 The DWEO do not currently pro-actively look for non-compliance. However, a percentage of the dogs seized as strays are not microchipped. Where dogs are claimed from the contracted stray dog kennels (Birmingham Dogs' Home) most are microchipped as the kennels offer this service free of charge. There are some dog owners, however, who do not give permission for their dogs to be microchipped and the dog remains unchipped. The DWEO also discover dogs that are not microchipped through their routine investigations. In these instances where non-compliance is detected, the DWEO will start a legal process to bring about compliance.
- 4.5 In the first instance DWEO serve a Notice which requires the keeper to have the dog microchipped and/or update their details on the database. Non-compliance of the notice is an offence and will result in legal action and referral to the courts. Offences of this nature carry a maximum penalty of £500.
- 4.6 Currently DWEO will not take possession of dogs, in order to carry out microchipping, due to costs and health and safety implications of taking dogs from their own homes, which can lead to dogs becoming aggressive.
- 4.7 The regulations create an offence for a person to sell any dog or puppy that is not microchipped. All dog breeders, therefore, are required to microchip puppies with the breeders' details before the puppies can be sold.

5. Implications for Resources

- 5.1 Enforcing the new regulations has an impact on the officers within the Animal Welfare Team, in terms of officer time. However, there is potential for future savings, in terms of kenneling costs, as a dog can be returned directly to its owner, through the means of a microchip, rather than impounding it at contracted stray dog kennels. It is not envisaged at this point that this will significantly reduce officer time.
- 5.2 When a dog is returned to its owner, the DWEO recover a charge of £25, which is the statutory fee under the Environmental Protection Act 1990, plus

additional charges as appropriate. These charges resulted in an income of £1,816 being received over the 2015/2016 fiscal year.

- 6. <u>Implications for Policy Priorities</u>
- 6.1 The issues involved in dealing with stray dogs, are consistent with the City Council's policy priorities associated with helping to create a cleaner, greener, safer city and dealing with anti-social behaviour.
- 7. Public Sector Equality Duty
- 7.1 No specific issues have been identified.

This takes into account corporate support of £1.200m for Pest Control and the residual overspend will be funded within the Place Directorate resources.
- 2.2 Note the delivery of the savings programme for 2015/16 as detailed in Appendix 2.
- 2.3 Note the balances and reserves as detailed in Appendix 3.

3. Consultation

3.1 Internal

The Revenue and Capital Outturn position for the City Council as a whole was considered by Cabinet on Tuesday 17 May 2016. The Chair of Licensing and Public Protection Committee, the Acting Service Director of Regulation and Enforcement and the Strategic Director of Finance and Legal have been consulted in the preparation of this report.

3.2 External

4. Compliance Issues:

4.1 <u>Are the recommended decisions consistent with the Council's policies, plans and strategies?</u>

The budget is integrated with the Council Business Plan, and resource allocation is directed towards policy priorities.

4.2 <u>Financial Implications (Will decisions be carried out within existing finances and Resources?)</u>

The Licensing and Public Protection Outturn document attached gives details of monitoring of service delivery within the available resources of the Place Directorate.

4.3 Legal Implications

Section 151 of the Local Government Act requires the Strategic Director of Finance and Legal (as the responsible officer) to ensure proper administration of the City Council's financial affairs. This report forms the concluding part of the Council's budgetary control cycle for 2015/16. Budgetary control, which includes the regular monitoring of and reporting on budgets, is an essential requirement placed on Cabinet Members, Committees, and Members of Executive Team by the City Council in discharging this statutory responsibility. There are no specific implications in relation to other policies.

4.4 Public Sector Equality Duty

There are no additional specific Equality Duty or Equality Analysis issues beyond any already assessed and detailed in the budget setting process and monitoring issues that have arisen in the year to date. Any specific assessments will be made by the Directorates in the management of their services.

5. Relevant Background/Chronology of Key Events:

Revenue Budget

5.1 The City Council approved the overall budget for 2015/16 on Tuesday 3 March 2015. The Licensing and Public Protection Committee noted the original net revenue budget allocation of £3.990m (as detailed in Appendix 1). The budget was increased by a net £0.491m during the financial year (as detailed in the table below).

Revenue Outturn

- 5.2 The provisional revenue outturn expenditure for the Licensing and Public Protection Committee was £5.191m after corporate mitigations / support, compared to the approved budget of £4.481m. This resulted in a net overspend of £0.710m or 16%.
- 5.3 The main factors contributing to the variation are follows:
 - Employee expenditure was overspent by £0.235m (2%). This is mainly due to pension strain costs (£0.257m) of which £0.170m was for Environmental Health, £0.042m Licensing and £0.039m for Trading Standards (others = £0.006m). The cost of the pension strain is partly offset by net savings (e.g. vacancies) of £0.022m.
 - Premises costs were overspent by £0.137m (14%) which is the effect of maintaining the vacated Calthorpe Road property (£0.055m) and a backdated NNDR adjustment for Coroners Court, Newton Street (£0.051m) (others = £0.031m).
 - Transportation was underspent by £0.041m (20%) due to the reduced vehicle purchasing and repairs.
 - Supplies, Services and Recharges were overspent by £0.764m. Mainly £0.293m relating to Central Support recharges for Licensing, £0.098m for Coroners Autopsies and £0.214m for Environmental Health Litter Patrols (others = £0.159m).
 - Income has under-recovered by £0.539m on Fees and Charges. The majority of this
 pressure relates to Pest Control (£0.287m) and Registrars (£0.562m). This is partly
 offset by additional Fees income of £0.310m, mainly from Environmental Health.
 - The under-recovery of Fees and Miscellaneous income is offset by Public Health Income, shown as "Recharge Income".

5.4 As part of the Provisional Outturn Report (March Committee) a forecast outturn position of £0.300m was reported. There are a number of changes affection the outturn that have occurred since then as summarised in the table below:

- 5.5 The cost of delivering Entertainment Licensing has exceeded income by a further £0.104m to that expected at Month 10. Included in the costs are organisational overheads, ensuring that the full cost of the service is reflected in the accounts.
- 5.6 The Register Office continued to be under pressure throughout 2015/16 and although additional income items were approved, these were not implemented until 2016/17.
- 5.7 The final position on Pest Control includes £1.200m of corporate mitigations / support, which has been reported to committee during the year. In the longer term this pressure has been met by additional, ongoing budget provision.

Committee Savings Programme 2015/16

- 5.8 The Committee's Savings Programme has been reported to Committee throughout the Financial Year. For 2015/16 this totalled £2.316m.
- 5.9 This includes £0.677m (or 29%) that has been fully delivered on an ongoing basis and £1.300m (56%) that has actions in place to achieve in year only relates to Pest Control.
- 5.10 £0.339m savings were not achieved and solutions will need to be identified in 2016/17.
- 5.11 The details are set out in Appendix 2.

Funding the Overspend for 2015/16

- 5.12 The overspends and underspends on ring-fenced activities have each been posted to their appropriate ring-fenced balances and reserves.
- 5.13 The remaining net overspend will be funded by the Place Directorate from savings in other services and the Committee will not be required to fund this through further savings.

Balances and Reserves

- 5.14 The balances and reserves for the Committee are shown below and these have been updated to reflect additional balances generated and utilised in 2015/16. The details are set out in Appendix 3.
- 5.15 The reserves relate entirely to ring-fenced services (Hackney Carriage & Private Hire and Entertainment Licensing) and grant funded services (Illegal Money Lending and Scambusters) and Proceeds of Crime Act. These reserves are not available to be used to offset the Committee's net overspend.
- 5.16 There was agreement by LPPC to utilise licensing balances over a three year period to reduce fees and charges for these services. This is a normal utilisation of the ring-fenced reserve and is in line with the recent Cummings v Cardiff CC judgement.
- 5.17 It is best practice for Local Authorities to utilise any balances in subsequent calculations for licence fees unless there are specific eligible items of expenditure that this is earmarked for. In this case it has been agreed to utilise the balance over a three year period.
- 5.18 The effect of this agreement can be seen in a net contribution from Hackney Carriage and Private Hire of £0.202m and this has been transferred to the relevant revenue account.
- 5.19 The cost of delivering the Entertainment Licensing Service exceeded the income generated by £0.132m in the financial year. This was carried forward to the reserves and plans will need to be developed in the future to ensure a stable financial position for this service.
- 5.20 PoCA accounts in the year have received £0.646m resources through the courts system, a significant positive increase on the previous financial year.
- 5.21 This year PoCA has delivered £0.207m in community, preventative and financial investigation projects. This is expected to increase in 2016/17 to reflect the increase in resources secured in 2015/16.

6. Evaluation of Alternative Option(s):

6.1 This report sets out the Outturn for 2015/16 and all the issues, financial risks and options were reported during the financial year to the Committee.

7. Reasons for Decision(s):

- 7.1 The Report informs the Licensing and Public Protection Committee of the Revenue Outturn for 2015/16.
- 7.2 The position in respect of the Licensing and Public Protection Committee's use of reserves, the Savings Programme and the risks are also identified.

FIXED PENALTY NOTICES ISSUED MARCH 2016

- 1. <u>Summary</u>
- 1.1 The report sets out a breakdown, on a Constituency/Ward basis, of fixed penalty notices issued in the City during the period March 2016.
- 2. Recommendation
- 2.1 That the report be noted.

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3. Background

- 3.1 The issuing of fixed penalty notices [FPN] by officers from Regulation and Enforcement is one of the means by which the problems of environmental degradation such as littering and dog fouling are being tackled within the City.
- 3.2 The yearly total numbers of fixed penalty notices issued are indicated below.

4. Enforcement Considerations and Rationale

- 4.1 Set out in Appendix 1 to this report is a table showing on a ward and constituency basis where FPNs were issued during the period March 2016. Of the people who receive a FPN, Appendix 2 indicates in which Birmingham ward the person lives. As approximately one third of those receiving FPNs do not live in the city [visitors or those who work in the city], Appendix 3 identifies where those people live.
- 4.2 By identifying both the area where the FPN is issued and the ward/area that the litterer lives this demonstrates that the anti-litter message is being spread right across the city. By and large litter patrols are targeted to the primary and secondary retail areas of the city because there is a high level of footfall and they engage with a full cross section of the population. Targeted areas include locations where there are excessive levels of littering, smoking areas with high levels of cigarette waste that cause blight in the city and areas where there are known problems associated with groups gathering to eat outdoors.
- 4.3 The number of incidences of Fixed Penalty Notices being issued reflects the fact that there is still a problem with littering on our streets. Since the Health Act came into force there has been a decline in street cleanliness associated with cigarette waste. This is reflected not only in these statistics but also in the environmental quality surveys undertaken by Fleet and Waste Management that record cigarette waste being the most prevalent waste upon our streets and identify it in 98% of all samples of street cleanliness.

4.4 One of the difficulties in resolving the problem of cigarette waste being deposited on the street is that the perception of many smokers is that cigarette waste is not litter. A change in the culture and perceptions of these smokers is critical to resolving this problem.

4.5 Anyone who receives a FPN is encouraged to talk to their co-workers, friends and families to promote the anti-litter message.

5. Consultation

5.1 The Enforcement Policy that underpins the work identified in this report is approved by your Committee. The policy reflects the views of the public and the business community in terms of the regulatory duties of the Council. Any enforcement action[s] taken as a result of the contents of this report are

subject to that Enforcement Policy.

6. Implications for Resources

6.1 The work identified in this report was undertaken within the resources

available to your Committee.

7. Implications for Policy Priorities

7.1 The issue of fixed penalty notices has a direct impact on environmental degradation within the City and the Council's strategic outcome of staying safe

in a clean, green city.

addressed.

PROSECUTIONS AND CAUTIONS - MARCH 2016

- 1. Summary
- 1.1 This report summarises the outcome of legal proceedings taken by Regulation and Enforcement during the month of March 2016.

3. Results

- 3.1 During the month of March 2016:
 - Three licensing cases resulted in fines of £731 and a total of 20 penalty points were awarded. Prosecution costs of £1,440 were awarded. Four simple cautions were administered as set out in Appendix 1.
 - 94 Environmental Health cases resulted in fines of £24,529, 17 months in custody and a six month conditional discharge. Prosecution costs of £18,780 were awarded. One simple caution was administered as set out in Appendix 2.
 - Two Trading Standards cases resulted in fines of £4,500 and a four month suspended sentence. Prosecution costs of £5,717 were awarded. No simple cautions were administered.
 - Appendix 4 lists cases finalised by district in March 2016 and cases finalised by district April-March 2016.
 - Appendix 5 lists the enforcement activity undertaken by the Waste Enforcement Team April 2015 - February 2016.

4. Consultation

4.1 The Enforcement Policy that underpins the work identified in this report is approved by your Committee. The policy reflects the views of the public and business in terms of the regulation duties of the Council. Any enforcement action[s] taken as a result of the contents of this report are subject to that Enforcement Policy.

5. <u>Implications for Resources</u>

- 5.1 Costs incurred in investigating and preparing prosecutions, including officers' time, the professional fees of expert witnesses etc. are recorded as prosecution costs. Arrangements have been made with the Magistrates Court for any costs awarded to be reimbursed to the City Council. Monies paid in respect of fines are paid to the Treasury.
- 5.2 For the year April 2015 to March 2016 the following costs have been requested and awarded:

Licensing

£45,721 has been requested with £27,234 being awarded (59%).

Environmental Health

£201,950 requested with £176,953 being awarded (87%).

Trading Standards

£72,757 requested with £55,098 being awarded (75%).

5.3 For the month of March 2016 the following costs have been requested and awarded:

Licensing

£3,811 has been requested with £1,440 being awarded (37%)

Environmental Health

£21,791 has been requested with £18,780 being awarded (86%).

Trading Standards

£5,717 has been requested with £5,717 being awarded (100%).

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3. <u>Background Information</u>

3.1 On 16 March 2007 Section 52 of the Road Safety Act 2006 came into force. This has had the effect of enabling a licensing authority to suspend or revoke a hackney carriage or private hire driver's licence with immediate effect — meaning that the suspension or revocation takes effect immediately once notice of the authority's decision has been given to the driver — where this decision is considered necessary in the interests of public safety.

4. Summary of Actions Taken for April and May 2016

- 4.1 On 15 April 2016 authority was sought to revoke with immediate effect the private hire driver's licence held by driver reference 1160. On 15 April 2016 information was received that driver 1160 was being investigated for an offence of rape.
- 4.1.2 The interests of public safety being considered paramount, an authorisation of the Acting Director of Regulation and Enforcement, acting in consultation with the Chair, was obtained and on 15 April 2016 notice was delivered to driver 1160 at his home address advising that his private hire driver's licence was revoked with immediate effect, in accordance with Section 52 of the Road Safety Act 2006 and Section 61(2B) of the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1976, and his badge was retrieved.
- 4.2 On 20 May 2016 authority was sought to revoke with immediate effect the private hire driver's licence held by driver reference 63165. On 20 May 2016 information was received that driver 63165 was being investigated for an offence of rape.
- 4.2.1 The interests of public safety being considered paramount, an authorisation of the Director of Regulation and Enforcement, acting in consultation with the Chair, was obtained and on 20 May 2016 notice was delivered to driver 63165 at his home address advising that his private hire driver's licence was revoked with immediate effect, in accordance with Section 52 of the Road Safety Act 2006 and Section 61(2B) of the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1976. His badge and vehicle identification plates were returned on 23 May 2016 once the vehicle had been returned to him.

5. Implications for Resources

5.1 No specific implications have been identified; however, drivers retain the right to appeal through a Magistrates' Court, which may result in the imposition of costs either to or against the City Council.

- 6. <u>Implications for Policy Priorities</u>
- 6.1 The contents of the report contribute to the City Council's published policy priority of improving the standards of licensed vehicles, people and premises in the City.
