Context

- PFI contract between the council and Birmingham Highways Ltd remains
- BHL is re-procuring its subcontractor
- Necessary to change the contract between the council and BHL to do this
- Services in the interim provided by Kier Highways Ltd
- The £50.311m pa PFI grant is subject to approval of business cases by Department for Transport



Challenges

- Affordability: The contract as originally specified is significantly unaffordable within the available funding
- Value for money: Balancing:
 - A contract that is attractive and deliverable to get a competitive procurement
 - Services that the council needs and wants and that are value for money
 - A structure that Government can approve for continuation of the PFI grant
- **Timetable:** Although 19 months, this is still tight
- Alternative: A non-PFI structure but no PFI grant



Interim Services

- Kier Highways Ltd since 1 April 2020
- Services include:
 - Surveys and inspections
 - Reactive maintenance and incident response
 - Routine maintenance
 - Winter maintenance
 - Street Lighting, Traffic Signals and Tunnels Programmed maintenance

Objectives:

- Comply with statutory duties for a safe and available highway
- Stabilise service delivery
- Start the process of cultural change and improve behaviour during interim period
- Contract extended to match procurement timeline (August 2023)



Long-term procurement timetable

Timetable:

- October 2021: Prior Information Notice published
- January 2022: Invitations to Participate in Dialogue
- April 2022: Shortlist bidders and commence dialogue
- January 2023: Tenders submitted
- March 2023: Appoint Preferred Bidder / submit Full Business Case to DfT
- April 2023: Contract award
- 1 September 2023: Commencement



The future contract

- The council has always been clear that change is needed
- Recommended approach reflects compromises
- Changes include:
 - Specification requirements what gets done in what timescale
 - The way payment for non-performance works
 - Who takes risk some risks come back to the council

Approach:

- Continuous investment through the remaining 12 years (2023-2035)
- Performance targets split between Priority and Routine requirements
- Payment structured to give incentive to deliver services
