National & Regional context

- Nationally rates continuing to decline but slower than before.
- National view rates are declining across all age groups and ethnicity.
- Modelling of NHS suggests this won't reflect the benefit until March.
- Nationally testing rates are stable but could be improved.
- Prevalence nationally is improving, but WM stagnant rather than falling.
- Growing national recognition of workplace transmission becoming key.
- More work nationally on Variants of Concern (VoC) and Variants of Interest (VoI)
- Regionally the rates in WM remain high and rate of decline has slowed.





Birmingham Cases Rate per 100,000 Population: 7 day rolling rate benchmarked against alert level thresholds




Heat maps of age-specific case rates per 100,000 people *from .Gov website* Data up to 6th February








Death Data

- The most recent death data where death occurred within 28 or 60 days of a positive Covid-19 test is for the week ending the 6th Feb, this reported 90 deaths and a death rate of 7.9 deaths/100K pop.
- The more accurate data based on Covid being mentioned on the death certificate is more historical and the most recent week is that ending the 22nd January, this reported **147 deaths** registered in Birmingham. 80.1% of these were in hospital, 9.4% were at home, 7.8% in care homes.


Drive-through facilities



Lateral Flow Testing by Test Site Locations

Hub at Utilita Arena will transition to a new site by 18th Feb, spokes have been stood up and are live at Kingstanding, Sheldon, Handsworth and Shard End. Sites are open from 08:00-18:00 and no appointment is needed.


Mobile units are currently live in Southside Arcadian, Castle Vale Stadium, Maypole Youth Centre. Rotate to new sites next week at Lighthouse Aston, Blakesley Hall Museum, Heartlands Resource Centre. Appointments are booked through the Council website.

Vulnerable adults spokes and clinical spokes moving into pilot phase.

100 pharmacies have been recruited and these are going live in waves, 56 currently live. Additional focused recruitment is being focused on areas with lower coverage. Appointments are booked through the Council website.

DHSC announced at the weekend direct provision from national to local businesses with more than 50 staff. This means BCC no longer required to stand up workplace testing spokes.

Covid Community Champions & Community Engagement

Birmingham Covid Champions programme aims to create clarity where there is confusion and opportunities for citizens to take action in local communities to contain Covid in our city.

- Ambition to recruit up to 1,500 volunteers to become Covid Champions
- Provide e-learning modules, webinars and text message cascade
- Weekly key message & FAQ for champions
- Specific vaccination understanding training programme delivered jointly with the NHS
- Utilise snapshot survey feedback from Champions to evolve the programme

Commissioned 19 communities partners working with 35 targeted communities

Situation Awareness


- There have been 17 new clusters identified in workplaces the last 14 days by PHE linked to workplaces up to 6th Feb, this is second highest number after care homes (25) and significantly higher than schools (8).
- The number of reported situations in workplaces continues to remain concerning. Investigation highlights poor distancing behaviours.
- On-going outbreaks in Care Homes and clusters linked to schools.
- Of new cases in the last 7 days 49.7% of cases link to an identified residential cluster this includes 47.2% are linked to household clusters and 1.8% to care home clusters.

Vaccination



Vaccination Planning

- The NHS are planning the logistics of mass vaccination for C-19 vaccine. This is based on three potential vaccine models: single dose, double dose close together, double dose far apart, and whether refrigeration is required.
- Current approved vaccine is double dose, about a month apart, requires refrigeration and requires a vaccine free period prior to administration.
- NHS vaccine hubs are being coordinated by UHBT on behalf of local system
- Prioritisation is >80yr olds, care workers and NHS staff, >70yr priority groups and Clinically Extremely vulnerable to be completed by mid-February.
- Primary care network roll out of the vaccine have started and are scaling up.

Operation Eagle



Operation Eagle

- Response to Covid-19 variants of concern (VoC)
- Variants of concern are strains of the virus that have higher infectiousness or higher mortality or vaccine resistance or a combination of these.
- Current VoC identified in the UK, South Africa, Japan and Brazil.
- Operation Eagle is focused on containing spread and eradicating the variant in a defined geographical area where there is evidence of SA cases where community transmission is suspected as no direct link to international travel.
- Three LAs in WM affected currently Birmingham, Walsall, Worcestershire
- Approach:
 - PCR testing of asymptomatic people living or working within the affected area
 - Collect & Drop hubs, Drop & Collect to businesses & schools and doorsteps, drive through and walk through sites set up at pace
 - Footprint of circa 10,000 people needing to test within a week in a defined geographic area.
 - Tests processed within 7 days at Colindale PHE lab to identify further cases of variant



Operation Eagle Birmingham One

- Focus on mainly on Frankley Great Park and specific area of Northfield agreed with Public Health England. There is a post-code checker on the Council website for individuals to check if they live or work within the affected zone.
- Testing is offered to all adults over 18yrs who live or work within the area who don't have symptoms of Covid-19. This needs to be done through the designated sites to ensure test kits are returned to the correct lab.
- Individuals with symptoms should access testing through the normal 119/NHS website.

3 Mobile Testing Units for drive up or walk up – 2 units at St.Modwens Site, 1 Empire Cinema Great Park, open 0800-1600 Collect & Drop Hub – Hollymoor Community Centre, open 08:00-1800 for collection (drop before 17:00) Business & School Drop & Collect – online order form to request drops & collection, distribution and collection within 24hrs

Door step drop & collect – launches on 9th Feb in areas to north of Holly Hill Road & New St and north of Boleyn Road Used kits returned to designated LTS sites to be sent to labs
