We would like to express our extreme disappointment that Kings Norton Boys School is proposing to close its 6th form provision.

Our son is currently in Year 12 (first year of sixth form) and this will cause him, us and many others with boys lower down the school considerable distress.

We understand that the management and governors of the school have been forced into this position by the Government's significantly reduced 6th form funding and an excess of local 6th form provision.

The latter is caused in part by the setting up of the new £19 million University of Birmingham School. While we acknowledge that extra 11-16 places are required locally, additional 6th form places are obviously not. Bournville School closed its 6th form recently and now it looks likely that Kings Norton Boys School will follow suit.

The University of Birmingham School should have been set up without a 6th form (admittedly less attractive to the University of Birmingham but another sponsor could have been found) to give existing schools a fighting chance of surviving. The money saved from establishing a smaller new school could have been spent on supporting existing schools.

Poor planning to say the least!

We are very concerned as to how this will impact our son's A levels; one of his teachers has already resigned and left at Christmas.

Our son is a very able student; he is studying Physics, Chemistry, Maths and Further Maths and intends to apply to University to study Engineering. If more of his teachers leave, this is bound to negatively affect him and this concerns us greatly.

# RE: Proposal of the Governing Body of King's Norton Boys School: Alteration to the age range from 11-18 years to 11-16 years

I am writing in response to the announcement from the Governing Body of King's Norton Boy's School that they will be commencing a statutory consultation on their proposals to alter the upper age range at the school from 11-18 to 11-16, resulting in the closure of the sixth form.

Obviously I am disappointed to learn of these plans especially given the sixth form's long and proud history of achievement. As the local MP for Birmingham, Selly Oak I regret the loss of any provision in my constituency but I am also conscious that the school has been unable to sustain its sixth form numbers.

I understand that the cost of running the sixth form provision is double the current funding received from the Education Funding Agency for Year 12 and 13 students. This, coupled with falling student numbers, means the sixth form provision is no longer financially viable. While it is deeply regrettable that the school is now facing this decision, without additional funding the danger is that the sixth form would need to be significantly subsidised at the expense of the secondary school. It is clear that this unfortunate situation will be exacerbated by proposed changes in the government's schools funding formula.

While it is deeply regrettable, given the difficult circumstances I accept that the decision by the school's governing body is one that had to be taken.
