1. Purpose of report:

Premises to remain open to the public 24hours (Monday to Sunday).

Licence Holder name - PKD Retail Limited Premises name - Mace Convenience store

I am a resident on Hampton Court Road, situated in very close proximity to Mace Convenience Store. I wish to raise a concern about increased crime and potential signification public nuisance, particularly in the form of noise and light pollution, caused by the extension of the application to extend the hours for the sale of alcohol to midnight, and to provide late night refreshments (LNR) until 5am.

This extension of these hours would go against the nature of this very quiet residential street.

There are no other late night shops in the vicinity, which is a reason that we moved from our previous home situated in a busier town centre area and moved to this location.

The street is comprised of families and elderly people who have chosen to live in a quiet location away from late night shops and alcohol sales, and we have not requested this service. The extension of the licencing hours would therefore be most likely of value to people outside of this vicinity travelling in to buy alcohol or late night refreshments.

Noise from car engines and car doors late into the night will disrupt sleep, as will people's voices.

People buying alcohol at that time of night will likely have been drinking previously and therefore likely to speak more loudly / shout and make noise. This street is almost silent at night time currently. The park opposite may be the destination for people to drink alcohol.

The applicant states that they will place a sign next to the exit requesting that customers 'respect the needs of the local community when leaving the premises'. Is there an evidence base to demonstrate that such signs have an effect on people's behaviour?

Additionally, I am concerned about the noise people make when walking or driving to and from the premises too. Should this licence be granted, a shop on the other end of the street, which currently closes by 9pm may be encouraged to apply for a similar extension for competition.

I understand that the garage used to be late-opening and that residents complained about the noise and disruption. There is a car vacuum there that is very noisy and people used in the night.

The business currently closes by, I believe, 9pm. These late night hours will mean that lighting is on throughout the night. There are properties all around.

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As a homeowner, I am concerned about the impact this could have on my quality of life and sleep, and worried that it will affect my sale price and saleability of my property in future, as this will be a less desirable place to live.

In regards to prevention of crime - there have been a number of crimes committed at the shop in recent times (see posters on shop window stating this), to which I believe the police have failed to attend. Additionally, I have heard reports that the police have been informed about a drug dealing operating from the garage forecourt. It is likely that the incidence of crime is likely to increase with these extended opening hours throughout the night.

Residents are likely to experience nuisance in the form of increased traffic late at night, together with car doors slamming and so on.  - 1. An electronic shunt lock will be fitted to the front entrance door so it can be remotely locked/opened from behind the counter.
 - 2. A panic button will be fitted behind the counter and connected directly to the alarm company.
 - 3. The Premises Licence Holder shall ensure that all staff employed at the premises whose duties include the sale or supply of alcohol shall undertake and complete a relevant programme of training utilising an appropriate licensing guidance manual prior to them being authorised to sell or supply alcohol. Such training shall consist of providing staff with an understanding of:
 - The need to ensure the responsible sale and supply of alcohol
 - Adopt Challenge 25 proof of age scheme.
 - The need to refuse the sale and supply of alcohol to persons who are intoxicated or underage
 - The need to seek credible age verification from persons seeking to be sold or supplied alcohol who may appear under the age of 18 years old Records of the training programme shall be maintained and made available to
 - Authorised Officers upon request.
 4. The Premises Licence holder shall provide a "refresher" training session to all relevant staff members annually.
 - 5. The CCTV policy shall record for a minimum rolling period of 31 days
 - 6. Prominent, clear notices shall be displayed at all exit points to advise customers to respect the needs of the local community when leaving the premises.
 - 7. Spirits are to be located behind the counter and will not be self-service.






