1. Purpose of report:

To consider representations that have been made in respect of an application for a Premises Licence which initially sought to permit the Sale of Alcohol (for consumption off the premises) to operate from 06:00am until 01:00am (Sunday to Wednesday) and 06:00am until 02:00am (Thursday to Saturday).

Following discussions between the applicant's agent and West Midlands Police the applicant has reduced the times being sought for the sale of alcohol and opening hours to operate from 06:00am until 11:00pm (Sunday to Wednesday) and 06:00am until 12:00midnight (Thursday to Saturday).

2. Recommendation:

The area suffers from problems with anti-social behaviour and drug dealing. A hotspot for this is an alleyway that links Highters Heath Lane and Daisy Farm Park where a number of drug deals have taken place. This alleyway is just over the road from the shop and I fear that allowing the shop to be licensed and open at these unsociable times will create and magnify an unacceptable focal point for anti-social behaviour by the shops next to the homes of local residents.

While I do not object to the store having a licence to sell alcohol, as I understand the shop has one already, the times proposed to trade and sell alcohol are unacceptable in an overly residential area that already suffers from problems of anti-social behaviour. I ask for later opening times and earlier closing times to be considered for licensable activity and trading.

I write to inform of my objections to the recent alcohol licence application for the store; 235-237 Highters Heath Lane, Birmingham B14 4NX (107033)

I feel this application unsuitable for the following points;

- prevention of crime and disorder
- public safety
- prevention of public nuisance
- protection of children from harm

There is already an on going battle in the local area with nuisance moped / scooter / motorbike riders who regularly cause disturbance along the exact stretch of road this store is located on.

Should this application be passed allowing this store to stay open until unnecessary hours of the morning I could only fear it would be a ticking time bomb before further disturbance late at night/early hours is caused.

Not to mention the temptation for a late nigh 'meet' to purchase alcohol and continue joy riding/causing public unrest and potential accidents.

Should there be late night purchase of drinks or further items, if these were not disposed of correctly and could be consumed outside of the shop or local roads it is important to remember this is a high profile route to local schools for parents and unaccompanied child to walk on a daily basis to a from school or local parks. Plus dog walkers. If there were to be litter left behind this would only bring further risk to public and children's safety in keeping them from harm.

I feel as a local homeowner it would give great danger and threat to possible risk of crime in the local area, possible hit and run collisions (this store is right by a pelican crossing) and scenes of disturbance that generally follows alcohol.

There is only one question you need to ask yourself before passing this licence;

Which self respecting adult (18 yrs of age or more+) NEEDS to purchase an alcoholic drink(s) at such time on either a Monday-through till-Sunday post 11pm opening time? I.E. who HAS TO/DEPENDS UPON the purchase of alcohol gone 11pm at night. While there may be some who wish to take a drink at this time (not have enough at home and needs to buy more) surely this can only be a higher risk of danger to all of the above bullet points if you need to go out and purchase a late night drink.

I am a VERY local (to this case) homeowner so wish my details remain safe and secure I give no permission for them to be passed on.

There is also the time the shop is staying open more hours I think there will be more noise from cars & persons going to get drinks. When some people need to get a good nights sleep if they are working on shifts

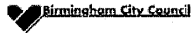

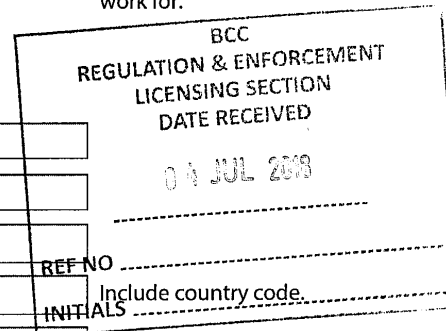

Annex 1 – Mandatory Conditions

No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence (a) at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or (b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.

Every retail sale or supply of alcohol made under this licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol. The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy. The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either— (a) a holographic mark, or (b) an ultraviolet feature.

(1) A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price. (2) In this condition:— (a) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula $P = D + (D \times V)$, where— (i) P is the permitted price, (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and (iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol; (b) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979; (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence— (i) the holder of the premises licence, (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence; (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994. (3) Where the permitted price would not be a whole number of pennies, the permitted price shall be taken to be the price rounded up to the nearest penny. (4) Where the permitted price on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax, the permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

JD Wetherspoon Policy and Procedure Overview

We understand when considering this application that the Licensing Authority will consider the 3 objectives of the Gambling Act 2005 and therefore have set out below the policies and procedures JD Wetherspoon undertakes in its pubs to promote this objectives. In addition the Gambling Commission's "Gaming Machine Permits Code of Practice" is complied with.

1. Protecting children and other vulnerable people from being harmed or exploited by gambling;

To ensure that no persons under the age of 18 are permitted to play on our gaming machines, we abide by a Challenge 21 policy in all of our premises. Under this policy, all of our employees are trained to ask any customer who appears to be under the age of 21 years to provide valid proof of age that they are over the age of 18. When in use, Door Supervisors are also fully briefed on our policy and what is expected of them in the implementation of the same.

J D Wetherspoon has adopted the industry standards and the recommendations of the Gambling Commission and recognises only the following forms of identification as valid forms of proof of age:

- National passport
- Photographic Drivers' Licence
- United Kingdom 'PASS' accredited age identification card with photograph.

In certain circumstances, other forms of ID are accepted at the discretion of the manager on duty such as international ID cards or military ID cards.

We apply this policy to all age restricted activities on our premises.

All employees receive induction training on our Challenge 21 policy when they commence employment with the Company and then receive regular refresher training. All employees complete video training, quizzes and sign a letter to confirm that they have had this training and understand their responsibilities. All training records are retained on personnel files and these files are regularly reviewed by the pub management team and members of our Retail Audit department to ensure that the training system is being satisfactorily completed.

Staff compliance with our Challenge 21 policy is tested by a number of means:

1. Management review of a 'refusals log' which records when and how often bar staff are recording when a sale has been refused.
2. Independent mystery visitors who are aged 18 and 19 years are sent into our pubs to test compliance with our Challenge 21 policy.

Our Challenge 21 policy is also actively promoted within the premises using self-adhesive signs at every entrance, staff wearing 'It's my job to ask' badges and posters throughout the premises.

All front of house staff are aware of their responsibility for preventing underage gambling.

All machines are situated in a place where their use can be supervised.

2. Preventing gambling from being a source of crime or disorder, being associated with crime or disorder, or being used to support crime; and

The power to all gaming machines is turned off after the pub has closed to ensure potential thieves are not attracted by the lights in the pub.

JD Wetherspoon pubs also have two types of alarm systems, the panic alarm and intruder alarm, which cover the majority of the pub including the customer area where gaming machines are located.

The monitored intruder alarm covers the main entry points when the pub is closed. It is mainly activated by a forced entry into the pub triggering the door contacts or motion detectors. This pub is internally described as having a 'level 1 response' to its alarm system, meaning police response. This is an automated system which feeds through to Secom central station, our alarm consultants, who notify the police and the registered key holders of the pub.

JD Wetherspoon prides itself on provide safe, well run premises for all people to enjoy themselves in. Over our estate of 780 pubs we spend considerable time and resources ensuring they are all well equipped with adequate and appropriate CCTV coverage.

3. Ensuring that gambling is conducted in a fair and open way.

All of our AWP machines are located in well supervised areas fully open to the public at large and are provided by reputable companies.
