Initial equality impact assessment of your proposal

This funding bid to government recognises a disadvantaged group of residents in Birmingham, namely asylum seekers, refugees and EU migrants. This group are disadvantaged during their initial period of arrival in Birmingham in terms of being unfamiliar with the city and its neighbourhoods, public services, and local communities. This is in addition to often having a lack of english language skills to be able understand the complexities of the immigration, housing and welfare systems.

The purpose of the bid is to increase the capacity and expand the current advice and support offer for asylum seekers, refugees and migrants. This is specifically relating to immigration, housing, welfare, local services and communities. The bid does not consider any other factors such as age, gender or faith but only the advice and support they might need as an asylum seeker, refugee or EU citizen living in Birmingham. There is though a clear link to the race and ethnicity of individuals affected by this policy due to the broad range of countries and nationalities represented in refugee and migration trends.

The outcome of implementing this policy will be a positive one in terms of ensuring that this group are able to successfully navigate through complex public service processes and systems.

and migrant populations, particularly in West Birmingham.

The purpose of the bid is also to help close the gap between the refugee and migrant population, with the rest of

Birmingham's citizens. This is as a result of having uncertain immigration status and a lack of access to basic public

services, which can enable new arrivals to settle and

integrate successfully in the city.

The bid doesn't negatively impact on any other groups but recognises asylum seekers, refugees and migrants as a group

of people needing additional advice, support and

consideration in order to successfully settle and integrate in

Birmingham.
