<p>1. Purpose of report:</p> <p>To consider representations that have been made in respect of an application for a Premises Licence which initially sought to permit the Sale of Alcohol (for consumption on the premises) to operate from 5:00pm until 10:30pm (Friday) and 12:00midday until 10:30pm (Saturday to Monday).</p> <p>The provision of Regulated Entertainment consisting of plays, films, live music, recorded music, performances of dance, and anything of a similar description, to operate both indoors and outdoors, from 5:00pm until 11:00pm (Friday) and 12:00midday until 11:00pm (Saturday to Monday).</p> <p>After discussions with West Midlands Police the applicant has agreed to amend the scope of the application with the Sale of Alcohol to cease at 10:15pm (each day) and Regulated Entertainment to cease a 10:30pm (each day).</p> <p>The premises / event is to remain open to the public from 5:00pm until 11:30pm (Friday) and 12:00midday until 11:30pm (Saturday to Monday).</p> <p>The applicant has also agreed that the license will cover a maximum of 3 events annually, where it is a Bank Holiday weekend the event will take place for a maximum of 4 consecutive days, this is to include Friday, Saturday, Sunday and Monday. For non-Bank Holiday weekends, the event will continue for a maximum of 3 consecutive days, this is to include Friday, Saturday and Sunday only.</p>

Dear Sirs,

I write on behalf of the ward councillors for Brandwood & Kings Heath Ward, to object to some of the conditions which the above has applied for in their application for the Sports Field at the New Irish Centre Kings Heath, where they request a license for up to 9,999 people to attend events at any one time and I'm concerned that should a serious incident occur at this site, the applicant would struggle to clear the area in a reasonable time before emergency vehicles arrived as there is only one entrance/exit to the whole site which would cause serious conflict of pedestrians with incoming emergency vehicles.

With such large numbers being approved to attend events there would be considerable issues with cars being parked where they shouldn't and little to no planning on where parking for such a large number of patrons arriving by cars could park near to the site. If we were to say one in five would arrive in cars, that is possibly two thousand additional car parking spaces to find, in what is already an extremely difficult area for car parking, knowing that there is very little off street car parking due to the nature of the type of properties in Kings Heath in general.

In addition to the large numbers in attendance, I'm concerned that music will still be playing up until 11:00pm which would mean that local residents would have loud music playing for eleven continuous hours, whether they liked it or not, therefore I ask that outdoor music is curtailed after a reasonable time, no later than 8:00pm and after eight hours on loud music.

Similar to loud music, to allow amplified speech until 11:00pm with plays outdoors and other forms of entertainment including films would also be a nuisance.

I'm very concerned to read that the license holder would also be using "Buffet & Bar Carts" throughout the field, with the Licensing Authority possibly giving a nod and approval to the applicant sub-leasing plots to sell alcohol through a third party, which surely is in breach of licensing laws.

As a local councillor I do know the area well and I'm of the belief that whilst the applicant could apply for TENs, any statutory authority does need to consider the significant disruption such large events would have on the nearby households, those whether those living in my ward of Brandwood & Kings Heath Ward, particularly on Wheelers Lane and the roads off this busy trunk road, which is also a key blue route along with those residents in my adjoining ward living in Billseley Ward.

As a long standing resident we have already had examples of noise all day long and at night. This is also in evidence on the nearby Allotment site nearly a 1/4 mile away. This noise is also in evidence during the day time and well into the evening.

I wish to object in part to the above application made by a company called Wheelers Lane Events.

The New Birmingham Irish Centre has been placed in a residential area and whilst many of its forthcoming activities will be indoors this application seeks to hold entertainment events outdoors. The application seeks to hold the events up until 11.00 p.m.

The entrance to the New Irish Centre runs adjacent to three blocks of flats on one side, running along Hollybank Road, multiple residences at Haig Place on the other side and is sited opposite houses in Wheelers Lane.

The flats on Hollybank Road, and possibly those in Haig Place, are the homes of many young families whose children have to attend school on Mondays and Tuesday as well as on the other weekdays. To have, as one section of the application refers, a live music event playing until 11.00 p.m. on a Sunday and Monday night will be detrimental to the children's (and parent's) health. The event may end at the time stated but the exodus of customer's in cars, taxis or on foot will take more time along the single driveway. The removal of stage and musicians equipment will not be a silent operation.

The noise created, nor the extra lighting required for such an event, will not be beneficial in any way to the physical and mental health of our younger citizens.

There will also be a damaging effect of the cars and taxis leaving the area together with the use of the grass banks on Wheelers Lane being used as a car park. This is already happening in the daytime but will have an additional noise and light pollution factor at night.

There already is a situation of light pollution, emitted by the floodlights of The New Irish Centre, being suffered by the residents of Wheelers Lane and which also may be affecting residents of Hollybank Road. Following repeated requests by residents there has been little action done to refocus the lighting in question.

I hope the City Council Licensing Committee can visit the area and note the close proximity of the venue to the residences. It would be unforgiveable to ignore the impact the granting of this licence would have, in part only, on the children and residents of the area.

As a resident of Wheelers Lane I have a number of concerns regarding the License Application ref 120107 for Wheelers Lane Events.

The License Application is for the sale of alcohol indoor and outdoor and entertainment including live music, recorded music and dance performances from Friday to Monday.

The Irish Centre Birmingham /Westbourne Leisure which moved to the site in January 2020 already have a license so for what premises is this additional license for?

The license application refers to the premises as a live music concert venue and gives the address as the New Irish Centre Sports Field Wheelers Lane.

As it is unclear from the application what areas are covered by Wheelers Lane Events is it the Irish Centre club or does it include the Sports field?

By granting this license does it allow them to play music outdoors or relay music through speakers to outside areas or the sports field?

I am very concerned that they are proposing to hold music events or concerts outdoors because of the levels of noise and general nuisance this would mean for residents in the area.

I would object to outdoor music or music being relayed through speakers to outside areas throughout the afternoon and late into the evening and the noise disruption this would cause myself and other residents in Wheelers Lane and surrounding roads. There are blocks of flats that overlook the Irish Centre and Sports Field with elderly residents, young families and children who would be particularly affected.

There has been an occasion last year when live music was heard coming from the site and could be heard in surrounding roads and allotments. I am not sure whether it was an outside performance or indoors and relayed through speakers to the area outdoors. The effect and level of the noise and disruption was the same!

I am also concerned about the level of noise and nuisance that could arise from outdoor drinking at the premises during and after licensing hours and on leaving the premises. Any proposals for outdoor entertainment and music would have a significant impact.

The Irish Centre was previously based in Digbeth and was a popular city centre destination for late night drinking and entertainment. However their new location is in a residential area and residents health and well being must be considered.

Soon after moving to the Wheelers Lane site the Irish Centre applied to extend the licensing hours presumably to continue to operate in the same way they had in the City Centre. This was later withdrawn due to the Covid lockdown.

Since the Irish Centre moved to the site in 2020 there has been a significant increase in traffic entering and leaving the site. This is likely to increase with lockdown restrictions easing and I have concerns regarding the entrance and traffic queuing to access the site as well as implications for parking on Wheelers Lane and surrounding roads.

I sincerely hope that the Irish Centre and or "Wheelers Lane Events" can understand and be open and mindful of local residents views and concerns. My neighbours and myself have had an ongoing issue with the premises since October 2020 over two of the bowling green floodlights which were manually turned from their original position and directed at the entrance gates for security purposes but as a result shine directly at our houses. An email sent in April has unfortunately received no acknowledgment nor response.

I hope you can appreciate and consider the concerns and the questions I have in relation to the Licence Application in particular the noise levels and potential nuisance of any outdoor music and hope through this process to find out more about their proposals and any potential impact on local residents. As residents of Wheelers Lane we wish to know how " The Wheelers Lane Events" will affect us.

I am registering my concerns regarding the license requested by the newly named Wheelers Lane Plays Scheme re Irish Centre , former Transport Club .

I would assume you would aim to support those who vote your party into council and as such we can depend upon you to register our concerns in a appropriate manner .I feel you probably do not need me to spell out the concerns of many residents regarding many fundamental issues related to such a large concern functioning in a residential area.

However, I appreciate the site is a commercial concern and as such would wish to function financially to a full potential. In order that there is a level of harmony between residents and commercial enterprise I would re literate much of which has been stated by residents .

Noise

The length and timing of opening hours requested by the Centre are just not appropriate for the working folk and young children who live opposite.

Parking

This is a major concern in view of a lack of on site parking facilities .To date we are already experiencing drivers parking on the grass area opposite the venue .This area has already been a costly issue for the council regarding drainage issues .This ties in with customers late returns to vehicles and their 'high jinks ' and further noise pollution .Assess The narrow entrance /exit is somewhat concealed at present .It may be changed but with the traffic controls in place within the KingsHeath area this is certainly an accident waiting to happen at present due to the volume of vehicles using it and the assess road Mental Welfare There are a whole range of issues concerning pollution and the mental well being of those living opposite.The environmental quality is intrinsically related to the quality of life .This can-be an open ended issue but I will supply a great deal more information under this category should it be required.

Dear Sir/Madam

We are writing to express our concern and opposition to the proposed application ref 120107 for a new premises licence for the Wheelers Lane Events New Irish Centre Sports Field, Wheelers Lane, Kings Heath. This site has been the West Midlands Travel Social Club and Sports Ground for many years and operated as a sports ground mainly during day time and as a social club on the far side of the site, with the occasional late function in the Club house. We have lived opposite this site in Wheelers Lane for over 22 years and we have had previous issues with this venue when they have operated outside these times. For example when events are held on the sports field such as firework displays. This application seeks to change the use of this site for up to 4 days a week from a social club with sports field model to an outdoor events location with far more people attending than we have ever seen on this site before. Although the times might not look much different to current licensing hours, the fact is that we will have large noisy events going on in front of our home for over 11 hours a day throughout the weekend and bank holidays, Even the firework events would only last for 2 or 3 hours.

Therefore we object to this application ref 120107 Wheelers Lane Events New Irish Centre Sports Field, Wheelers Lane, Kings Heath on the following grounds:

The application seeks the right to hold events on the site for up to 9,999 people with both recorded and/or live music and the serving of Alcohol on this site. for up to 11 hours a day. With this comes nuisance, disturbance and restricted access to our home in the form of noise, traffic, parking and the movement of large numbers of people, many who could be under the influence of drink.

With this our main concerns are:

1) Noise. Regulated outdoor entertainment on Fridays, Saturdays, Sundays and Mondays. This is a residential area - not a city centre or night time economy area.. We have experienced problems in the past with the previous owners, the Transport Club when parties were held occasionally & certainly not four nights a week. The sound travels even from the club house and the noise pollution caused by this resulted in us complaining on more than one occasion to the Transport Club. After 9 in the evening when traffic dies down the noise from the building travels across the sports field very clearly. This application for loud outdoor events on the sports field for up to 11 hours a day within 25 metres of our home. There will also be more noise disturbance when people and cars arrive and leave the site with this very large number of people.

2) Traffic & Parking. More cars will be entering/leaving the centre during the day and late at night. In the past this caused noise plus headlights shine directly into residents' bedrooms on Wheelers Lane. as they leave the site. Then with the proposed number of people there is a limited amount of parking spaces on site so where would the cars park when the licence has asked for a capacity of 9999 people?

From past experience we have seen Stewards directing traffic to park on grass verges, Wheelers Lane, blocking not only the road but the pavement, and the service road for the residents houses even though this road is supposed to be for residents to access their houses. The last time this happened Birmingham City Council was left with a large bill for drainage after cars were parked on the grass verges / service road for a fireworks display. This has in the past stopped us getting to and from our home and we have had to call the police. I'm also concerned that the emergency services would be able to access my property in an emergency. The entrance to the venue is narrow and does not support 2 way traffic so there will be a bottleneck onto Wheelers Lane. More traffic leaving/entering the venue will have an impact on residents trying to travel to/from their houses.

Due to traffic and parking, which we have seen at events, and also at the end of the school day from Swanshurst school, this road becomes blocked. This will also affect traffic in the area and due to traffic issues with Kings Heath this becomes an important route for emergency vehicles which will be affected. If International Irish dance competitions are held there will be a tremendous increase in the amount of traffic in and around Kings Heath which cannot support local conditions as evidenced by the LTN scheme on trial

by the council which has resulted in gridlock. There will be lots of taxis trying to get close to the site to pick people up.

This proposal is to move city centre events to this site and this is not a city centre location but a residential area

3) With this very large number of people leaving a site that is serving alcohol then we will get city centre type behaviour within our local residential environment. This includes noise, people walking, staggering in the road (this has been seen in recent weeks from the club and a car had to stop) and people urinating, which has also been seen.

This is the second application made by the Irish Centre to change their premises licence. The last application in February/ March 2020 was made by another company Westbourne Leisure Ltd. Several objections were made by residents and a meeting was due to be held at the Birmingham Council House.

The Irish Centre withdrew the application at the last minute and some residents were not informed in time and made a pointless journey into the city centre.

We are disappointed that the Irish Centre have not contacted the residents with their proposed application or indeed made any contact at all.

This is a residential area and we are surprised that the Irish Centre relocated from a city centre night time economy to a residential area and expect to try and turn this area into a city centre night time economy or entertainment centre. The local infrastructure does not support this increase/influx of people and traffic.

As this additional licence is only for Friday to Monday is there an expectation that no alcohol or entertainment will take place Tuesday to Thursday?

Since the Irish Club reopened after lockdown we have witnessed a young woman stagger drunkenly on to Wheelers Lane where she was fortunate not to be run over. Empty glasses have been left on the grass on the service road and this is before the Irish Centre try to to have a licence granted for Events for thousands of people .

We have also seen men urinating in the street which is totally unacceptable in a residential area. As the proposal is for 9999 people how will there be enough toilet facilities for this proposal?

We are concerned that during these events, with the increase in cars who will be directed to park on the service road (as during previous events this has happened - either under direction of stewards or people who can't be bothered to walk, or that there will not be enough parking anywhere locally for 100 vehicles - never mind in excess of 9000) that emergency vehicles would not be able to gain access to residents houses.

Wheelers Lane is a main road with no yellow lines, outside the Irish Centre so cars could in theory park here causing further problems if police, ambulances & fire engines cannot get through. It will also mean that we will not be able to have visitors during these events so this will have an impact on our lives.

 - evidence of the applicant's own identity – such as a passport,
 - evidence of their relationship with the European Economic Area family member – e.g. a marriage certificate, civil partnership certificate or birth certificate, and

- Indoor sporting events: no licence is required for performances between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 1000.
- Boxing or Wrestling Entertainment: no licence is required for a contest, exhibition or display of Greco-Roman wrestling, or freestyle wrestling between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 1000. Combined fighting sports – defined as a contest, exhibition or display which combines boxing or wrestling with one or more martial arts – are licensable as a boxing or wrestling entertainment rather than an indoor sporting event.
- Live music: no licence permission is required for:
 - o a performance of unamplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, on any premises.
 - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day on premises authorised to sell alcohol for consumption on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.

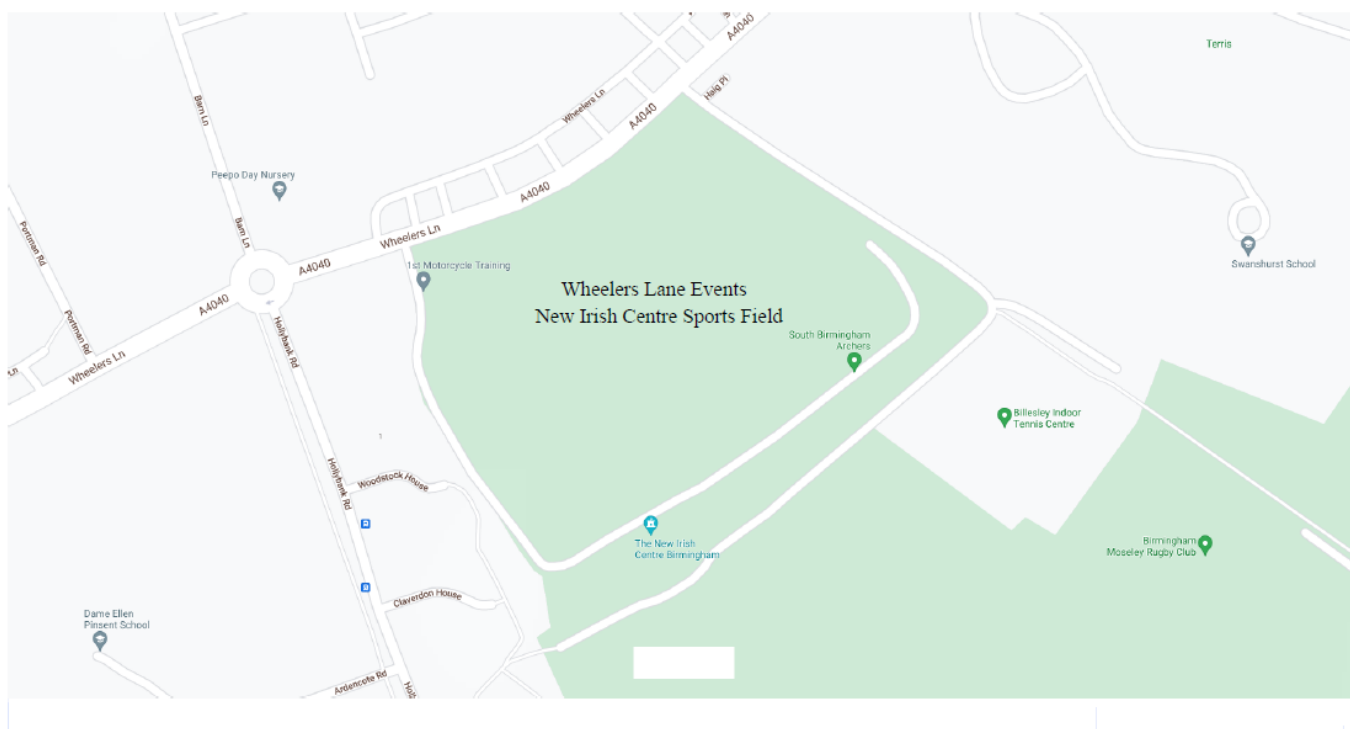

This license will cover a maximum of 3 events annually, where it is a Bank Holiday weekend the event will take place for a maximum of 4 consecutive days this is to include the Friday, Saturday, Sunday & Monday. For non-Bank Holiday Weekends the event will continue for a maximum of 3 consecutive days this is to include Friday, Saturday and Sunday only. Exact details of all events are subject to the scrutiny and an agreement of Birmingham City Councils Safety Advisory Group/ Multi-Agency Group . A Production Manual will be prepared for the event in accordance with the direction of the Safety Advisory Group/ Multi-Agency Group. Alcohol will be on sale to adults in designated bar areas. Consumption of alcohol will be permitted across the site in appropriate containers. The Licence Holder shall ensure that a well-trained management team and a training programme is in place to ensure all staff are briefed on the four licensing objectives. The License Holder shall ensure a complete adoption of Birmingham City Council Health & Safety & Guidance for Events. Full professional stewarding of all events will be in place, to a specification agreed by the statutory agency Safety Advisory Group/ Multi-Agency Group.

I have been in communication with the applicant and agent for this premises licence and I had concerns over potential adverse public nuisance impacts. However following consultation the applicant has agreed to the inclusion of conditions 1 to 8 below.

1. The premises licence holder shall not less than 42 days before any event supply a written noise risk assessment and noise management plan to Birmingham City Council Environmental Health Department for approval prior to any regulated entertainment taking place which addresses the specific noise impacts and controls relevant for the premises. The noise management plan shall outline the measures to be adopted to reduce the noise impact of activities associated with the premises including music, deliveries, site access and egress, parking and vehicle movements within the premises, recycling and refuse collections and customers. All staff shall be adequately trained in their role in implementing the plan and all operational controls and management actions required by the approved noise management plan shall be instigated at all times.

2. When there is recorded music, speech or sound or live music at the premises, the cumulative noise level shall:-

a) Not exceed 65dB(A) Leq,15 min measured at a location 1 metre from the façade of any noise sensitive premises between the hours of 10.00 - 23.00, and

b) Not exceed the representative background level measured at a location 1 metre from the façade of any noise sensitive premises by 10 dB or more in any third octave band between the hours of 10.00 - 23.00, and
c) The site music amplification shall be adjusted as necessary to mitigate any frequency imbalance to avoid low frequency tonality or modulation at any noise sensitive premises.

These limits shall be applied at all times when music is played including sound checks and rehearsals.

3. Unless agreed otherwise in writing by Birmingham City Council Environmental Health Department the premises licence holder shall employ an independent, suitably qualified noise control specialist who has experience of providing noise management for music festivals. The premises licence holder shall ensure that the appointed noise control specialist continually monitors noise levels within the venue and advises the sound engineers accordingly to ensure that the specified noise levels and controls are met. In addition the premises licence holder shall ensure that the appointed noise control specialist monitors noise levels and impacts off site at designated locations which shall be detailed in the noise management plan and a focus will be made on dwellings that may be most affected by the noise generated from the event site.

4. The premises licence holder shall ensure that noise from musical arenas at the premises are controlled by sound engineers who will work with the noise management team to maintain compliance with the noise levels and controls. The premises licence holder shall ensure that the promoter, sound system supplier and the individual sound engineers are informed of the noise control limits and ensure that any instructions to control noise levels issued by the appointed noise control specialist are implemented.

5. There shall be advance communication in the way of leafleting and a meeting to ensure that local residents and businesses are informed that the event will be taking place and the impacts of the event. This shall include including issuing letters or leaflets to premises within 1000 metres of the premises boundary to include the timings of the event, the build-up and close down activities, any road or parking restrictions and the phone number that shall be used for any complaints. The premises licence holder shall organise and facilitate a public meeting in the locality to outline the proposed event arrangements. This meeting shall be held within no more than 21 days of the event and the premises licence holder shall ensure local residents as outlined previously are aware of this meeting.

6. *The premises licence holder shall ensure that there is a dedicated telephone number for members of the public to raise issues and concerns throughout the hours that the site is in operation and shall also ensure that this telephone is staffed throughout the hours that the site is in operation and all calls are responded to.*

7. *Any fairground or amusement rides shall not use any amplified music, speech or sound that is audible beyond the licenced premises boundary.*

8. *There shall be no more than three events held in any 12 month period and there shall be at least 28 days between any event. Any event shall take place for no more 3 consecutive days this and shall only be Friday, Saturday and Sunday other than for Bank Holiday weekends the event shall take place for no more than 4 consecutive days and shall only be Friday, Saturday, Sunday & Monday.*

On the basis that these conditions are attached to any premises licence issued (and also any offered conditions that have been submitted are amended accordingly) I have no objection and will not be submitting a representation.
