This includes specific interventions ante -natally, at birth, at 6-8 weeks, at 1 year old, 2.5 years old, in reception year, year 6 and throughout childhood and adolescence.

Health Visitors seek to identify developmental indicators of disability and to provide appropriate support and referral when such needs are identified. Local Authority, Public Health School Nursing Services support the health needs of all children in mainstream schools, inlcuding children in mainstream schools with Special Educational Needs (SEN) who have an Education, Health, Care and Support Plan (EHCP).

Special School Nursing is not porvided by the Local Authority due to the Medical Governance and Specialist Interventions required for such a service. Children with more clinical Special Educational Needs and Disabilities which are being met in a Special School are supported by Special School Nurses who are Commissioned by the NHS Integrated Care System.

Services are delivered universally to all children and young adults aged 0-19 and their families, reagrdless of gender. Specific support is offered to mothers by Health Visitors in respect of ante natal health, breastfeeding and post-natal mental health needs. Paternal health needs will also be set out in the service specification to support overall wellbeing in respect of parenthood and to consider this in the development of children. Health Visitors assess needs face to face, sometimes in the family home. They are well placed to identify issues which may relate statistically more greatly to one gender than the other, such as domestic violence, alcohol or drug abuse. As children develop though their educational years School Nurses will support children

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with needs relating specifically to gender such as puberty and sexual health.

Services are delivered universally to all children and young adults aged 0-19 and their families, regardless of gender identification. The provider of Health Visiting and School Nursing staff will be required in the service specification to provide training to teams in all forms of equality in order that they will provide help and support to all parents regardless of their gender identification or status, and to provide support to the children of all parents based on need. School Nurses will similarly be required to receive training to support children who are growing, developing and expressing their own needs relating to gender identification.

Health Visitors will also consider the needs of the child in the context of the whole family, of siblings under 5 years old who will themselves be seen by the Health Visitor at set points in childhood, and the impact on the

The proposal is based on the Local Authority mandated requirement to provide a universal 0-19 Service for the Birmingham community of children and their families. The service will also be targeted to support specific needs as they are identified.
